A week on Saturday, 9 March – there takes place our Cluster Parishes' Lenten Retreat, led by the new parish priest of St Mary's (whom we warmly welcome), Fr Ray Warren OMI – do sign up for it on the list at the back of both churches. It's free (though donations are welcome)

Lenten Series – "Whatsoever You do to the least of my sisters or brothers, you do unto me ..." (Matthew 25:40)

During Lent this year we will be focusing on an important theme raised during our synodality conversations - **How we can be more inclusive of people who are marginalised in society or made to feel unwelcome in the church?** Many people in the synodality groups commented that Jesus emphasised reaching across the barriers that exclude people. The parable of the Good Samaritan is a powerful example.

A small group has been meeting with Fr Jock to look at plans to help us become better informed about those communities and people that find themselves marginalised by society, including by the church. So, during Lent this year we are holding 5 evening meetings to look at this topic and to deepen our understanding. Each meeting will look in a positive way at the inclusion of a particular group. We will have speakers who are directly involved who will share their experiences – of both joy and challenge.

These evening meetings will be at 7.00pm in the Parish House every Thursday and run weekly until 21 March.

The topic this week will be: 'LGBTQIA - how to promote a sense of belonging for this community'.

Mary Bainbridge writes: 'On Thursday, members of L'Arche led an inspiring session about living with those who are disabled by society, at the first of our Lenten meetings about how we can be more inclusive of people who are marginalised in society or made to feel unwelcome in the church.

This Thursday, 29th February, at our second meeting, we will be focussing on how to promote a sense of belonging for the LGBTQIA community. Our discussion will be supported by the compassionate framework outlined in 'Building a bridge' by Father James Martin.

'The Gospel demands that LGBT Catholics must be genuinely loved and treasured in the life of the church. They are not. In Building a bridge, James Martin provides us with the language, perspective and sense of urgency to undertake the arduous but monumentally Christlike task of replacing a culture of alienation with a culture of encounter and merciful inclusion.' – Cardinal Robert W McElroy, Bishop of San Diego **We welcome everyone who is free to join us at The Parish House at 7pm on Thursday**.'

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Blessed Fra Angelico

Dominican artist (1395? - 1455) - Feast Day: 18 February

"He often commented that... the man who occupies himself with the things of Christ should live with Christ." – Giorgio Vasari



Fra Angelico, born Guido di Piero sometime between 1395 and 1400, was a Dominican friar and artist who lived in the community of San Domenico da Fiesole near Florence. His religious name was Fra Giovanni, but he became better known to his brothers as Fra Angelico - a tribute both to his angelic piety and to his artistic talents. He occupied a number of offices within his community but otherwise declined any higher ecclesiastical calling, feeling that complete dedication to painting was the true expression of his religious vocation.

Fra Angelico was one of the great early precursors of the Florentine Renaissance. His frescos and paintings featured vivid colour, startlingly lifelike portraits, an ingenious use of perspective, and realistic backgrounds. But for all their stunning beauty and technical virtuosity, the artist's primary

end was not the aesthetic but the religious impact of his work. What makes his paintings religious is not the subject matter but their intended purpose in exciting the viewer to feelings of religious devotion.

The frescos that Fra Angelico painted in the Florentine monastery of San Marco are among his most famous. They include scenes from the lives of Mary and Christ. Nearly all of them include Dominican saints dressed identically to the friars who would be viewing the paintings. The message was plain. The viewer was to place himself imaginatively in the scene before him and identify with the attitude in the painting itself. of devotion as displayed

In one picture of the crucifixion St. Dominic himself kneels at the foot of the cross, his eyes fixed in griefstricken adoration of the Holy Wounds. Likewise, in a painting of the heavenly Coronation of the Virgin, the scene is embraced by a cloud of holy witnesses, all kneeling with arms raised in an attitude of prayer. In a particularly haunting depiction of the mocking of Christ, the blindfolded Saviour is beset by a swarm of disembodied hands, while in the foreground sit the Blessed Mother, lost in private meditation, and St. Dominic, contemplating an open book in his lap.

In these paintings the distances of time and place are collapsed. The figures are dressed in contemporary clothes and set against backgrounds familiar to the time. For Fra Angelico the religious life was a life lived in the presence of Christ and emotionally engaged in the ongoing drama of redemption. It was this mystical vision that was communicated in his paintings with such angelic purity.

Fra Angelico was beatified in 1982 by Pope John Paul II, who also named him patron of artists.

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A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT - Mark 9: 2-10

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Chances are the name of Nick Embleton will mean nothing to you. Until Wednesday, it didn't mean anything to me either. Normally BBC Look North is background noise, unless you're interested in arguments between a local council and allotment holders; sort of a layer of mustard on a ham sandwich, but on Wednesday I found myself paying particular attention. I had just watched all three episodes of the ITV Drama 'Breathtaking' which had re-enacted the events of the NHS response to the COVID epidemic. Healthcare was top of my consciousness. Nick Embleton is a renowned Paediatric Consultant in Newcastle, specialising in the care of premature babies, some weighing less than 500 grammes at birth. In his own life he developed a rare form of Leukaemia and would die in the absence of a stem cell donor. He wrote his will and prepared his wife and four children by telling them of the probable outcome in the absence of any donor being found. A search of the UK was fruitless, but eventually one was found abroad. Under the terms of the Donor Register, Nick was not allowed to contact the donor until he had enjoyed two years of remission. Eventually, the time came when he could do so – and a meeting was arranged. The local BBC, which had been part of Nick's journey, were on hand to record the encounter. The donor was a young German who several years earlier had attempted suicide as he himself felt lost and directionless, that his life had no meaning or purpose. The cameraman and crew perfectly capture an embrace full of wariness and uncertainty that melted, like the shrinking ice cap, into a genuine warmth. Men don't hug. Strangers are wary of hugging but these two each had given, and each had received. Consequently, both were transformed. Not surprisingly they are friends, bonded together in life-affirming generosity and kindness; their own mutual giving and receiving, transfigured and transformed into life itself.

The ITV Drama 'Breathtaking' was not an easy watch. Tears prevented my focusing for much of what unfolded. Of the many stand out moments, one was the portrayal of a Junior Doctor doing his best to play his own violin at the bedside of an 80-year-old man as he grabbed his last few agonizing rasping, gasping breaths. He had met his wife when he was playing first violin, she played cello in the same orchestra. This same Junor Doctor had been sent to battle an airborne virus with no protection even as the politicians went on air to state categorically that there was no shortage of PPE. Now the same politicians contest there is no money to meet the Junior Doctors' pay demand but happily fritter away \$70 million on a misfiring Trident Missile that, instead of travelling 3,500 miles goes 'plop' right next to the submarine from which it was launched. Vladimir Putin was last seen rolling around on one of his antique silk rugs in uncontrollable mirth.

This weekend we are invited to reflect on the Transfiguration. We read the account every Lent. Familiarity can create indifference and it's a challenge to keep the episode fresh. Why did Jesus choose these three? We know Peter well. Peter would not have got past the first hurdle in any selection process. We know very little about James. We know that John was special. Referred to as the disciple Jesus loved, he leaned across Jesus' breast: he wasn't afraid of hugging in public. I like to think that all three were chosen because Jesus recognized their potential to be receptive. He needed them because they, to use the jargon, could think outside the box. They recognized the indefinability of Jesus and God. God could not be contained inside any preconceptions, and this meant that they were bigger precisely because He was bigger. They had no idea of the full extent of their potential – and neither do we, but Jesus does. So a young German who considered his life worthless became the avenue through which four children were given their father back, premature babies a skilled paediatrician, and a feeble attempt at poor violin playing brought lasting comfort to a dying man – the last thing he heard, because he wasn't allowed the comfort of a final visit from his wife, who was forced to isolate because of her own auto-immune deficiency. Peter, James, and John were given a glimpse of God's glory so they might recognize their own potential. We, too, no matter how small the gift we give, when we unite it with God's glory, will make a difference. None of us are worthless, and whatever we give is worth the effort, because whatever we give will be life-enhancing.
