A REFLECTION ON THE FIRST READING FOR PENTECOST SUNDAY)

Acts 2: 1-11

Have you ever experienced real fear? Not the fear induced from watching "Silence of the Lambs" on your own in a creaky flat, but the sort of fear experienced from the sound of a burglar moving around downstairs, with your heart pounding to the point of bursting, convincing you that the whole street can hear the thud, thud, thud echoing in your chest. You try to hold your breath; you pray for the burglar just to go. He can take whatever he wants as long as he doesn't come upstairs. Now think for a moment of the men, women and children huddled together in the land God chose as his home, as rockets exploded all around them bringing down masonry, metal and all manner of dangerous objects. Sirens sound, rockets whine and the air is filled with thick, acrid heavy smoke and dust making every breath an exercise of gargantuan effort. This is fear – real fear. As I write these few words, a cease-fire has been agreed between the state of Israel and Hamas. Only time will tell whether it lasts. I have my doubts - because the injustices remain. It's difficult to cap an oil well – but this is a walk in the park compared to managing the anger that is rooted in injustice.

The early 1990's was a very fearful time for me. I didn't experience the fear of sitting in the middle of a war zone, but I did realise emptiness as my world came crashing around me. It was my world that came crashing down, but it wasn't God's world. My world had been built on denial, alcoholic addiction, and deceit. In the chaos and car crash that formed so much of my life I had tried to love and help wherever I could, but the effort required was exhausting, and alcohol and disordered thinking became my refuge. I stress, it was my world, it was never God's world. As I sat amongst the ruins of my old life, I saw the need to rebuild on different foundations, using different building materials. Last week I suggested we spend some time reflecting on what are the things we value in life, what would be the one possession that you would not want to lose. I also told you that it was my sobriety that I value more than anything else. Sobriety is built on truth and honesty, realistic appraisal of self, constantly doing Step 10 in the 12 Step Programme. I was fortunate in that God, at this time, sent many angels my way. I won't embarrass anyone by naming them. Some used the brutal medicine of therapy; others held my hand; others whispered words of encouragement. All of them were channels of peace, giving hope and reassurance in equal measure. I wasn't alone. I didn't experience tongues of fire but did experience the uplifting comfort of God' Holy Spirit. I was given a strength unimaginable to my old self, my eyes were opened, I became self-aware as never before, I now had clarity of vision and clarity of purpose. My Pentecost had dawned, and I was reborn.

Today we celebrate the birth of the Church. Gospel Tradition reminds us that the emotion of fear was experienced by His early disciples, too. We wrongly assume that the episode recounted in today's first reading only affected his closest disciples, those who would be later described as Apostles. You should spend time reading all of Chapters 1 and 2 of Acts of the Apostles. A closer read leaves us in no doubt that there were many followers, all of whom will have moved around cautiously. In the Acts of the Apostles, Luke speaks of 'many followers who were women, including Mary his Mother as well as his brothers'. Self-survival dictated that the early Church had to move cautiously. Its members could trust only a few; they sought the support of those who were like-minded. It was all of these who experienced that huge outpouring of God's Holy Spirit into their hearts. Some weeks back, we read how public opinion had been whipped up and the crowd had been inflamed to such a degree that the crucifixion was inevitable. His followers were equally wary of that same power of public opinion. They found themselves living in something of a tinderbox. They were nervous and fearful, and that fear imprisoned them, freezing them into inactivity. Fear of public opinion can be tremendously debilitating. God's Spirit emboldened them and helped them to cast off those fear-filled shackles.

We are today's witnesses. We leave it to the priests and bishops to preach through their words of wisdom, but <u>we</u> preach through our lives and lifestyles, our witness and our conviction. Often <u>our</u> preaching is the more eloquent - once we have overcome our fear.

Chapter 19 – Quelling the Tempest



If our lives are in turmoil, we may feel that there is no way to quieten the din in our mind. But we are wrong. Even though the surface of our lives may be deeply disturbed, there is always a place deep within where there is calm. Getting in touch with that deeper place takes time. But that is all it takes. A time to be still, to be quiet until the turmoil within begins to ease. If we allow him, Jesus is as willing to quieten the storms in our lives as he was willing to quell the tempest on the Lake of Galilee when his friends battled with an angry sea.

Jesus and his disciples were in a boat, Matthew tells us, when suddenly a storm broke over the lake, so violent that the boat was being swamped by the waves. Jesus was asleep. 'So, they went to him and woke him saying, "Save us, Lord, we are lost!" And he said to them, "Why are you so frightened, you who have so little faith?" And then he stood up and rebuked the winds and the sea; and there was a great calm' (Matthew 8:24-27).

Augustine has this advice for those who feel they are being swamped by the storms of life:

For Christians who fear they are drowning in the world's business, the worst thing they can do is panic.

There can be no question of escape from the situation;
We are many miles from land and there is no help near.
The one thing we can do is to withdraw, as it were, into ourselves, to find the Christ within, who is as powerful to still the inner tempest as He was to subdue the waves on the Lake of Galilee.

Our prayer of silence takes us down to that stillness at the centre of our being, to that innermost self where there is always peace. When we become quieter, we find the peace that is hidden in the depths of our being but is submerged under the agitation of everyday life.

So, in the words of a beautiful prayer by David Adam, Canon of York Minster, from his book "Edge of Glory":

'I weave a silence around my lips, my mind, my heart.'

'Calm me, Lord, as you stilled the storm.

Still me, Lord, and keep me from harm.


Let all the tumult within me cease.

Enfold me, Lord, in your peace.'

It is a long way from the surface of our lives, a long road from the troubled mind to the place of peace in the centre of our being. 'The longest road,' wrote Dag Hammarskjöld (a Swedish economist, Secretary-General of the UN and Nobel Peace Prize posthumous winner), 'is the journey inward. Between you and him lie care, uncertainty, doubt.'

To reach the place where Christ awaits us, we need to be prepared for long periods of silence and quiet, long enough for our doubts to dissolve, our cares to lose their urgent pressures, our uncertainty to give way to trust. To wait in silence for as long as it takes is to be taken eventually to the still centre where we find that the mind has become quiet, and the heart is at peace.

And, in the stillness, we find God.
