t Paul's instructions to the Corinthians in today's second reading take us back to the directives in the Book of Exodus (12:14-21) about how the Passover meal is to be prepared and eaten before the escape from Egypt. The bread was not to be leavened with yeast and any yeast stored in the houses was to be removed. Yeast, as we know, is a micro-organism which ferments and produces carbon dioxide and ethanol and it is this process of fermentation which causes uncooked dough to rise prior to baking into bread.

When he writes a letter to the believers in Corinth, Paul gives instructions for an entirely new type of bread, one which is not produced from fermented things but is a living bread, the Body of Christ, now resurrected.

In the Gospel story, we also know that the spices to be used to embalm the body of Jesus are not now needed as he is alive.

In the same way, according to Paul, we, as the new batch of unleavened bread, have sincerity and truth as our main ingredients. We do not need to use old recipes for our Eucharistic celebration as we can give thanks with the simple things that earth has given and human hands have made - the unleavened bread and wine which become for us the bread of life and our spiritual drink, the Body and Blood of the Lord.

And of course, for those who are familiar with baking bread and wrapping it to keep it fresh, we don't need to do this with living bread any more than did Jesus, who discarded the cloths in which he was wrapped and left them lying on the floor of his burial chamber.
