Rebuild the Te

he Egyptians believed that Pharaoh Khufu was a god and so the whole kingdom united to build the Great Pyramid at Giza. They supplied the labour, food, tools and all the resources needed to construct a tomb which, taking approximately twentyseven years to construct, required the quarrying of 2.3 million blocks - six million tonnes - of stone, ferrying many by boat along the Nile. Everyone believed that Khufu's death would be his transition into eternity and the everlasting company of their many deities. Today's engineers are still trying to determine how, 4500 years ago and without modern technology, highly skilled craftsmen, living in a temporary town adjacent to the pyramid, succeeded in building one of the historical wonders of the world.

The Egyptians kept detailed, accurate records and so we know more about the construction of the Great Pyramid than we do about the building of the Temple in Jerusalem. However, there was probably a similar scenario because the workforce believed that they were creating a house for God to live in their midst. When Jesus spoke about destroying the Temple and rebuilding it in three days, his listeners only needed to look at its vastness to know that such an action was physically impossible.

Those who heard Jesus did not realise that he was talking of the temple of his body, nor that his body was a temple precisely because God was enshrined within his heart and soul. They did not know that Jesus was foretelling his death and resurrection: that Easter Sunday would follow Good Friday.
