

# Ine power of

n the three other Gospels, Simon Peter is always the first person to be called to follow Jesus as a disciple. In the Gospel of John, however, it is Andrew who introduces his brother Peter to Jesus. If Andrew ever became tired of being identified as the brother of Peter, the fourth Gospel gives him the unique role of being one of the first two disciples of Jesus, the other being unnamed. Andrew then introduces Peter to Jesus, who becomes the third disciple.

Andrew was already a disciple of John the Baptist. Andrew's master, John, pointed out Jesus as the Lamb of God, introducing Andrew to the one who was greater than his master. Following that introduction, Andrew follows Jesus. The beginning of Andrew's discipleship is in being introduced to Jesus by John. What

John the Baptist does for Andrew, so Andrew in his turn does for his brother Simon Peter. Thus the first three disciples are introduced to

Being introduced to Jesus and introducing others to Jesus become a basic part of discipleship. Sometimes we meet someone who makes a real difference in our lives; we want others to have the same experience so we tell them: "You really must meet so-andso" - hoping that the encounter will turn out to be good news. Thus the Gospel begins not with ideas or laws but in a loving relationship with Jesus. Without that loving relationship, discipleship will be a career not a calling.

Francis of Assisi sometimes described his vocation as following in the footsteps of Christ. He just wanted to follow Jesus and, like Andrew in the Gospel reading, introduce others to him along the way. So it came as a surprise to

Francis when others joined him on his journey. He called them companions rather than followers, and he struggled with the practicalities of leading the community that formed around him.

According to his first biographer, as Francis lay dying, he said to his brothers, "I have done what was mine to do; may Christ teach you what is yours!" All the things we usually associate with the Franciscan way - poverty, simplicity, joy - are actually secondary to and flow from this. Francis calls us, as he did his first companions, not to follow him, but to join him in following Jesus.
