# A Reflection by Mairi Clunas for Sunday's Feast of Corpus Christi

'On the feast of Corpus Christi we celebrate the Eucharistic presence of Jesus which nourishes, accompanies and transforms us on our journey through life – and we give thanks. Yet, this is not the only way in which he reveals his presence among us. Each baptised person bears something of his likeness, his 'image' even though this may not always be easy to perceive. At this time when we are unable to come together in our bodies to celebrate the Eucharist sacramentally we are invited to find Him always close at hand – in prayer and in the mystery of the persons with whom we share our lives, and we give thanks.'

## This Friday – 19 June - is the Feast of the Sacred Heart

Pope Francis recalls that the month of June is dedicated in a special way to the Heart of Christ. He said, it is "a devotion that unites the great spiritual teachers and the simple among the people of God." 'Indeed', he continued, "the human and divine Heart of Jesus is the wellspring where we can always draw upon God's mercy, forgiveness and tenderness. We can do so by focusing on a passage from the Gospel, feeling that at the centre of every gesture, of every word of Jesus there is love, the love of the Father." We can also do so, Pope Francis said, "by adoring the Eucharist, where this love is present in the Sacrament. Then our heart too, little by little, will become more patient, more generous, more merciful."

# Plans for Opening our Churches for Private Prayer

Jennifer Morris and Chis Vinestock write: 'At present we think we may be allowed to open for private prayer from around Sunday 21 June. And - good news for those in the 65 to 69 age group - the latest guidance says we can now also accept volunteers from that group to welcome visitors, clean and sanitise the church. Opening for private prayer will depend on the number and availability of volunteers. We are producing a training video for volunteers and a guidance note. Both volunteers and visitors to the church must wear face coverings at all times within the church and the 2 metre social distancing rule must be observed. Hand sanitiser will be available. Current guidance is that parishioners who are shielding according to Scottish Government guidance should not come to church until Scottish Government advice advises them it is safe to do so. Parishioners aged 70 or over, pregnant women, and those receiving the flu jab for medical reasons are currently able to leave their homes for essential purposes. In making the decision to come to church they are asked to follow Scottish Government advice.'

#### **SCIAF - Covid Emergency Appeal**

'The Covid crisis falls into that awkward category of emergencies, like many food crises, which build up slowly and where there is no single catastrophic event that triggers an appeal. Also, rather than being an emergency in another, developing country, this one affects us at home too. Indeed, the vast majority of cases are in Europe and the United States, and it is not clear yet whether the virus will affect tropical countries as much as those with temperate climates like our own.

This doesn't mean we shouldn't be responding with partners already. We are but we are concentrating on public health preventative measure, and food and livelihoods assistance. These will help prevent and restrict the pandemic, and enable people to be able to feed and provide for their families and loved ones during the restrictions that have been imposed in their countries.

What is does mean, however, is that there are relatively few cases in the developing world at the moment while people at home are having to cope with the acute peak of the crisis. Within this people are, very naturally, more focused on the health, safety and wellbeing of their families and friends and there is very little bandwidth in the media to cover the response to the pandemic in the developing news. With little evidence of acute need overseas, little media attention or scope for it, and people preoccupied with the situation here at home, it is our judgement that now is not the right time for a full emergency appeal.

#### Please fill your bag with:

Notebook, pencils, pens, crayons, eraser, sharpener, ruler, pencil case, towel, shorts or skirt, t-shirt or dress, flip-flops or sandals, small ball (e.g. tennis ball), soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, spoon.

#### **Handy Hints**:

Don't buy new, recycle where you can! Clothing for children between four and 12 years.

Please label filled bags for boy/girl and age e.g. 8. Don't be tempted to put in toys or sweets. This can cause problems during delivery. Mary's Meals will deliver your backpack to a child in Malawi to help them get the most out of their education.

So do not throw away last year's school backpack or your P.E. kit, which you have grown out of. Pass it on to a child who will be delighted to receive it from you.'


# Your Garden Is Good For You



Spending time in your garden will do your wellbeing as much good as if you were living in a wealthy neighbourhood.

So says a recent study by the University of Exeter and the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS). It has found that 71 per cent of people who used their garden went on to report good general health, as compared to 61 per cent who did not use their outdoor space. A similar difference in wellbeing was seen between the highest and lowest income groups.

The study also found that those of us who love our gardens are far more likely to have greater levels of physical activity and much higher psychological well being.

# FR TOMMY GREENAN – THE FAMILY PERSPECTIVE

Tommy was a priest for nearly 40 years and most of the tributes to him have concentrated on those four decades of his life. At the end of his funeral service, his sister Carol spoke, rightly keen to redress the balance...!

'Our brother Tommy was a priest. But he was way more than that. Long before and during his priesthood he was our mum and dad's son and our brother, an uncle and a cousin. And he was loved.

Tommy was the 3<sup>rd</sup> out of 10 children. Gordon soon followed and they became the gruesome twosome. On more than one occasion my sister Alice discovered her dolls scalped, war painted and hung from the hall banister – a victim of Tommy and Gordon's Cowboys and Indians game.

Tommy had a wicked sense of humour. My brother Gordon was prone to sleepwalking and talking. They shared a bedroom downstairs. My mum heard a commotion one morning and ran into the room. Gordon was asleep, at the window, shouting at Tommy. 'If you don't play with me I'll jump.' Tommy was killing himself laughing, with tears running down his face, saying 'Jump! Go on jump!'

Tommy became a priest and the whole family were very proud. His calling was to the missions and he went to Central America. In El Salvador, he witnessed many horrific things. I remember him coming home, looking starved and haunted. I can still remember the day a car went down our street and backfired. Tommy hit the deck with his arms over his head, expecting gunfire.

After El Salvador, Tommy studied in Spain for his PhD. He then went to Guatemala. My nephew Robert visited him there. Tommy enjoyed terrorizing (sorry, I mean educating) Robert about the local wildlife. To this day, Robert still cannot go to the bathroom without checking the toilet for snakes.

When Tommy came back from Guatemala, we could see something was wrong. Our wee brother Joe took Tommy to live with him and his family. We thought that Tommy might have PTSD, but I think we all knew what it was after seeing our mother suffer from a similar type illness. Joe really cared for Tommy – and that was not an easy job because Tommy was very independent and stubborn and let's face it, they're both Greenans.' Our family are not known for their mild, meek manners!

Tommy's illness eventually got so bad that he had to go into a residential home. This broke Joe's heart but we are all immensely proud of Joe and the love and care he gave Tommy. The staff took good care of our Tommy but sadly he got Covid-19 and could fight no more. This is a sad day for us all. We are a large family and most of us can't be here including our sister Honor and brothers John and Tony who can't travel due to travel restrictions. But we are all feeling the same.

Our Tommy was our Mum and Dad's son, an uncle, a cousin. He was our brother and he was loved!'
