The Synodality Open Meeting for the Two Parishes - 15 May 2022

Donald Scott writes: ‘Nearly 50 parishioners met in St John's Church Hall during the evening of Sunday 15 May 2022 to consider and discuss all the responses to the Synodal Process. The wealth of material generated since we began the process at the end of March was displayed around the hall for all to read and consider.

This included:

The report we sent to the archdiocese as our contribution to the collective report to Rome.

transcriptions of the 268 questionnaires completed by parishioners in February

'post-it' notes written during the synodal meetings

collations of the 'post-it' note comments

joint governance documents

Key Areas of Parish Life documents

draft copy of the new handbook

The meeting started with a prayer (Charles de Foucauld's Prayer of Abandonment – on the day of his canonization) followed by a guided meditation. We then had a period of listening to each other about what we experienced as the most important themes for our future. We did this in groups of three – giving each person an opportunity to speak while the others listened.

The final part of the evening – in the whole group – was an opportunity for particular issues to be highlighted for us to prioritise. The three themes that emerged were “Young People”, “The Laity” – we noted that the ‘laos’ is the people of God, thus including all people, both lay people and clergy – and, thirdly, “Women in the Church”. A number of individuals volunteered to be involved in working on one of these issues.

There have been two further events after the Open Meeting.

Two groups of parents whose children are involved in sacramental preparation – for first communion and confirmation – came together on 16 and 23 May. These groups engaged with the same process of listening and reflection that we have adopted for the synodality conversations. These also were positive meetings which produced ideas about how we support young people, and also how we take seriously our own spiritual lives as adult disciples.

The other event was a meeting of the St John's Pastoral Council which reflected on the overall experience of the synodality process – with two main conclusions. (We hope before the end of the month to have a similar process at St Mary Magdalene's.)

We felt it was important to follow through with the issues that have been identified so far – the themes teased out at the Open Meeting, and those that emerged from the parents' groups.

At the same time, we felt we should not restrict ourselves to those themes as we continue to travel together in ‘synodality’. Our thinking is that we need to do deeper justice to the written material we have collated by identifying statements and themes that suggest fresh directions and deserve further consideration. A small group will be working on that over the summer period. Anyone who is interested in looking through the typed-up material is also welcomed to be involved in that process.

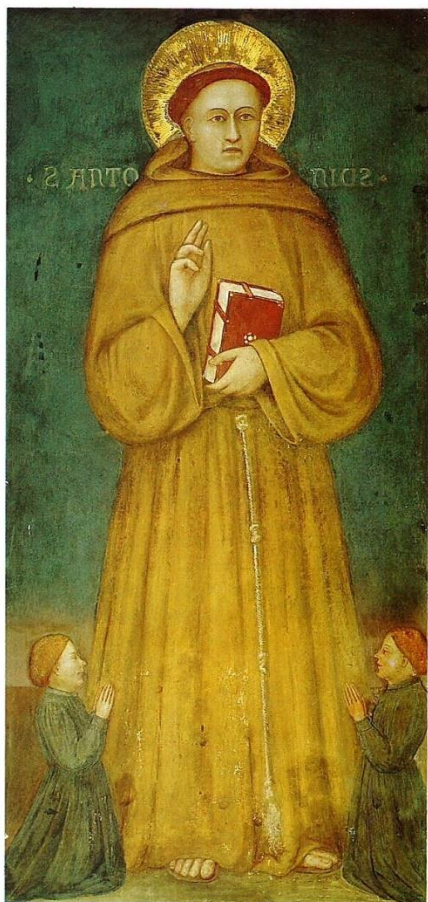

SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST ANTHONY OF PADUA – Feast Day 13 June

Doctor of the Church (1195 – 1231)

*“O Sweet Jesus: what is there sweeter than Thee?
Sweet in Thy memory, sweeter than that of honey or any other object.
Thy very name is a Name of sweetness, a Name of Salvation.
For what does the name Jesus signify, if not Saviour?
Therefore good Jesus, for Thy own sake be to us a Jesus.”*

St. Anthony is among the most popular of all saints. This has less to do with the memory of his spellbinding preaching than with his posthumous career as a miracle-worker. Throughout the centuries Anthony's intercession has been piously sought in matters great and small, with particular homage accorded his knack for locating lost objects. Lost amid this devotion has been much recollection of who St. Anthony was, apart from the fact (important to many of those who most honour his name) that he was Italian. (Actually, Portuguese.)

Anthony was born in Lisbon in 1195 and first entered religious life as an Augustinian canon in Coimbra. There one day he had occasion to wait on a group of five visiting Franciscans who were on the way to Morocco. Anthony was greatly impressed by these courageous missionaries, the more so when news came of their martyrdom and when their remains returned by way of his monastery.

At once Anthony was inspired to apply to the Franciscans. He was accepted and was even granted his wish to follow in the footsteps of the martyrs. But no sooner had he arrived in Morocco than he became so ill that he was forced to turn around. In Italy he attended the famous Franciscan chapter of 1221, the last one held during the lifetime of St. Francis. It was also the last Chapter to which all Friars were invited and was thus, with three thousand brothers in attendance, a considerable jamboree. Afterward Anthony was assigned to a small hospice for lay brothers at Monte Paolo. It was a lowly assignment, befitting a brother

who, up to this time, had shown no remarkable talents.

But soon Anthony's star would shine. When, on an important religious occasion, there was found to be no available preacher, Anthony was asked to extemporize. He proceeded to astonish his audience with the unexpected elegance, conviction, and profound learning of his sermon. Word quickly spread, and Anthony soon received a letter from Francis himself authorizing him to preach and to teach theology to the friars.

Eventually Anthony was sent on a preaching mission that covered all of Italy. Thousands flocked to hear his open-air sermons, and his visits had the impact of a spiritual revival. It was said that men gave up gambling and drinking at the sound of his melodious voice. Criminals were reformed. Feuding enemies were reconciled. For these effects, quite apart from the miracles that adorn his legend, Anthony earned his reputation as the "Wonder Worker."

Anthony's sermons integrated a message of spiritual uplift with a bold challenge to the social vices of the day, especially greed and the practice of usury. He attacked the tyranny of the powerful and was unsparing when it came to the failings of the clergy. "You there, with the mitre!" he addressed one visiting archbishop, apparently in particular need of a prophetic word. He volunteered for hazardous mission tours among the Catharist heretics in southern France. And so successful were his exhortations to charity wherever he preached that he was also well known by the title, "Friend of the Poor."

Weary from his exhausting mission, Anthony died on June 13, 1231, at the age of thirty-six. He was buried in Padua, the city where he had spent the last years of his life. It is a measure of his popularity that Anthony's canonization followed only one year after his death. In 1946 Pope Pius XII declared him also a Doctor of the Church.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR TRINITY SUNDAY

I started looking at this weekend's reading last Sunday. It's part of my routine. I have never been much into routine and have been accused of having a butterfly mentality as I gently move from task to chore and back again. Flit! Skip! Flit! On the routine surrounding the preparation of these few words, I like to think I am much more disciplined. My initial look at the readings is always accompanied by the traditional Catholic prayer: *'Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of thy faithful, and kindle in them the fire of thy love. Send forth thy Spirit and they shall be created. And thou shalt renew the face of the earth.'* I use the prayer often and regularly. I learned it at Primary School (we had no choice) and I'm glad I did. It has served me well throughout the intervening years. Whenever I found myself struggling for a handle on the readings, He has always come to my aid. He has never declined my invitation, unlike me, who over the years have declined many invitations, often with excuses so flimsy as to rival Nottingham Lace. ('We're having a street party to celebrate the Jubilee. Would you like to come?' 'Sorry, I can't. I'm booked in for brain surgery that day!') No, I cannot think of one occasion when the Holy Spirit, ignored or declined my request: *Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts....*

Back to the weekly "reflection". Sometimes the words fall onto the screen almost with a life of their own. On other occasions it's like trying to fill a water-bowl with no more than a dripping tap. Our domestic situation this week had me focussed on this issue of water. We're very lucky in that our water comes deep from the bowels of the earth in this part of the world. We're on a bore hole and the water is beautifully soft, with no residual smell or aftertaste experienced by many on a mains water supply. It is tested regularly and has a purity-level in excess of 98%. Cup of tea or glass of water? The water invariably wins. During our tenancy, one issue has baffled three different plumbers. The ground floor is open plan with the kitchen area at the far end. Every now and again, with both taps firmly in the off position, the flow of water will burst into life for no more than a second or two. The sink is stainless steel and can resound a bit like a drum! We're used to it now, but it still retains its capacity to startle when it coincides with a particularly scary moment of a TV drama. (I enjoy being made to jump by something on TV – but I don't need the plumbing to give a hand!) This week the water sprites have been particularly busy!

Water is very reassuring. It's always just there. We don't have to walk for 5 or 6 miles with containers to bring back dirty, disease-ridden water. We just turn on a tap, or the sprinkler in the garden, or use a hose pipe on the car. In so much of the world, water is taken for granted. We might struggle for clean air, but water is usually at our beck and call. Am I the same in my relationship with God? Do I take Him for granted, just expect that He will always be there? Do I need to remind myself again and again that He gave first - just as He loved me first? Do I ever spare more than a passing thought for those for whom faith is a struggle, as much of a struggle as the trek for water faced by millions every day? Am I like the flitting butterfly, loitering on a nectar laden flower and avoiding less productive foliage?

I have always been certain that all the words come because I first invited the Holy Spirit to help me. As Paul says in today's second reading: *the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit.* In today's Gospel passage, Jesus promises: *I still have many things to say to you, but they would be too much for you now. But when the Spirit of truth comes, he will lead you to the complete truth....* Jesus is the manifestation of God, when we listen to Jesus we listen to the Father, when we stand in witness to Him, we do so because of the Spirit of Truth dwelling in each of us.

Today we are invited to engage with the life-giving presence of Father, Son, and Holy Ghost - One God, three persons - a Trinity of love - the Holy Trinity. We are called to deepen our relationship and understanding of the God of Love. Above all else, we are invited to love Him, to drink from his fountain, to savour the taste of the beautifully soft, pure water, feel it running down our chin and onto our clothes: *Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of thy faithful and kindle in them the fire of thy love. Send forth thy Spirit and they shall be created...*
