Wildfires raged throughout many woodland areas of Britain during the hot summer months and severe drought of 1976. Hosepipe bans and standpipes became a daily event for thousands of householders as fire brigades tried to extinguish flames and keep their use of water to a minimum. Farmers watched helplessly as huge cracks appeared in their dry fields and thirsty crops withered and died.

Yet all was not lost. Within days of the first rainfall, blackened woodland started to turn green. Tiny blades of grass began to emerge through the parched soil. Bit by bit, the world started to change.
