SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Louise de Marillac (1591-1660)

Co-Foundress of the Daughters of Charity-Feast day: 15 March

"Love the poor, honour them, as you would honour Christ."



Louise de Marillac was raised and educated by her widowed father, a distinguished country gentleman. His death, when she was fifteen, left her in desperate social straits, a situation alleviated only by her consent to marry a gentleman named Antony Le Gras, secretary to the household of the French queen. With him she bore a son, Michel. It was evidently a happy marriage. Nevertheless, she was visited periodically with anxious regrets that she had suppressed a vocation to religious life. When her husband was struck by a debilitating illness, Louise nursed him with great devotion. Even before his death, however, she privately vowed that she would not remarry, but would instead devote her life to the service of God.

After the death of Le Gras, Louise withdrew from public life, awaiting some sign of her vocation. This came with her introduction in 1623 to Fr Vincent de Paul, who consented to become her spiritual director and with whom she went on to form one of the great partnerships in the history of religious life.

Monsieur Vincent, as he was widely known, had organized an extraordinary range of charitable projects. These included a circle of aristocratic ladies who joined to work in the Parisian slums among the sick and destitute. Louise readily committed herself to this work. But with time it became clear that the needs of the poor required more effective service than could be provided by such well-intentioned but part-time volunteers. Vincent and Louise formed the notion of a community of women completely committed to loving service to the poor. Thus, were born the Daughters of Charity.

From the beginning, Vincent did not conceive of the community as a religious congregation. "Your convent," he wrote, "will be the house of the sick; your cell, a hired room; your chapel, the parish church; your cloister, the streets of the city or the wards of the hospital; your enclosure, obedience; your grating, the fear of God; your veil, holy modesty." Nevertheless, the Daughters were later recognized by Rome as a religious congregation, with members annually renewing vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Such recognition of a congregation of women living outside of an enclosed convent and engaged in apostolic work in the world was a novel and remarkable achievement. Although the gray habits and white headdresses later became a distinctive emblem of the Sisters of Charity, at the time their dress was indistinguishable from the garb of contemporary peasant women. In their spiritual formation the Sisters were constantly reminded that the poor were their masters. In them they would encounter the face of Christ. And so, they should never hesitate to leave off from other spiritual obligations should they be summoned by those in need. They should realize that in leaving off their prayers or even the Mass to go to the poor they would be going, as it were, "from God to God."

The numbers and works of the Daughters expanded quickly. Soon their communities had spread throughout France and other parts of Europe. With members drawn particularly from among the peasant class, they could be found administering hospitals, orphanages, and schools for the poor, as well as ministering to prisoners and galley slaves and visiting the poor in their squalid hovels. Louise herself cared for the victims of the plague during an epidemic in Paris.

Louise de Marillac was by all accounts a valiant and inspired leader, whose voluminous correspondence with her beloved friend and mentor reveals at the same time her refinement and acute spiritual wisdom. One source of anxiety was her slow-witted son, Michel, to whom, naively, she attributed a vocation to the priesthood. Vincent gently persuaded her that the boy felt no such calling. Michel eventually married and went on to become a civil servant. Years later Louise was happy to receive him with his wife and child at her deathbed. She was deprived, however, of the consoling presence of her friend, Monsieur Vincent, whose age and infirmity kept him from her side. He sent her word that they would soon be reunited in heaven.

Toward the close of her life Louise worried about the future of her congregation. She was afraid in particular that the Sisters would lose touch with the radical spirit of service in the world and become institutionalized,"

like so many other religious communities. Vincent shared this concern. Whereas the aim of most religious was their own perfection, he conceived that "these Daughters are used... for the salvation and comfort of the neighbour." Repeatedly, Louise admonished her Sisters to be "diligent in serving the poor... to love the poor, honour them, my children, as you would honour Christ Himself."

She died on March 15, 1660. Vincent de Paul followed her six months later, Louise was canonized in 1934, by which time the Sisters of Charity numbered more than fifty thousand around the world.



Further listening - a follow up from Colin Davey to his recent article on 'Listening'

It strikes me after reading 'I heard a bomb last night' in thie newsletter of a fortnight ago that however hard we try to help ease suffering in the Israel-Palestine conflict, it will ultimately be insufficient unless those who make the crucial decisions in this war start listening to each other. Not swapping demands or statements but a proper conversation on behalf of the shattered families, of the children who are being orphaned, maimed, killed.

Good listeners make good leaders, we know that from Barack Obama and Angela Merkel, and, conversely, bad listeners make bad leaders, as we know from Vladimir Putin and from a number of autocrats of the 20th century; ironically, power becomes concentrated in those who don't listen, as people become too scared to tell them they are wrong, and terrible suffering inevitably ensues, whether persecution, famine or war. But we are not dealing with such despots here, and although it is truly terrible what has been done in this conflict, history might still remember with respect those who, despite everything, were brave enough to step up, listen, and undo. For the children.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT – JOHN 12: 20-33

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

You might be aware of someone called Debbie McGee. Currently, she is the face of a kitchen makeover company but in a former life was 'magician's assistant' to the successful illusionist Paul Daniels. The Paul Daniel's show was compulsory Saturday night TV viewing for many - me included. I knew there was no such thing as 'magic' but I did marvel at the illusions performed. Cut to Caroline Aherne – a gifted actor and writer. One of her characters was Mrs. Merton - a blunt speaking middle aged but comely housewife from the north-west. Her skill lay in interviewing various celebrities, disarming them with her middle-aged homely charm before delivering a killer question. On one occasion she interviewed Debbie McGee. After niceties were exchanged, Caroline Aherne moved in for the kill; "Now, tell me Debbie – what was it that first attracted you to multi-millionaire Paul Daniels?" I wonder what it was that first attracted the Conservative party to accept a £10 million donation from a white misogynistic racist called Frank Hester. I can call him racist, because he was so described in the British House of Commons by the British Prime Minister (even as he was counting each one of the ten million pounds donation). So far this month, (and it's only 14 March) my letter box and door mat have received 6 leaflets and posters from my local MP as he seeks re-election. This detritus has been paid for in part with Hester's money. Invariably it goes straight on the fire just underneath the kindling prior to lighting. I will place them there with greater relish, now that I know how they have been paid for, and then wash my hands in neat Domestos. In 2019 Hester called for an MP named Diane Abbott to be shot (having said the looking at her made you want to hate all black women).. In 2016 Jo Cox MP was shot by a right-wing supremacist.

All the words attributed to Jesus in the Gospel are favourites of mine. Even the ones that can slice between my soul and my spirit. The following words have been uppermost in my mind this week: *No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate one and love the other, or else he will be loyal to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.* Only the word of God can read the innermost workings of soul conscience and spirit. Only the word of God can discern how defenders of Hester and the British Prime minister can live with the choices they make. I will continue to choose my fire material and wash my hands in a way that satisfies my own conscience.

If the choice between God and Mammon is a favourite of mine, so too are the words of this weekend's Gospel: *When I am lifted up, I will draw all (men) to myself.* We are fast approaching the business end of Lent – which will quite possibly come as a relief to many of you. The passage chosen for us opens with some Greeks approaching Philip, himself a Galilean. They tell him they would like to meet Jesus. Philip tells Andrew and together they approach Jesus with their request. The nations are beginning to assemble – and Jesus is about to be lifted up – no longer on an Ass or on the shoulders of any remaining fawning followers but bloodied and broken on the gory gibbet that will be forever silhouetted as a sign of failure to the mighty, but of hope to you and me, as we struggle with the vagaries of life. We bring our sufferings and disappointments, worries and fears and we lay them all at the foot of the cross.

Billionaires will never understand this – or us. They cannot see past their next billion and never notice the starving of Sudan or Gaza. Those who wield power will never understand the folly of the cross – or us. They crave power for power's sake and are often unable to see the good they can achieve, blinded as they are by political ideology. The cross is forever a sign of contradiction and if we claim to be followers of the cross then we are to be contradictory too. We are learning to our cost that this world is a sorry place – precisely because of its worship of wealth and quest for political and military might. We cannot be the slaves of God and of Money. In today's Gospel there is no indication that Jesus saw any Greeks – all he saw was those who were searching for meaning. There are no nationalities in his Father's kingdom.
