



SAINTS OF THE WEEK - St Roque Gonzales and

Companions - Jesuit Martyrs of Paraguay (d.1628) - 16 November

"God does not command the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ to be preached with the noise of arms and with pillage. What He rather commands is the example of a good life and holy teaching."



Much legend and controversy surround the famous Jesuit "reductions" of Paraguay. For 160 years a network of utopian communities was organized by Jesuit missionaries in the vast jungle region of the Guarani Indians. The Jesuits were authorized to establish these experimental colonies as a means of Christianizing the Indians. But there is no question that they also offered a measure of protection to the Indians from the more brutal exploitation of the Spanish *encomiendas* and the slave traders.

One of the early pioneers of the reductions was a second-generation Paraguayan, Roque Gonzalez. The son of a Spanish nobleman, he was born in Asunción in 1576. He was ordained a priest at the age of twenty-three, and ten years later entered the Society of Jesus, attracted by the Jesuits' heroic missionary work among the Indians. He was already well- prepared for such work by his knowledge, from childhood, of the difficult Guarani language.

Leaving behind the security of the colonial enclaves, Gonzalez and his fellow Jesuits set out for unexplored territories, braving hunger, disease, and the threat of death with each fresh encounter with one of the scattered Indian communities along the Paraná and Uruguay Rivers. Carrying no weapons, they often heralded their presence by playing musical instruments, which fascinated and charmed the native peoples. Having piqued their interest, the Jesuits tried to convey to the Indians a sense of the Christian faith but also to encourage them to abandon their nomadic existence in favour of farming in organized settlements. Their efforts met with surprising success. Between 1610 and 1623 twenty-three settlements were established with a combined population of one hundred thousand.

Only a small percentage of this number was formally baptized. More were apparently attracted by the protection which the Jesuits offered from the direct encroachment of colonial rule. Though indirectly the Indians were subjects of the Spanish crown, the reductions represented in effect a parallel society, organized on communitarian principles far different from the feudal world of the colonial settlements. There the Indians were treated as serfs, if not less than human. The reductions, in contrast, were based on respect for the dignity and independence of the Indians and their human rights as children of God.

The reductions, however, were not universally admired. Many of the colonists were furious at the Jesuits for their criticism of the encomienda system and for their success in effectively closing off a vast pool of potentially exploitable labour. The secular church resented the Jesuits for their supposed arrogance in turning their backs on the needs of the colonial society. Meanwhile the Jesuits had to defend their communities from marauding slave traders and the colonial government, which wanted to appoint civil administrators over the reductions. It was difficult under these circumstances for the Jesuits completely to disassociate themselves from the imperial culture of the Europeans. Though they won the affectionate devotion of many Indians, there were others who challenged the legitimacy of the enterprise. To them the white priests represented nothing but a more benign form of colonial exploitation.

In the autumn of 1628 one of these hostile chiefs gave an order to kill Father Gonzalez and his Jesuit companions. A party of assassins was dispatched to carry out this order. On November 15 they attacked Gonzalez and hacked him to death with a stone hatchet. They also killed his fellow Jesuit Alonso Rodriguez. Two days later they killed a third priest, Father Juan de Castillo, who was stationed at a nearby mission.

The murder of these priests did not stop the encroachments of the Europeans. If anything, the Indians had lost courageous and effective defenders. A similar fate awaited the reductions themselves. In 1773 political and ecclesial rivalries in Europe prompted Pope Clement XIV to suppress the Jesuits. Thousands of missionaries were forced to abandon the field, among them the fathers of the Paraguayan reductions. The

Society of Jesus would later rise from the ashes. But the reductions were finished. Within a few years the neat rows of houses, the paved avenues, and the baroque stone churches had been reclaimed by the verdant jungle.

In 1934 Gonzalez was the first American-born martyr to be beatified. His canonization followed in 1988, with a feast day established for November 16.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 32nd SUNDAY MATTHEW 25:1-13

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

A good friend has an upcoming birthday. He is difficult to buy for. He likes to choose his own clothes and is particular about material, quality and cut. He has very few items of clothing – but everything he does have always looks good, no matter how many washes – and he is blessed with the sort of frame which never expands in unwanted places. He boasts the same waist as he had when we first met, over 30 years ago. In this respect I am beginning to match him – but my rapidly shrinking waistline is down to a misbehaving thyroid and not in any way caused by self-discipline or sensible eating. It is pointless me even attempting to buy a jumper or sweater. I could give him some money to go and buy something he liked – but that, to my mind, is just too impersonal. I thought I had cracked my conundrum earlier this week. He is, something of a petrol head and, when this week I came across one of those "Wowcher" offers whereby he could drive five different supercars over a set number of laps at a race-track not far from here., my prayers were answered, or so, I thought. The price on offer was too good to pass up. I was hooked and enjoyed picking the five cars that I thought he would like. I was once again, the ten-year-old with a shiny new Corgi Car waiting to be set free from its box. It was never 'Dinky' cars for me – always 'Corgi' and never, ever. **ever**, Matchbox. Then I started to read the Terms and Conditions. The small print was a minefield of double and triple speak, and the list of conditions had me completely bamboozled.

It's always the small print that gets you. Fifty plus years of being a consumer has taught me that most painful of lessons – Beware of the Terms and Conditions. Some refer to them as T's and C's in an effort to make them more cuddly but, be in no doubt, they are as lethal as a Puff-adder. Now, once in ten years I will have a flutter on the Grand National, but I wager with you that if I assembled 1000 people and offered £1000 to anyone who had already read and understood Apple's T's and C's that accompanied their beautifully packaged new iPhone, then it would cost me the princely sum of nothing – absolutely zero. I would even venture to say that anyone who, having understood the same Terms and Condition did not return their unopened box to Apple and request a full refund, would immediately walk into a ministerial role in the British government. Do you always read the small print – or do you scroll to the bottom of the page and tick the box "I have read, understood and accept the conditions?" Do you always read the unhelpful leaflet, that lists the details of your prescription medication, including known side effects followed by 'you may experience other side effects not listed here'. What? Say that again! As they say – the devil is always in the detail.

This week we meet the Ten Bridesmaids. Five of them were foolish – they had quickly scrolled through the terms and conditions just to reach the bottom and click accept. They had been thrilled to receive the invite, nothing would get in the way of their ambition and their pursuit of glamour and fame. Five had read everything and knew all of the conditions and implications. They thought long and hard before accepting the invitation. They prepared themselves for the responsibility they had accepted. Then the dialogue "We have run out of oil – give us some of yours!" "No chance! If we do, there will not be enough for both of us, and we might both run out!"

I haven't always been a fan of a fastidious reading of the small print. Once upon a time I was much more instinctive. A knee-jerker of Olympic standards. It took me years to realise there is only one reason why something sounds too good to be true, it <u>is</u> too good to be true! It's a con! The parable invariably causes me a problem. I love it when Jesus tells me to give without counting the cost, to give away my spare cloaks to those who have none, to share my table no matter how meagre the fare on offer. I like that sort of teaching. It's my comfort zone. When Jesus asks me to be more calculating, I grow uneasy. When he suggests I spend time reading the small print, I become disquieted.

This weekend, we commemorate those who didn't need any small print. They instinctively knew what they must do. Their generosity would come at a cost. Arms, sight, hearing, legs – even life. Cost didn't figure in their calculations. They gave of themselves for that is all they had to give. They witnessed Jesus' call to stand ever ready. We too are to be ready, ready always. Our preparedness for the meeting with God as Father, is not something we can put off until tomorrow, when we have more time. We must do it now: - Today. Now! Ahora! Maintenant! Jetzt!
