

Fifth Sunday of Lent - 3 April 2022

The scribes and Pharisees said to Jesus, "Master, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery, and Moses has ordered us in the Law to condemn women like this to death by stoning. Meanwhile, a note from the Bishops' Conference of Scotland on 'From Monday 4 April the legal requirement to wear face coverings in churches in Scotland will be removed There is no need to wear a face covering in church from this date (though you can continue to wear one if you wish). Please continue to respect the space of fellow parishioners and remember to sanitise your hands upon entering and leaving church.'

The monthly **Healing Mass**, with the Sacrament of the Sick, will take place at **2.30pm on Monday at St John's.** There will be tea and home baking in the Hall after it....There will also be **Stations of the Cross** on **Wednesday** after the 10am Mass – all welcome to join in.

Lateral Flow Tests: Please, if possible, consider continuing to use them before coming to church. Covid infection remains at a very high level in Scotland. Hospital admissions for Covid are also substantial although Intensive Care occupancy is much lower than during the height of the pandemic. Sanitising hands, social distancing and wearing face masks in doors in public places are still considered wise safeguards. Carrying out a lateral flow test before coming to church and obtaining a negative result is a very good way of protecting our elderly and vulnerable co-parishioners.

Synodal Process – Update

One of our Synodal Co-ordinators, Donald Scott, writes: 'Thank you to everyone who has contributed in various ways to our synodality process so far. Between St John's and St Mary Magdalene's we have had 268 questionnaires completed, and over 80 people have attended the 11 synodality conversations in the Parish House. As a result, we have a rich and diverse set of insights and perspectives.

We submitted a summary report to the diocese by the 31 March deadline. This will be combined with the information from all the other parishes into a diocesan report to Rome. We will also be able to send our own report directly to Rome before the end of May. Those inputs will contribute to the gathering called by Pope Francis for 2023. (As you can see from the following paragraph, we will be sharing both reports – with all the contributions to the synodality process so far - at the May 15 meeting, but if anyone is particularly eager to see the 2 page summary, please approach Enrico, our administrator, and he will email or send you a copy).

Perhaps most importantly, we need to make sense <u>for ourselves</u> of what this all means for us. It was agreed recently that we should use an Open Parishes' Meeting – joint between the two sister parishes – to share all the material that has been recorded (as well as the two reports sent to the diocese and Rome). This will give all of us as parishioners an opportunity to reflect, share and play a part in discerning what is most important for our next steps together in the faith. **The date for that Open Parishes Meeting will be the evening of Sunday 15 May.** It is an important event – do mark it in your diary!'

Jesus and the Apostles – An Art Exhibition: In February we enjoyed an exhibition of Karl Stern's work





A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT - JOHN 8:1-11

This weekend's Gospel episode presents us with an air of cold calculation. We can only assume that someone had noticed that the 'unnamed woman' seemed to be regularly opening her door to a male suitor. Tongues had started to wag; some were watching her closely; someone even started keeping a diary. A definite air of calculated vindictiveness took hold until someone blurted out: I am sure she's having an affair. This opinion prevailed until the accepted wisdom 'assumed' that she was indeed an adulteress – nothing more. A convenient hook had been found and all manner of vindictiveness and cruelty could be attached to her character. She was now fair game. That's the thing about lynch-mobs. When the voice is sufficiently strident then the mob becomes proportionately malleable Think for a moment of the harm that has been reeked on the (dis)-United Kingdom by the strident voices screaming; 'We're full! There are too many 'forinnners'! 'The EU is stealing our money!' When voices of division take hold, division ensues. When a woman is found guilty of adultery, then for the society of the time, only one outcome was possible. So, a plan was hatched because Moses had stipulated that evidence must be found. Spies were appointed by the local neighbourhood watch. Her home was monitored. It's interesting that no-one appears to have been watching the 'other party', the unnamed man. His role is lost forever to the mists of time, neve to be called into question. No-one was interested in him; it was the woman who was in their sights. From nowhere, a whisper ran like wildfire: He's there now. We can catch them in the act if we are quick.

Uninvited, a crowd bursts through her front door. *Caught you!* Without ceremony, and perhaps with little attention to modesty, the unnamed woman is dragged through the streets. We can only assume that the man escapes through a back door, never to be mentioned again. Jesus had already been spotted in the Temple and John tells us the 'all the people came to him'. All that is, apart from the 'neighbourhood watch' brigade, the crowd more in love with vindictiveness than developing their understanding of God! The woman is dragged in before Jesus. They told him: she had been caught 'in the very act of committing adultery'. (Too much detail here!) What are they to do with her? Moses had taught that she should be stoned to death. They turn to Jesus, to show up his fraudulent claims, desperate to trick him – *You're the one with all the smart answers. What are we to do with her?*

In an act of delicious and calculated indifference, Jesus initially ignores them. He bends down and starts writing on the ground with his finger. Was he merely doodling, making patterns in the sand, was he writing specific words, or was he merely giving them time to reflect on their ridiculous self-righteous posturing? He looks up and they are still there. They crowd closer, their anger is growing, they want an answer – and they want it now! He can feel their breath on his face. With more than a hint of exasperation, Jesus gives his answer: Right! This is what you do with her. If you think that Moses was giving specific direction, then I am going to give another. The one who throws the first stone must be the one among you who has never, ever sinned in any way, shape, or form. He bends back down to carry on with his doodling in the sand. They start to drift away from the eldest to the youngest. Their blood lust will have to wait another day. He looks back up. Only the woman stands in front of him. Where has everyone gone? I'm sure there was a crowd here. Where are they? Where are your accusers? Has no-one condemned you? Her breathing is calmer, she is less panicky, less frightened. A moment ago, she was facing certain death, now she is in the company of this man – and he is so peaceful. He more than anyone there could have condemned her – but he chose not to. Neither do I condemn you - go away and don't sin anymore. She wonders if she would be able to live up to this admonition. Probably not, but her starting point is a clean slate. We can only imagine how that makes her feel. She walks back to her house – and how they all stare. She feels their eyes burning into her, but she isn't bothered. She is no longer frightened. They no longer have power over her. She has stood in front of Jesus – and he has made her so much better about herself.

Our difficulty this weekend – hand on heart, have there been occasions when we became part of the baying crowd, or have we always humbly embraced the healing and forgiving love of God. The latter is a much nicer place to be. The former not so.

FINDING THE HIDDEN TREASURE by Benignus O'Rourke

(The Way of Silent Prayer, Darton, Longman & Todd)

Chapter 62 – Standing in Solidarity

Among the many ways our silent prayer prepares us for helping others is one which is rarely recognised: doing nothing. Doing nothing in our time with God enables us to be with others without wanting to do anything. We are content to be there with them in support. We are 'just there'.

In his **Way of the Heart**, addressed to fellow-ministers, Henri Nouwen (a Dutch Catholic priest, professor, writer and theologian) wriote that compassionate solidarity grows in solitude, in silence and stillness. Compassion is the fruit of solitude and the basis of all ministry, he writes. 'In solitude we realise that nothing human is alien to us, that the roots of all conflict, war, injustice, cruelty, hatred, jealousy, and envy are deeply anchored in our own heart.

'In solitude our heart of stone can be turned into a heart of flesh, a rebellious heart into a contrite heart, and a closed

heart into a heart that can open itself to all suffering people in a gesture of solidarity.' And when we stop judging our neighbours, stop evaluating them, we become free to be compassionate.

He advises us not to underestimate how hard it is to be compassionate. 'Compassion is hard because it requires the inner disposition to go with others to the place where they are weak, vulnerable, lonely and broken. But this is not our spontaneous response to suffering. What we desire most is to do away with suffering by fleeing from it or finding a quick cure for it.'

'As busy, active, relevant ministers, we want to earn our bread by making a real contribution. This means first and foremost doing something to show that our presence makes a difference. And so we ignore our greatest gift which is our ability to enter into solidarity with those who suffer.'

Henri Nouwen's message to ministers applies just as much to our own everyday lives, because it is natural for us, too, to want to feel useful, to make a difference. And in our eagerness to help we may be so taken up with our own solutions or plans that we mistake what people really need from us.

But when we truly love, we are content to stand beside others in their struggles and sorrows. When we sit with someone who is in pain or bereaved, broken or confused, without wanting or needing to do, or even say, then we are bringing God's unconditional love and compassion to others.

("When we honestly ask ourselves which persons in our lives mean the most to us, we often find that it is those who, instead of giving much advice, solutions, or cures, have chosen rather to share our pain and touch our wounds with a gentle and tender hand." - Henri Nouwen)
