

Parishioners' Pilgrimage to Medjugorje

Maria Igoe writes: 'Due to Covid, our twice a year pilgrimages to Medjugorje had come to a halt. But now that EasyJet were flying again to Dubrovnik, a few of us were determined to get there. It was not easy. The stress of the tests and paperwork required was almost too much for us. However, with persistence and prayer, 10 managed to get to Medjugorje, but not all at the same time.

It was great to be there and feel free. There was not much talk of the virus and very few people wore masks. How wonderful to be able to shake hands or hug people!

We met some interesting characters. The priest, who had come to give a talk at the Mary's Meals Pilgrimage was Father Frankie Mulgrew from Salford, Manchester. His father is Jimmy Cricket, the comedian, and he had been a comedian himself. At the age of 18 he suffered badly from depression and felt the healing love of God in the sacrament of Penance. This led to his calling to become a priest. He looks very like his father and is funny and smart.

When out walking one day I saw a lady, whom I recognised but only later did it come to me that she was Colleen Willard. I had seen her testimony of healing after a visit to Medjugorje in 2003. Colleen was in a wheelchair, suffering from an inoperable brain tumour and multiple health problems, which caused her severe pain. As her health deteriorated, she embraced the cross and made the spiritual journey not for healing. However, she was completely healed, and I could not believe how well she looked. She is a very pretty lady. I saw her at Mass the next day with her husband, John and spoke briefly to her. I think she was pleased that I had recognised her and had seen her testimony.

I was delighted to see Darren again. At the age of 24 he had been in a wheelchair for 8 years, as he suffered from Coffin Lowry syndrome. He should not have lived past 21. But in 2016 he was given a rosary bracelet by visionary, Mirjana, as she descended from the Blue Cross after her meeting with Our Lady. That evening he started to walk unaided and 5 years later he is walking better than ever. Everybody loves Darren.

I only had a week in Medjugorje, but it was worth all the stress of testing and form-filling.

We are booked for 2 weeks next May, when hopefully it will be easier to travel, and more people will come with us. We will certainly be praying for this.'

Always we begin again:

A reflection by Church of Scotland Minister, Peter Miller

Recently I spent some time in hospital and I took with me one of my favourite books which I have for many years. The book's title is "**Always we begin Again**" and the author, **John McQuinston**, is an American who worked as an attorney-at-law. John's desire for a more profound connection with the spiritual life led him to study the Benedictines. Written in the 6th century, the original Rule of St Benedict emphasized discipline and routine and caused a revolution in monastic life. John has adapted the Rule for daily living in today's world, using language that would not exclude followers of any faith. I feel it is a book which speaks to many who are seekers – exploring what a meaningful spirituality may look like within their lives.

Here is a short Mid-day Meditation from the book: if possible, read it slowly.

We give thanks for our existence ... we recognise that we rely on forces beyond our understanding ... we trust what this life brings ... we trust ourselves, we trust our friends ... we trust our families ... we trust life ... we trust the universe ... we release our past to the past ... we release our future to the future ... we accept our present ... we give up our cares and fears.

We abandon our illusion of control ... we acknowledge our complete dependence on providence ... we relinquish our apprehension ... we rely on that which faith do not always understand.

We have faith ... we have courage.

Keep us from all fear today ... open our hearts to the gifts of this moment ... and bind us to the great unknown through complete trust.

Assist us in forming a loving image of the ultimate mystery ... to have faith, and the courage to give ourselves hope.

A REFLECTION ON THIS SUNDAY'S GOSPEL - Mark 10: 35-45

I have never been the sort of person who enjoys a mirror – or mirrors. Apparently, I suffer from eisotrophobia. I bet you haven't come across that word too often – or have cause to use it in everyday conversation – but do feel free to use it at your will! Even from an early age I haven't enjoyed looking at myself. As a nineteen-year-old, I didn't realise that I had a rapidly receding hairline until it was pointed out to me by the barber, and now, at the tender age of 68, it's not unusual for me to leave the house to go shopping with either toothpaste around my mouth or traces of shaving foam by my ears – usually my right ear. This is why I avoid the John Lewis Department store in Newcastle. I do like some of the things that John Lewis sells, but I HATE their store. It is FULL of mirrors – every wall, every spare inch of has a mirror. It's almost as if the interior designer they use, never completed any lectures after the one on mirrors. So, as you can probably tell I have more than a little sympathy for the younger generations. Have you noticed how we have an 'expert' for everything these days – they all want to share their insights and wisdom? Many of them have warned us of apocalyptic damage that is being visited on our children. Young people can feel under so much pressure to have bodies to be envied, complexions that are flawless and fashions that are unrivalled and cutting edge. Social Media such as Instagram hold up the images of those deemed 'perfect'. The perfect have become the yardstick against whom all others are measured and compared. Those that fall short of that perfect body, or the perfectly sculpted lips are reminded of the full extent of their failures and inadequacies.

Comparisons are odious and counterproductive. Oscar Wilde once gave some very apt advice: 'Be yourself – for every other self has been taken'. My dignity comes from the essential truth that God has created me as a unique individual yet still in His image and likeness. I have often shared my favourite meditation by Cardinal Newman:

God has created me to do Him some definite service. He has committed some work to me which He has not committed to another. I have my mission. I may never know it in this life, but I shall be told it in the next. I am a link in a chain, a bond of connection between persons.

He has not created me for naught. I shall do good; I shall do His work. I shall be an angel of peace, a preacher of truth in my own place, while not intending it if I do but keep His commandments.

Therefore, I will trust Him, whatever I am, I can never be thrown away. If I am in sickness, my sickness may serve Him, in perplexity, my perplexity may serve Him.

In this weekend's Gospel Jesus is approached by two of the disciples who, perhaps feel themselves to be slightly more important than some of their colleagues. They have done a quick comparison. They consider themselves better than the rest and decide to stake their claim on a favoured seat in God's kingdom. They receive a gentle put down from Jesus and generate indignation from the other ten: *When the other ten heard this, they began to feel indignant.* Jesus warns against the attitude that suggests we can 'LORD It over others. He criticised the perceived wisdom of the day, pointing out that *their great men make their authority felt, THIS IS NOT TO HAPPEN WITH YOU.* He tells them and us that the one who wants to be great does so by being servant of all. Greatness is not found in social status, Greatness is rooted in and found in humility – we do not say, 'I am better than him or her' – all we need to say is 'I have done my best – I couldn't have tried any harder.'

Last weekend's London Marathon saw 80,000 participants. There was only one winner. Were the other 79,999 all losers? All of them had a target time, a personal best to be beaten. They did as much as they could - and they are ALL winners: even the ones who crawled over the line as a result of exhaustion or cramp. All that God asks of us is that at the end of our particular lifespan we can look Him in the eye and say I did my best. He won't compare us to Saint Andrew or Saint David or Saint George or Saint Patrick. He doesn't do comparisons. He does look into our souls, that deep comforting space where we are most comfortable for it is there that He and we are in complete union. So, we do our best. We do our best – and in God's eyes, that is enough.


