This Wednesday is ASH WEDNESDAY, which marks the beginning of Lent ....there will be two livestreamed Masses – one at10am in St John's, the other at 7pm in the Prayer Room, at both of which ashes will be blessed....if you would like to receive ashes, please come to the Parish House any time between 10.45am and 6.50pm – and 7.50pm till 9.30pm, and ring the doorbell!

**Ash Wednesday** is, with Good Friday, one of only two days of **Fasting and Abstinence** in the Church's Year. Abstinence (for everyone of age 14 and over) '*involves abstaining from eating meat*': fasting (for those from age 18 to 59) involves '*consuming only one full meal in the day, though two small meals that don't together add up to a full meal are allowed*.'

**Fr Jock writes**: 'Lent can sometimes take us by surprise – and especially when it comes rather early as it does this year. Obviously, with Lockdown still with us, it's going to be a different kind of Lent to normal (remember what 'normal' was?), not least because many of us are now much more used to interacting online.

In this newsletter, you can read of various initiatives within the parish and beyond – Eg **Nightly Compline, a group reflecting on mental health**, **a series of talks** at the Edinburgh Jesuit Centre entitled '**What would Pope Francis do?**' (see handout next week), and **Retreats** offered by the Scottish Laity Network, the (Glasgow based) Ignatian Study Centre, the Scottish Redemptorist priest, Fr Denis McBride and the Global Catholic Climate Movement – as well as of appeals and charities well worth supporting.

Among other initiatives are **weekly podcasts/videos** (and the option of a Monday night 7pm sharing group) on the Psalms, and particularly the psalms of night prayer, which I hope to offer, beginning on Monday 22 February at 7pm; **weekly Benediction**, celebrated by Deacon Eddie (see below); and material which will transform a person's daily Walk (if so desired) into a Prayer Walk (do send in suitable material).

The diocese is also offering various aids to deepen our faith in Lent – see below in Archbishop Leo's Ad Clerum. One off events/celebrations include this Friday's **Day of Prayer for those who have Suffered Abuse -** please pray for all those affected by abuse in the church and across society. Mass on Friday will focus on this important theme. (Do feel free to use the 'prayers at home' document put together by the Bishops' Conference of Scotland: **www.bcos.org.uk/COVID19**)

The World Day of Prayer is on Friday 5 March, and the SCIAF Stations of the Cross on Friday 12 March.'

The prayers take 10 minutes, and you are invited to join in silence 5 minutes before and stay for 5 minutes at the end, if you wish.

We can give help with using Zoom. If you need help to get a device - pad or computer or to get on the internet we can also help.

**Compline is the final church service of the day** - the word comes from Old French meaning "to complete". It offers a contemplative time with prayers that emphasizes spiritual peace and holds both what was good and what was hard in that day and in life generally.

Our online Compline contains: an introduction; an examination of conscience – giving thanks and asking forgiveness; psalms with accompanying antiphons; a short scripture reading; the responsory; the Canticle of Simeon – Nunc Dimittis; concluding prayer and a blessing; it closes with the antiphon to the Blessed Virgin Mary, 'Salve Regina'.

### A LENTEN GROUP ON ZOOM REFLECTING ON MENTAL HEALTH

**Geoff and Sheelagh Dobson write**: 'One of the options being offered during Lent this year is the chance to discuss the easily accessible book, *Mental Health for all, Community Wellbeing and the Church*, by the Rev. Sheelagh Dobson will facilitate a small group – now full - (on Zoom) on Mondays at 2pm.

### SCIAF WEE BOX CAMPAIGN - LENT 2021

'Last week, we told you about SCIAF's 2021 Wee Box Campaign focusing not only on South Sudan, one of the poorest countries in the world but on people suffering from disabilities there – the neglected and rejected of this poor country. Here is the story of Vaida and how SCIAF's partner agency there, with your money, can bring help and support

Vaida was 14-years old when she started to experience a numbness in her legs. "I was okay until I turned 14 years old. It started with a headache one day. My limbs started to go numb. There was no proper medication available. I was paralysed. I couldn't walk. I could only sit in one spot until someone moved me."

There were no services for children with disabilities in the village where Vaida and her family lived in South Sudan. There was no way of diagnosing what had caused her paralysis and no way of treating it.

After years of war and conflict, South Sudan has little infrastructure to provide even emergency medical treatment for children with disabilities, let alone the long-term care required for a child like Vaida to live a healthy, happy life. Thankfully there was hope. Our partner in South Sudan provided Vaida with the healthcare she urgently needed. We started

by teaching her exercises, so she could start to slowly recover movement in her limbs.

Vaida can now walk on crutches and has a tricycle she rides around her village and uses to travel to school. Vaida thought she would never walk again, but thanks to the support, she can now take a few steps unaided.

Vaida has experienced first-hand what it means to be disabled and too poor to access proper healthcare and support services. She risked losing her health and education. But thanks to the support, she can stay in school and has the support she needs to move freely around her village, spend time with her friends and help her mother with household chores. Vaida lost so much, but can now look forward to a future full of hope.

The retreat from the Ignatian Spirituality Centre for 2021 is from Ash Wednesday, 17 February, to the First Sunday of Easter, 11 April.

**Weekly topics include:** Jesus, his prayer and the Father - Jesus' Family and Friends - Jesus' Teachings - Jesus reaches out to the needy - The emotional Jesus - Jesus under Attack - The Resurrected Jesus

**Time for Prayer**: Ideally you should be able to find a time to pray with the Scripture or other material daily; anything from 15 minutes to an hour a day, whatever you find helps you.

Weekly Meeting: The idea of this retreat is that groups of people support each other. Each person prays daily individually, and then various groups meet weekly together to see how the prayer has been going. This will support you in your prayer

and help you see where God is in your prayer and in your life. It will also introduce you to different ways of praying with Scripture.

**Prayer Materials**: Choose what is most convenient for you: we provide the materials online for a computer or smartphone. Every day there is one passage from Scripture plus 'A Thought for Today', a piece of music and a picture to ponder.

We also give a few suggestions on how to pray with the day's materials.

**Reflecting on Prayer**; We suggest that after each day's prayer you jot down in a journal a few notes on how the prayer has gone. This will help your sharing in the group if you have one. It will also be interesting to reflect on how things are moving during Lent and see whether you discern any patterns in the way God is dealing with you.

<u>The BBC Radio 4 Daily Service</u> will be taking up the themes of this week. So this will be an additional way to immerse yourself in this retreat.'

**Fr Denis writes:** One of the things that has always intrigued me about Jesus is how so much of his teaching he chose to do through the medium of fiction. All his parables are fiction: each could begin 'Once upon a time.' Jesus asked his hearers to leave their own world and come with him into an imaginary world, and then return to their world to have an inner conversation of how they see things in the light of the parable. Jesus' parable world is a world of great variety. You meet all sorts of people: difficult judges, committed burglars, broken families, wounded beggars, awkward neighbours, selfish priests, eccentric employers, desperate hosts, surprised guests, wise and foolish virgins.

Paintings, too, have their own language, from pictorial to representative, to coded, to abstract, to you-name-it—communicating another world to the onlooker, another slant on looking at people and things, or simply to provoke unspoken communication between the artist's emotions and the viewer's. For this Lenten retreat I invite you to look at selected paintings, to imagine another world, and then to return to your own story in the hope that some inner conversation might be provoked through the strange encounters.

# A devoted mum and granny - Cathy Walls

Cathy Walls (née Coffils), a long-time resident of Dunkeld diocese, died on August 24 at her home in Portobello.

Fr Jim Walls writes - Mum originally hailed from Glasgow where she was born in 1928; and her 92 years saw her leave her mark in the city, Dundee, New York, Monifieth and finally in Portobello.

The eldest of 3 other sisters, Dina, Margaret and May, and of a baby brother John, Cathy, originally baptised into the Church of Scotland, found the Catholic church early in life through her late friend Nora Connor and the Legion of Mary in St Teresa's Possil Park. Her caring side and devotion to others shone early in life as she worked in a hostel (run by the Legion) for, as she described them, fallen women, where she would go out into the streets and pubs of Glasgow in the 1940s and 50s to help bring them to safety through what would now be described as supported accommodation.

Her devotion to the church grew as she moved to Dundee taking up the post of housekeeper at St Vincent's church - it was there her culinary shortcomings were soon recognised - she made great soup but lousy chips according to one member of the clergy.

She left Dundee to discover the world but after a short spell working in New York as a housekeeper she returned to the city and to a blossoming romance with the man that stoked the boilers at St Vincent's - her soon-to-be husband, Jim Walls (my dad).

Marrying later in life they quickly had their hands full with 3 young boisterous boys and busy jobs in the Post Office and in nursing.

Cathy managed to retire three times – the first from her job of many years as an auxiliary nurse at the Royal Victoria Hospital - a place where she had many fond memories and forged many close and lasting friendships. During this time she was an active member of St Matthew's parish in Whitfield helping to run the OAP club and occasionally dressing up as Santa for the Christmas Fayre.

Retiring from the hospital led to jobs cleaning at the Scottish homes offices in Fintry and finally in Asda – always driven, she would often, even as late as this year, say that she wished she could still have a "wee job".

Cathy's greatest endeavour came as she cared for Jim at home for 10 years until he passed away with dementia. Tireless in her care, she taught her three sons, Jim (later to be Fr Jim Walls), Gerrard and Stephen, what real compassion and love truly meant.

Following his death, she moved to her beloved Monifieth where she lived for 12 years having been made very welcome in St Bride's parish

Her favourite place on earth was Lourdes. She went on pilgrimage many times and was still talking about perhaps being able to go next year.



Cathy was a devoted mum and granny – survived by her sons, daughter-in-laws Adele and Alison and grandchildren Lucy, Isobel and Euan. She is also survived by her namesake sister-in-law Cathy Walls, and younger sister Dina Preston.

Cathy was a genuine character renowned for speaking her mind, and having a natural wit that made her popular wherever she landed. She is greatly missed by her friends and family leaving a huge hole where her personality used to reside, although we are taking comfort from our faith that mum passed on to us, that she is now living in love with God surrounded by all those she held dear on this earth. Please continue to pray for mum, as she no doubt will be interceding in a powerful manner for us.

(When Fr Jim was appointed Spiritual Director at the Scots College in Rome in September 2018, Cathy moved to Portobello to live with her son, Ged, and daughter-in-law, Adele, in Joppa for the last two years of her life, bringing Jim into our orbit too)
