Who do you say that I am?

iven the division in the Church today, the universal community of Christians clearly needs someone like St Peter, who will summarise in himself the unity of the whole Church. That is why the role of the papacy is at the centre of discussion between Roman Catholics and other Christians. We believe that being in communion with the pope, Peter's successor, is as important today as it was in the early Church. Too often, however, we tend to see the figure of the pope as the one who uses his keys, the symbol of his authority, to keep people out. But keys open doors as well as close them, they give access as well as prevent it. And many non-Catholics are hoping that Peter's representative can still become the great symbol of unity in the Church by using his authority in the service of unity.

This work of unity is something that can be seen practically at work in the second letter of Peter. In spite of the real differences between Peter and Paul, Peter speaks movingly about "our brother Paul, who is so dear to us" (3:15) and goes on to defend Paul against those who distort his words. Peter functions as the great unifier, the one who holds the different factions together, the one who is the first in the defence of those who have received a mission from God to spread the Gospel. He lives up to his new name: he really is a rock.

St Monica (c. 332-387)

Overshadowed in church history by her famous son, St Augustine of Hippo, Monica was a model wife, prudent daughter-in-law and loving mother. Her patience, charity and piety won over to Christianity her violent-tempered husband Patricius and her cantankerous, live-in mother-in-law. When her husband died, Augustine was just seventeen. Monica spent the next fifteen years encouraging her son, following him from North Africa to Rome and Milan where St Ambrose baptised Augustine and several of his friends.

Monica received sound advice from Ambrose about local church customs, which can be summarised as "When in Rome, do as the Romans do". He also told her that Augustine, "the son of so many tears and prayers" would not ultimately be lost - and he wasn't.

Monica died at Ostia, then Rome's great grain port, telling her sons, "Lay this body anywhere but wherever you both are, remember me at the altar of God"
