

A FINAL SHORT TALK ON THE PSALMS – Monday 21 March – 7pm - Zoom

Fr Jock writes: 'In association with our nightly Compline/Night Prayer of the Church, for these first five weeks of Lent, I have been offering a short (15 minutes-ish) talk on the Psalms, and particularly the Psalms used at Night Prayer, each Monday evening at 7pm – and available online after that. The Psalms (150 of them) are the prayer book of both Jews and Christians and have been prayed and loved for nearly 2500 years, but come alive for many people with a little knowledge of their background. They were probably known by heart by both Jesus and Mary and prayed often by them both.

OUR ON LINE COMPLINE PRAISED AND RECOMMENDED IN THIS WEEK'S TABLET

One of the articles in The Tablet of 20 March 2021 is 'Diaries of a Plague Year' in which several different people record their own stories of gain, loss and adapting during lockdown. One of these stories, by Mary Blanche Ridge, refers to our Lenten nightly Compline – see below



MARY BLANCHE RIDGE Fear, disorientation, the sudden desolating loss of hopes

and plans: when lockdown arrived in March 2020, these felt all too familiar from the time of my husband's diagnosis six years previously, when at the age of 66 he had suddenly understood that soon he would die.

Illness erects such a barrier, and isolation, too; our children and grandchildren live far away, and for all their wonderful generosity we often could not see them or our friends. So I found I could slot back into living with uncertainty and limitations fairly easily, but it felt strange that he wasn't there sharing it with me. He had died exactly three years before lockdown began: I thought I had got used to it, and was getting on with my life. Then, as now, I found I needed to pray

and search for God, especially in the midst of increasingly dreadful universal suffering, being powerless to help even my own children and grandchildren in their lockdown struggles.

I love my parish, and the prospect of long weeks with churches closed felt grim. But online Mass has been a revelation. When I first tuned in, a wild March gale was blowing and I was shivering by the door, trying to find my dodgy rural wifi signal; I'll never forget the sudden joy of connection. I'm thankful for it still: aware of fellow parishioners, as well as friends and family from further afield, who have said they will "be there", all tuning in; all this somehow makes it far easier to believe in the communion of saints, and all those angels and archangels with whom we sing the Sanctus.

There is the luxury, too, of travel; I can take part in a lockdown house Mass 400 miles away, in my priest-cousin's parish prayer room; there are always women there, it's a team effort, and in Lent, at nightfall, they offer Zoom Compline (stjohnsandstmarymagdalenes. com/news/night-prayer/) which exerts a quiet power quite beyond my expectations.

Through all this time, I've been following the readings with Nicholas King's translation of the Bible; its vivid immediacy seems to bring God much closer. "Into a place of green grass, there he has pitched my tent" is how he translates the second verse of Psalm 23, and I love it.

At the start of lockdown, feeling too alone inside the house, I took to walking, far more than usual: having a dog, being in the countryside, I was so lucky I could. During those early weeks, everything was so quiet that it felt like 100 years ago: an unparalleled spring, with processions of wild flowers, delicate ferns in the ditches, birdsong. I bumped into neighbours walking too, who

might more usually have waved from their cars: we tarried a little on the way and got to know each other more, and I discovered their kindness. Soon I was walking five or six miles a day and I have kept it up.

I thought I would miss the changing evening light of summer, but winter walking is lovely, too: the low slanting sun, the brightness in the puddles. Still plenty to see: the catkins, so soft you can't feel them with cold fingers; the snowdrops, first primroses and celandine. Getting back home at teatime, aching with tiredness, I find I am glad to be there, and of the evening ahead, even when the day is otherwise completely empty. That is quite something when so many millions of people the world over are rushed off their feet with work and worry and never have a minute to themselves.

Maria Igoe writes: 'On 19 March, the Feast of St Joseph, Pope Francis declared that the Shrine of Our Lady of



Knock is to be recognised as an International Marian and Eucharistic Shrine. Pope Francis visited Knock when in Ireland for the World Meeting of Families in 2018.

On 21 August 1879, 15 people witnessed an apparition on the gable end of the parish church. Our Lady appeared with her family, Jesus, the Lamb of God, her husband, St Joseph and St John the evangelist, the son given to her by Jesus on the Cross". St Joseph is the Patron of a Happy Death.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, I give you my heart and my soul.

Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, assist me in my last agony.

Psalm 87 (88) – Friday Night Prayer

This is your hour: this is the reign of darkness (Lk 22:53)

Lord my God, I call for your help by day: I cry at night before you.
Let my prayer come into your presence.
O turn your ear to my cry.

For my soul is filled with evils: my life is on the brink of the grave. I am reckoned as one in the tomb: I have reached the end of my strength,

like one alone among the dead; like the slain lying in their graves; like those you remember no more, cut off, as they are, from your hand.

You have laid me in the depths of the tomb, in places that are dark, in the depths.
Your anger weighs down upon me:
I am drowned beneath your waves.

You have taken away my friends and made me hateful in their sight. Imprisoned, I cannot escape; me eyes are sunken with grief. I call to you, Lord, all the day long; to you I stretch out my hands. Will you work your wonders for the dead? Will the shades stand and praise you?

Will your love be told in the grave or your faithfulness among the dead? Will your wonders be known in the dark or your justice in the land of oblivion?

As for me, Lord. I call to you for help: in the morning my prayer comes before you. Lord, why do you reject me? Why do you hide your face?

Wretched, close to death from my youth, I have borne your trials; I am numb. Your fury has swept down upon me; your terrors have utterly destroyed me.

They surround me all the day like a flood, they assail me all together. Friends and neighbour you have taken away: my one companion is darkness.
