

CHRISTMAS MASSES – OUR PROVISIONAL TIMES

It has been difficult to decide on exactly when to have, and how to organise, our Christmas Masses because of the ever-changing situation in which we find ourselves, but the provisional plans are that as usual we celebrate 3 Masses:

Christmas Eve - 6pm - St John's - Mass for Children and Families

Christmas Eve - 8.30pm - St John's - Christmas Vigil Mass

Christmas Day - 10.30am - St Mary Magdalene's - Christmas Children's Mass

At all Masses, there will be one metre distancing.

We are reintroducing booking for the 6pm Children's Mass on Christmas Eve – opening this Tuesday at 10am – email <u>stjohnsandstmarymagdalenes@gmail.com</u> – or ring 0131 669 6518 (during parish office hours).

It is very likely that there will no seats available for those who just turn up on the night because the Church will almost certainly be full... indeed, we are looking at the possibility of an additional 4.15pm Children's Mass on Christmas Eve if we are heavily overbooked.

In addition, **seats can be booked for the 8.30pm Mass** on Christmas Eve but it is likely (depending on the number of people who do book) that some seats will be available for those who turn up on the night.

There will be no booking for the 10.30am Children's Mass on Christmas Day at St Mary Magdalene's. However, as with the other Masses, there will be a limit on numbers.

- 1. You don't need a Zoom account. You can join as a guest by clicking the invite link.
- 2. You don't need a microphone to join in. You are invited to join them in prayer, and to listen and reflect upon the prayers... but not over a microphone. Zoom couldn't cope with us all praying into microphones at once.
- 3. You don't need a camera to join either. (This means I don't need to worry about my hair sitting perfectly before night prayer begins.)
- 4. You don't need to be on Facebook or keep the newsletter link at hand. You could schedule the meeting in your calendar...although that isn't a level of organisation I have ever personally reached.

For this reason, we are proposing a trial of an email reminder:

Every day at 9pm, we will send an email out with the link for the evening's night prayer meeting. It is the same link every night but getting the email and 15 mins to organise ourselves will hopefully make it easier for all to join. A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT - Luke 3: 10-18

(The author of these reflections is a friend of Fr Jock living in Northumberland)

Two of my childhood heroes were the Lone Ranger and Robin Hood. I loved the white stallion favoured by the Lone Ranger and even came to like Tonto's piebald pony. I liked them because they possessed the wisdom of Solomon with the guile of Poirot. Robin Hood was a hero because he always managed to outwit the Sheriff of Nottingham and would take the gold and treasure from (usually fat) Bishops who were venturing though the glen without a guide! His haul was then shared among the poor. Along with the rest of the world, I love it when good conquers evil whether it is James Bond crushing Spectre or Alec Guiness (aka Obi Wan Kenobi) sacrificing himself so that Luke Skywalker can take on Darth Vader and destroy the Death Star. My need to see good winning is a driving force behind my support of Jolyon Maugham and the Good Law project. He is singlehandedly taking on corruption and has enjoyed several victories in the High Court against the Government. He relies on public donations to fund his work, and I am happy to support him. Like the famous Elton John song 'I don't have much money but, boy if I did.... I give what I can. When I was feeling powerless and helpless against the system, he seemed to come along into my life at just the right time with an answer to the question posed in this weekend's Gospel passage. What must we do then?

One sentence this week has left me chilled to the bone and crying heartfelt tears, hot stinging tears that ran down my cheeks and into my tea even as I battled to stem their flow. They were some of the final words of 6-year-old Arthur Labinjo-Hughes caught on the video camera installed by his stepmother and father to monitor him. He had been beaten, was struggling to stand, and his emaciated body can be seen clutching a duvet for comfort, crying out: "Why does nobody love me?" Imagine for a second what it must be like to feel so abandoned that the only thing you can plead is: Why does nobody love me? The prosecutors believe that the video camera was there for another, more sinister, purpose – it was there so that those who tortured him could revisit their cruel, criminal activity. It was to be their downfall. Faced with such evil, the question rings in our ears: What must we do, then?

What must we do, then? 'All the people' ask this question as they listen to John the Baptist preaching in the wilderness. John's answer is startling in its simplicity and clarity. 'No greed and no extortion: but above all, believe in the one who is following me, Jesus of Nazareth: listen to what he has to say and do as he says' – then adding I am not fit to undo the staps of his sandals.' Many years ago – and in a former life, I received the Ministry of Reader. I knelt before the bishop who handed me a New Testament. I can still remember the words that were addressed to me: Receive the Gospel of Christ; believe what you read, teach what you believe and practice what you teach. As I stand in my 69th year, I hope that God finds my performance in this regard to be satisfactory. The question What must we do then? is never far away

Looking back to the time when I was being throttled by my addiction, I think I always knew what I must do – but I was never brave enough to do it. The road was too difficult, too uncomfortable to contemplate. I knew that I could ease the discomfort with another drink. So, I took another drink. But the question never left me. I always knew what I should do - but I chose not to listen. The reality is that we **always** know what to do, because the whispering voice of God from deep within our psyche never leaves us. We can stop our ears but when we remove our hands the voice is still there. He looks back at us every morning and every night from the mirror. When we listen to him, we instinctively know what to do.
