

21 JANUARY 2024 THIRD SUNDAY OF THE YEAR The Sunday of the Word of God

Jesus said to Simon and his brother Andrew who were casting a net in the lake, "Follow me and I will make you into fishers of folk" And at once they left their nets and followed him.

(Mark 1:16-18)

We continue to hold in our hearts those who are suffering - and all those who have lost their lives, or been held hostages - not only in Gaza and Israel but also in the war in Ukraine, and indeed in all the wars and conflicts in our world...

Today is the Sunday of the Word of God, a feast instituted by Pope Francis several years ago. We are giving out free to everybody who wishes a copy of St Mark's Gospel, the gospel we focus on at Mass this year – and, along with it, an edited version of Professor James Edwards' introduction to the gospel (taken from the course he gave at St Mary's Cathedral in October). Pope Francis encourages us to keep a copy of a gospel in our pocket, handbag etc...

There is also the annual **White Flower Appeal** – with a leaving Collection for SPUC (The Society for the Protection of the Unborn Child). Our parish Pro-Life reps, **Maria Igoe and Aileen Hall**, **write**: 'The Society for the Protection of Unborn Children was founded on 11th January 1967, a few months before the Abortion Act was passed. At that time, it was believed that there would be a small number of abortions, mostly in emergency situations. Now in the UK there are over 200,000 abortions each year. SPUC is needed now more than ever. Its aims are i) To support human life from the moment of conception until natural death. ii) To assist mothers during pregnancy iii) To educate young people about abortion.

Abortion has claimed the lives of millions of babies in the UK since the passing of the Abortion Act in 1967. The people who work for SPUC do a very difficult job and by donating to the Charity, we can help them in what they do.'

This year's appeal calls for the Government to end the pills-by-post DIY abortion policy. Please take and send off the postcards available at the back of the church.'

A Women's Hostel for STEKA SKILLS

Our Fundraising Partnership in 2024 – we need you...

Gary Zoltie writes: 'Most of you will be aware that we have a longstanding relationship with the Malawian children's home STEKA and their residents Sandra, Abigail and Gift who all came to Edinburgh to study at Queen Margaret University and ultimately became St John's parishioners. In the past we at St Johns and St Mary Magdalene's have supported STEKA financially through fundraising and donations and indeed this led to STEKA building two vocational skills centres which are used both for teaching vocational skills to some of the older STEKA children but also to raise valuable income for STEKA from other students.

Following research, it has been identified that a limited number of female students can use the skills centres due to the long distances they have to travel to them and the need for childcare for their children. In the aftermath of Gift's farewell words at all our Masses, and in the light of his departure in October, it was agreed to focus our fundraising in 2024 on the building of a women's hostel on the site of the vocational skills centres.

In order to facilitate this, we need your help. We are initially planning to set up a specific fundraising group who will plan, organise and deliver several fundraising events throughout the year. 'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Mary Ward (1586-1645)

Foundress of the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary Feast Day: 23 January

"I think, dear child, the trouble and the long loneliness you hear me speak of is not far from me, which whensoever it is, happy success will follow.... The pain is great, but very endurable, because He who lays on the burden also carries it."



In the lives of the great founders and reformers of religious orders there is ample record of the obstacles, calumnies, and persecution they endured as the price for charting new waters. Many of these stories end on a seemingly inevitable note of triumph. The story of Mary Ward, however, reminds us of the many others whose lonely struggles failed to surmount the obstacles in their path and whose dreams had to be entrusted to future generations.

Mary Ward's life began against the background of Elizabethan England and the intense persecution of the Catholic religion. Her family was among the landed gentry whose wealth and title allowed some private space to resist the severe anti-Catholic decrees. Her childhood was marked by secret visits from priests - often Jesuits - who had been quickly ordained overseas, smuggled into the country, and secretly passed from house to house, to celebrate their

forbidden Masses. This illicit practice of the Catholic religion was an act of treason, which could mean death not only for the priest but for the sheltering family.

Mary was beautiful and clever, and her family urged her to accept one of the marriage proposals that were readily available. But Mary would have none of it. She insisted instead that she was called to become a nun. This was a somewhat fantastic ambition, given that at the time there was not a single convent in England. Nevertheless, with the grudging support of a confessor, she won her family's approval, and so was smuggled out of the country to Catholic Belgium.

When she presented herself there to a bishop, she was disappointed when he instructed her to accept a position as a lay Sister - essentially a servant - to a community of Poor Clares. Though she found this assignment abhorrent, she nevertheless complied obediently, until a visiting superior of the order recognized her special qualities and set her free to pursue her true vocation.

Unfortunately, Mary had difficulty finding such a vocation among the opportunities at hand. Her search led her through a number of false starts and dead ends. She had come to believe that she was not called to conventional enclosed religious life. Instead, inspired by the example of the Jesuits, she conceived of an institute of women living in a non-enclosed community, free of episcopal authority, who could carry out apostolic work in the world. To say the least, it was an idea ahead of its time.

Nevertheless, Mary was able to convince a number of influential church authorities, including a good Jesuit confessor, of the value of her plan. There followed the first of a number of clandestine visits to England to seek recruits for her community. If she did not have to resort to the subterfuge of the underground priests, she still had to be wary of the constant threat of spies. In the disguise of a travelling gentlewoman, she made her rounds of the Catholic households, exhorting the faithful, assisting priests in preparing people for baptism and the other sacraments, visiting and comforting priests in prison, and inspiring a half dozen women to take the leap with her into the unknown.

During one of her visits, she was finally discovered and thrust into prison. Sentenced to death, she fully expected to meet her end. But as a result of external political factors of the time, she was spared the ultimate punishment and was instead permitted to accept exile. Back in Europe Mary went about forming her band of followers into a religious community as she simultaneously engaged in the labyrinthine pursuit of official approval for her Institute. She travelled to Rome and won an audience with the pope, who gave her tentative permission to develop her project. The formal recognition she sought, however, was not forthcoming.

As she discovered, her enemies were not only in Protestant England. Her devotion to the spiritual vision of St. Ignatius fed the distrust of secular clergy, who were rivals of the glamorous Society of Jesus. Her Institute was mocked as a house of "Lady Jesuits." But beyond the territorial jealousies of English Catholics,

there was the wider resistance, in principle, to the radical program that Mary outlined. While elements of her program were admired - especially her proposal for free schools for Catholic girls - her adamant insistence that the Institute be non-enclosed and that it remain free of episcopal jurisdiction, ran head on against the prescribed place of women in the church. While some bishops offered polite approval for her plans, most ultimately shared the opinion of one priest who, while admiring the Sisters' fervour, noted, "When all is done they are but women!"

After she had established houses in a number of cities and had won wide admiration for her exemplary schools, notification came from Rome in January 1631 that the Institute was to be suppressed. Within days messengers arrived to take Mary into custody on the charge of being a "heretic, schismatic, and rebel to the Holy Church." Though her imprisonment in a convent was brief, the suppression of the Institute continued in effect, and she remained under a cloud of ecclesial disapprobation.

In broken health she returned to England. The penal laws against Catholics were still in effect, and once again she faced surveillance and the possibility of arrest. She died in York at the age of sixty on January 23, 1645. In 1703 the rule of her Institute was finally confirmed by Pope Clement XI.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - 1 Cor 7: 29-31 Mark 1: 14-20

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

One of the clients who regularly comes to Adrian's Pilates classes seems to spend most of the time 'wafting' through life. I'll call her 'H'. 'Wafting' is not a word that would have immediately sprung to my mind – it was first used by a much more elderly class visitor – but it sums up 'H'. I was in Hexham yesterday, having set myself a challenge of walking with shopping bags from shops to car with no walking aid – just my new knee joint for support. It was bitterly cold but my spirits were lifted as I saw H wafting towards me, ivory coloured beanie hat complementing her mocha Puffa jacket, and contrasting leggings (as you can tell, this was just a momentary glance). She was wearing sunglasses to protect her eyes from the glare of the winter sun. I could have done with those same glasses to protect me from her beaming smile. When anyone meets her, they are met with the same smile. She is tall, blond, drives a black, top of the range 4x4. The car, like her, is always immaculate – not due to any effort on her part – but down entirely to her husband who would be the first to admit that when it comes to cars, he is obsessive. She is invariably a couple of minutes late for her Pilates class and climbs out of the car accompanied by a cloud of something subtle and expensive. I haven't a clue what it is, but it trails in her wake and is complimented by her 'lululemon' or 'Sweaty Betty' outfits perfectly Just as she wafts in and out of the class, so she wafts effortlessly through the most strenuous of routines.

Anyone encountering her for the first time might be forgiven for thinking 'airhead' as an immediate adjective. More than two encounters, however, reveal an intelligent, thoughtful, and kind individual who, no matter how full the room, focusses on you as though you are the only person present. By her own admission she is on the autistic spectrum – and she must work at social interaction. But work she does, as she does on her fitness and exercise, and always looking her best. She wasn't always like this. A few years back her younger sister was tragically and suddenly killed in a car crash. Her world was turned upside down. Her younger sister had been the confident, bubbly one who had enough love in her life to make room for everyone. 'H' was the withdrawn one, whereas her sister was the outgoing one. Her sister's death changed all that and it fell to H, or so she thought, to take her sister's love to everyone. It was down to 'H' to seize the day. She learned to be confident and to have the confidence to take her own. love to everyone. It would be her tribute to her sister. To use her own words, from the desolation of a sudden and shattering death came the desire to live life fully and be as good and kindly as possible. Where once there had been a withdrawn person, uncertain, unsure, there blossomed someone able to be happy and bring happiness and thrive on that same happiness. I'm no longer sure that waft is a worthy verb to describe H's journey through life. I think 'glide' is much more apt. 'H' glides through life, and being the old romantic that I am, for me she scatters fairy dust wherever she goes. We encounter love incarnate and the aroma is dizzyingly heady.

Occasionally, we all meet people who make a deep impression. We may have married them, or they may be someone we met when we were doing some voluntary work. They glide into our lives, touch us with their witness and make us and the world around them richer for their touch. In today's Gospel we read: "Follow me, and I will make you into fishers of men". And at once they left their nets and followed him. The immediacy has always struck me about this whole episode. Jesus calls and we can dawdle but I suspect he is looking for something more immediate. Th reality is that we don't have a lot of time at our disposal. All that Jesus asks is that we show the power of his love, and more importantly the urgency of his message. The task is huge. Each week I spend time drawing these thoughts together. I can never empirically measure their effectiveness. I take the example of the Sower, knowing that I will meet stony ground as readily as he did, fertile ground if I am lucky, all the while running the dual gauntlet of birds and weeds. The size of the task facing us was brought to mind vividly to life this week. We learned of Bronson Battersby, the two-year-old who starved to death, taking his last breaths wrapped around his dead father's legs and we learned of a king's prostate gland and abdominal surgery carried out on a princess. The following day, most of the papers focused on the latter not the former. This is the size of the task we face.

Brothers our time is growing short.... the world as we know it is passing away (! Cor 7:31)
