hristmas is all about children, not just because of the excitement of sleigh-borne gifts, twinkling lights and school nativity plays, but because it is the Christian celebration of the birth of the promised Messiah.

Today's readings tell of the birth of extraordinary figures in circumstances that were at once ordinary and extraordinary. Isaac was born to Sarah and Abraham despite their long experience of childlessness. Jesus was born to Mary and Joseph - seemingly ordinary people - despite the social disgrace that might have ensued. Abraham and Sarah received the descendants they desired, and Joseph and Mary

watched as Simeon and Anna recognised their son's greatness - a greatness for which he would be both celebrated and rejected during his life.

These biblical families may be unique, but their experiences are reflected in the experiences of families everywhere today. Would-be parents still suffer the pain of childlessness, and children are born in circumstances that some may perceive as "shameful".

Isaac, Jesus and their families are all extraordinary figures in our story of salvation. But no life is truly ordinary. No life is not

precious, blessed, full of potential and deserving of constant love and protection. Families and communities have provided that love and protection, through thick and thin, throughout history. The feast of the Holy Family reminds us of the power of a family's love to enable all children to take their place in the story of the Christian community, and of the Christian duty to support families in doing so.
