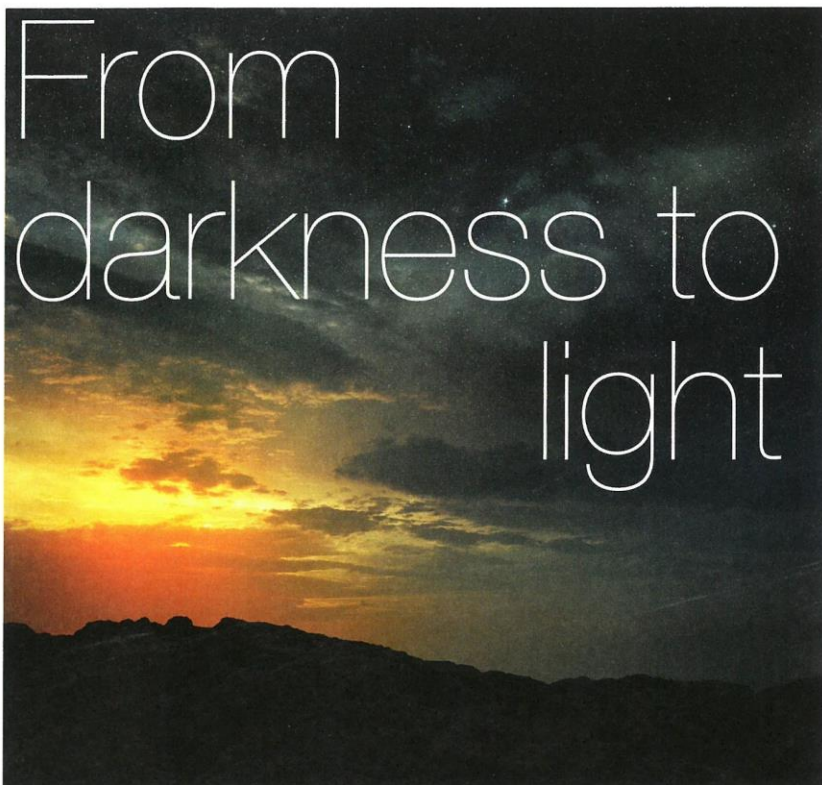

## Apostle to the apostles

**M**ary of Magdala sets out early on the first day of the week while it was “still dark”. We are all aware that there is a journey to be made between the “dark” of imminent dawn to the place of faith, at the end of this Gospel, where the unnamed disciple “saw and believed”. The “dark” Mary experiences is not just the absence of daylight: it also reflects Mary’s innermost state, one where the shadows of fear, loss and grief cloud her heart and mind.

In her search for Jesus, Mary reaches out to those around her. She calls Peter and the other disciple to come with her to the tomb. In the “dark” of her own sorrow, she seeks comfort in being

with those she knows. Since our last Easter Sunday, many of us too have experienced sorrow, darkness and loss. In our search for Jesus, we have relied on “other disciples” to help us make this difficult journey. “Our seeing and believing” has been made real by sharing our suffering, grief and loss with one another. As with Mary and the early disciples the passion of Jesus has been given a sharper focus and some very courageous people have literally laid down their lives for others. Through them Christ has appeared in our midst, darkness has been overcome by the light of kindness and we have glimpsed the resurrection of Jesus in the emergence of a more loving and compassionate world.
