Our Covid 19 Parish Initiative "Adopt a Friend" Has Been Successfully Launched

Gary Zoltie writes: 'After a recent appeal to parishioners to support the vulnerable and those aged over 70 we have had an amazing response. We have 49 FOLK (Folk Offering Logistical Kindness) supporting 157 PIPs (Possibly Isolated Parishioners).

The PIPS were sorted into their geographical areas around the Parishes of St John's and St Mary Magdalene's and split into 8 areas from Craigentinny in the West to Eastfield in the East and everywhere else in between. We also have a group covering those who live outside the parishes. Each area has a leader whose job is to organise their FOLKs and ensure they have the resources to achieve our objectives of:-

- Regular phone contact
- Buying and delivering shopping
- Collection and delivery of medication
- Delivery of the weekly newsletter

We were aware that many of our over 70's are healthy and active and more used to giving than receiving help but we still thought it was worth making contact with them initially just in case. And obviously there are many who are older and in particular need of support at this time.

We launched the initiative a fortnight ago and the response so far has been extremely positive with most of our PIPs really appreciating contact with their church community just over a week into the coronavirus lockdown.

BETHANY CARE SHELTER

Jim Roarty writes: 'Because of the inadvisability of having the homeless sleeping in a shared dormitory, Bethany Christian Trust, along with Edinburgh City Council have managed to obtain the use of the Old Waverley Hotel in Princes Street, which will enable single room accommodation.

Our two parishes are due to provide a hot meal for the homeless using the night shelter on Thursday 23 April



and Sunday 3 May. The latter date was originally to be the end of the night shelter season but Bethany have decided to keep it going till Monday 29 June and are seeking teams to provide the meal during the extended period.

Some of our parishes' volunteers are over 70 and others have underlying health problems which make it advisable for them to stay at home. So we are short of volunteers both for our scheduled dates and for the extended period.

The actual process is that the meal is prepared in the kitchen, away from the guests and then served by placing the plate on the counter so that the service user can pick it up. (We haven't actually seen the new premises yet so there may be the possibility of even more separation). If you would like to volunteer for this valuable - and rewarding - service, please let me know your availability either for our scheduled dates (23 April & 3 May) or during the extended period up to 29 June. Learn to DeDevelop and help STEKA in Malawi survive Covid-19

Emma Wood writes: 'We are launching a campaign today which we hope will entertain you so much that you will manage to donate to help the STEKA family survive the Covid-19 disaster. Our <u>#DeDevelop</u> campaign will take the form of snapshots of the STEKA children entertaining themselves without 'costing the Earth'.

We know how hard Covid is making life for everyone, but we are especially worried about our partners, the STEKA family in Malawi, currently home to 74 young survivors of trafficking and abuse. With only 17 ventilators in its public hospitals which serve 80% of the 18 million population in Malawi, it's really important for them to keep safe and not get the virus. We don't like asking for donations because both STEKAskills and STEKA are dedicated to reducing donor dependency and promoting social entrepreneurship. This means that STEKA recently invested in equipment to be hired out for events as well as cars which are hired out to tourists. And STEKAskills was hoping to earn an income for the STEKA Centre from Dialogue Groups to be run with visiting school groups in the summer. But Covid-19 has put paid to all that. With no visitors, there'll be no profits. And STEKA desperately needs to ensure it has enough money to buy beans, rice and Nsima to eat, as well as paying essential water and electricity bills. A Poem - Easter 2020 - by Canon Andrew Monaghan

How do we celebrate this Easter
when the world is overwhelmed with sickness and disease
and Covid 19 brings so much death and isolation?
We try to stream the services of our churches
but one to one, we still can only feel the loss of that togetherness
which Easter celebrations have brought
throughout the years.

The bells rang out and alleluiahs echoed deep in every heart
But now we're forced to ask
did this truly represent what happened that first Easter Day?
There were frightened followers who hid behind locked doors
and a few so daring venture to the tomb where Jesus' body lay
that they might give the reverence the Friday night did not allow.
The empty tomb gave birth to fear before the dawning realisation
that their loved one

had somehow risen from destruction to new life.
The privileged few then spoke of running to the tomb
and exiting with fear and bewilderment.
The ponderous Peter and the broken-hearted Mary
came then to recognise the new beginning
which contradicted all that they had once believed.
In muted, awed and stumbling words
they came back again behind locked doors
to search for meaning in all they'd lived
from crucifixion through still further senses of betrayal
until they met together their Lord who had arisen to new life.
Doubts still raged till the sharing of a little fish and bread
calmed their turmoil and brought a new
and overwhelming sense of peace.

Can we, I wonder, make a journey this Eastertime which takes us from the isolation, fear and brokenness of Covid 19 to new and deeper insights into how Christ lives for us and helps us rise above the apprehension and the sadness to find a sharing and a peace which otherwise we only glimpsed.

"Spiritual Communion"

As you are aware, in order to try to limit the spread of Covid-19, all public Masses have been suspended for the foreseeable future. This means that many people who are used to receiving Holy Communion regularly at Mass will not be able to do so for the time being.

During this "Eucharistic Fast" one way to keep close to the Lord is to make a "Spiritual Communion." This is an ancient spiritual tradition of the Church which consists in making a simple act of "spiritual communion," whereby we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to receive Holy Communion.

The great 13th century Dominican Friar, St. Thomas Aquinas defined a Spiritual Communion as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament [in Communion at Mass] and in lovingly embracing Him as if we had actually received Him." You can make a Spiritual Communion at communion time during a live-streamed or recorded Mass – or, indeed, whenever and wherever you like, using any prayer - including the one written below by a parishioner given below, or others like it, or your own heartfelt thoughts.

Jesus, you gave us your Body and Blood so that we might become sharers in your life, in this world and the next.

In these times, when we may not physically receive You in Communion, may we recognise that we can receive the spirit of Your gift so that You and we are still united as Your Mystical Body.

Amen.

Albert Tow (1916-2020)

Frances McDevitt, organist at St John's, writes: 'Mr Albert (Bert) Tow died last Monday morning in St Joseph's Care Home, Robroyston, Glasgow. He was 104 years, 7 weeks and 6 days old. A remarkable man who, until a very few weeks ago, would happily debate world events with everyone. He teased me about my reliance on reading glasses he only used his in poor light! His death is not C19 related.

I got to know him through his son, Brian. Brian and I sang and acted together in the University Savoy Opera Group for far more years than we were actually students! Brian's parents moved from Abbeyhill to Park Avenue around 1975 and attended St John's. About 10 years later, they moved to Durham Avenue. Mrs T (Rena) died in Marie Curie on 13 May 1992. Canon Rae conducted her requiem in St John's.

A few years later, Mr T moved into a 'supported living' flat at Sciennes, to be closer to Brian's flat at Greenhill. Shortly after his 100th birthday celebration, Mr T decided that he would prefer more company and support so moved into Gilmore Place. With its closure, Brian explored other Edinburgh options but his Dad was determined to stick with what and who he knew so, at the age of 102, moved 'house' to St Joseph's in Glasgow!

He was a diminutive man, physically. He worked for the Post Office from the age of 14 until his retirement aged 65. Brian has a wonderful photo of his Dad in his first uniform as a telegram boy. He worked for a while in the GPO at Waterloo Place and also for many years as a postie. He retired from Royal Mail almost 40 years ago! He's been retired almost as long as he worked. He was a very fit and active man who could turn his hand to anything. He had a wonderful twinkle in his eye and a gentle sense of fun. He was plain talking and unsentimental, disliked pomposity and enjoyed a good book. Always delightful & interesting company with an encyclopaedic knowledge of Edinburgh!

In different times, Mr T's requiem would have been from St John's. We assume there'll be the briefest of crem events in Glasgow in coming weeks - the first challenge is getting the death certified and then registered in these strange days....

A very long, extraordinary life very well led. May he now rest in peace.'

'And then the whole world walked inside and shut their doors and said we will stop it all. Everything. To protect our weaker ones, our sicker ones. Our older ones. And nothing. Nothing in the history of mankind ever felt more like love than this.'

(A comment by Chelsea Dianne that so aptly reflects how - on one level at least - the gospel of Jesus is being manifested in society in response to the crisis).

A Reflection for Divine Mercy Sunday The Merciful Way of St Faustina Kowalska (1903-38), the Apostle of Divine Mercy

'All of the saints in heaven followed Jesus who is the Way. Yet major saints followed the way of Jesus in a unique and precious way that can be instructional for all of us. We might think of them as God's "Dream Team."

Saint John of the Cross, Doctor of the Church and great mystic, followed and taught the dark way: dark, because we walk in the darkness of faith. When the faithful follow St. John's teaching, the Lord Jesus is able to prepare His pilgrim bride for total surrender to Himself in love.

Saint Therese of Lisieux, spiritual daughter of St. John of the Cross and a Doctor of the Church, followed and taught the little way: the way of love. We are called to be love in the heart of the Church, to go to the Father as a little child.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits and great teacher of the spiritual life, lived and taught the discerning way. Through his spiritual exercises based on the Gospels, he taught us how to discern God's will, and then to follow it wholeheartedly.

In following the merciful way, as revealed by Jesus and recorded in her *Diary*, St. Faustina, who was canonized on April 30, 2000, built on these great saints who had gone before her. She went through her own "dark night of the soul," which is described by St. John. She was also devoted to St. Therese and her little way (see *Diary*, 150). Further, St. Faustina was trained in the spiritual life by Fr. Joseph Andrasz, SJ, her Jesuit confessor in Cracow, Poland, who helped the young religious discern her call. This great Apostle of Divine Mercy has taken her own place as a member of the "Dream Team"!

But what is so special about the merciful way of St. Faustina? When we follow this way, we discover the immense spiritual benefit of recognizing the great misery of our human condition and growing in greater trust in God's mercy every day. As Divine Mercy transforms the misery in our own lives, we are eager to share this good news with others in need.

At the end of the *Diary*, we capture a glimpse of how following the merciful way transformed the spiritual life of St. Faustina: One day during Holy Mass, the Lord gave me a deeper knowledge of His holiness and His majesty, and at the same time I saw my own misery. This knowledge made me happy, and my soul drowned itself completely in His mercy (1801).

Now her mission in heaven with the "Dream Team" is to share the great news of Divine Mercy with souls that are in misery: I feel certain that my mission will not come to an end upon my death, but will begin. O doubting souls, I will draw aside for you the veils of heaven to convince you of God's goodness, so that you will no longer continue to wound with your distrust the sweetest Heart of Jesus. God is Love and Mercy (281).

So, what can we do in response?

We can follow the merciful way. In our misery, we can plunge into the infinite ocean of God's mercy with complete trust in Jesus. When doubts assail us, we can pray unceasingly, "Jesus, I trust in You!" We can decide to "nestle close" to the merciful Heart of Jesus (1726).

Then, like St. Faustina, we can "tell aching mankind to snuggle close" to His merciful Heart to find peace (1074). We, too, can be an apostle of Divine Mercy, inspired by the newest member of the "Dream Team."
