Our Next Synodality Steps – and a date for your diary – SUNDAY 15 MAY

Donald Scott writes: 'We now have a wealth of ideas, reflections and heartfelt responses as a result of the tremendous engagement in the synod process from both parishes. This came in different forms including the 268 questionnaires that folk completed on paper or online, and the post-it notes filled in at the 11 synodality meetings. We also have comments from friends in other churches in Portobello as well as the results of a questionnaire to senior pupils at Holyrood High School.

What is the next step?

Pope Francis has emphasised the contribution of all members of the Church in shaping our direction in the future. We want to continue that emphasis as we reflect on the significance for our life locally of what has come to the surface so far – this is about the whole community's engagement.

On Sunday 15 May we have booked the St John's church hall for a 2-Parish Event from 7 to 9.30 pm. All the material from questionnaires and meetings will be on display in the hall, along with information about what is already going on in the parishes. The event will be organised so that people are able to

look at and absorb the range of thoughts, feelings, hopes and visions that have been expressed. We will give time to reflection, listening and sharing in small groups along with prayerful silence. By the end of the evening, we hope that together we will have 'discerned' a way forward for our parishes as we look to the future. And by then we will deserve the refreshments/synodal party that will wind up the event!

The experience so far has confirmed that everyone has something important to say. Please do plan to be with us on 15 May.'

Deacon Eddie writes: 'Holy Week was quite a full-on week for livestreaming, and we would like to thank the whole team again, as ever. We streamed eleven services and Masses through the week (with one or two issues as we are at the moment having to use a laptop that was already deemed as "old" 2 years ago) A special thanks to Enrico for streaming the epic 2 Hours and 35 minutes of the Easter Vigil, and to Emily for the technically challenging Stations of the Cross on Monday - as well as Fergus and Jayden for bringing our first ever outside broadcast from Brighton Park on Palm Sunday. We are always seeking to push the boundaries...

Livestreaming was borne out of necessity and yet has offered some very fruitful interactions with our local and wider community. The concerns of some, across the world, that livestreaming would mean people would never return to the Church has proven not to be the case. Instead, we see more housebound parishioners – and many others, here and from much further afield - being able to engage with Mass daily and and also with the Stations

of the Cross and other Prayer Services. For this reason, we are keen to keep offering Livestreams whenever we can....

However, this requires a bigger team to be prepared to offer these experiences to all those who need it. Three of our squad, Jayden, Ashkin and Fergus, are all in High School and so they are all at school during the day – as am I – and the rest of the team have jobs as well, meaning weekday Masses are very much in need of extra support.

We do sometimes get online comments about sound quality etc - all we would wish people to know is that we are all doing our best and often dealing with difficulties beyond our control. We, therefore, are in need of 2 different types of help:

- We are in need of one or two people who would be willing to set up the equipment in the morning before Mass and set it streaming (ie plug in 2 USB plugs and open up the one software program) and point the camera in the correct location.
- To make this more manageable and less unpredictable, we will also need two new laptops (one for each parish) which will enable us to provide more reliable streaming for the next few years too. If anyone is in a position to help with a donation towards these, it would be gratefully received too.



A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER – JOHN 20:19-31

(The author of this reflection lives in Northumberland)

Living in a part of Northumberland where there is very little light pollution, the night-sky on a clear evening is something to behold. Over 30 years ago, I spent a few days in the Kielder area on what might have been loosely termed as an outward-bound event. We slept outdoors, a plastic 'tarpaulin' over the top of a feather and down sleeping bag. We were not allowed within 20 metres of each other. Hearing became accentuated as the night creatures went about their survival business inches from my head. It was the stars, however, that stole the show. Lying on my back, I stared up into the inky blackness. The more I looked, the more stars and planets I saw. I was a time-traveller, staring back into time - for the light I was seeing had started heading towards my tiny brain millions of years before. It will continue to shine long after my permission to stay on this earth has expired. I felt very humble and privileged to be in that space and touching eternity

This week I have learned a great deal about Boötes Void. The first thing I learned is that it's pronounced 'Boytes' Void. (The umlaut make all the difference!). It is a huge area of emptiness, lying some 700 million light years from earth and its diameter is estimated at 165 million light years. Given its size, the area should house thousands of galaxies but contains only a few, a mere handful. Predominantly, it is nothingness., an empty void defying comprehension. It's difficult for us to get our heads around the concept of a light year. We are 93 million miles from the Sun, and this is referred to as an 'astronomical unit'. There are just over 63,000 Astronomical Units in a light year and by comparison, and quite spookily, there are just over 63,000 inches in a mile. (I loved Maths at school, and I continue to marvel at how much of an influence maths has on everything around us.) A light year is a huge distance. 700 million light years leaves us feeling even more insignificant. I love information like this; I love trying to visualise nothingness. I love the sheer vastness of the creation that surrounds little old me. I first learned to pray, by trying to visualise nothingness, because once I was able to go there, then there was room for God to come in. It's easy for me to believe and accept the findings of science. Not everyone shares my faith in this area. My closest friend does not believe that Neil Armstrong ever stepped onto the surface of the moon. He genuinely believes that we are victims of a great confidence trick, dreamed up in Hollywood. Like Thatcher he is not for turning – and so my frustration grows. He will share the view through my telescope, but he will not be tricked into a belief in lunar colonisation. I have met a few people who firmly believe in the time frame suggested by the Bible and that creation is just a few thousand years old. I will never be able to interest them in Boötes Void – let alone convince them of its existence.

This weekend we meet Thomas, doubting Thomas, whose first cry was: Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands, and until I can put my finger into those holes, then I refuse to believe. In a short space of time – and much less than a light year – Thomas has changed his cry. This time he is present as Jesus appears in their midst. His initial scepticism has changed into five simple words: My Lord and my God. Faith is a journey; our journey, though similar in many ways to that of Thomas is as unique as we are. Sometimes our faith is strong, sometimes weak. From time to time, it seems that the bottom has fallen out of our world: a personal disaster, the death of someone we love, a betrayal. We flounder and struggle. The word 'why' is never too far away in our hearts and minds. We search for God – but he doesn't seem to hear our cries. We cannot get even a glimpse. On occasion we struggle to find God amid the evil that threatens to swamp us and overwhelm us. We turn on the news and we see Satan, and only manage glimpses of God. It seems that we're hanging on by our fingertips. Then there are moments of intense joy; our heart is light, our spirits lifted, it may be a piece of music or prose, or an unexpected kindness shown to us. We feel the nearness of God and we can say My Lord and my God. Sometimes our view of the night sky is spoiled by the presence of low cloud. 'Last night everything was so clear. Tonight, there's no view at all'. The stars haven't gone just because we cannot see them. They are there. God is there, too. Seek the emptiness, search for the void and he will come flooding in. Look up at the sky. Look at the black space between the stars and planets. Somewhere in that blackness sits Boötes Void. Stare and marvel for you are travelling back in time, back to the heart of God.

A REFLECTION FOR DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY BY MGR JOSEPH PRIOR

"The Lord is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia!" "He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia, Alleluia!"

Our celebration of the Lord's resurrection continues today as we observe Divine Mercy Sunday. The celebration recalls the great love that the Lord of Life pours out on us in his resurrection. God created us in love, has redeemed us in love and sustains us in his love. Today we are reminded that the gift of divine mercy is showered upon us, delivering us from sin and fear. The Gospel passage for today's liturgy recalls one of Jesus' encounters with the disciples following his resurrection. The disciples are gathered in a locked room filled with fear. They are distraught as what has happened to Jesus.

So much has happened in a few short days. Jesus had been welcomed to such acclaim in Jerusalem in the beginning of the week. Then he was betrayed and arrested while at prayer in the garden. Most of the disciples fled at this point. Peter stayed but caved in fear when he denied the Lord three times. Then came the trial, scourging and cross. Now the tomb is empty. Fear and confusion are intermingled with a glimpse of hope. Jesus enters the locked room and immediately greets them with "Peace be with you!" Sensing their state of shock, he shows them his hands and side. Again, he offers them peace, this time saying: "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

The peace Jesus offers is a sign of mercy and reconciliation. He forgives them but also forgives all. This message of mercy is to be carried far and wide by the apostles and disciples. The first reading recalls an early stage of the spread of the Gospel. Peter has heard the call of Jesus and is bringing the message of mercy to many in Jerusalem. Soon that same message will be carried throughout the world. The message continues to be spread today.

St John Paul II, recognizing the need for the message of mercy to be highlighted, designated this "Second Sunday of Easter" as "Divine Mercy Sunday." We live in a fragile, broken world. This year we are witnessing the horrors of an unprovoked aggressive war in Ukraine. Millions of people are directly affected. In addition to the death of brave soldiers, civilians, including the children and babies, are mercilessly killed.

Perhaps this is the most vivid example today of the fragile state of humanity. The last century with its epoch of wars and destruction were a distant memory until the recent events forced us to remember. The fragility of mankind is seen in the precursors to war such as fear, greed, lack of trust, broken relationships, pride and power. This coupled with the ever-growing discrepancy between the ultra-wealthy and the rest of the population seem to help spread those precursors to other parts of the world.

It is into this world, fragile as it is, that Jesus sends his message of mercy: "Peace be with you."

St. Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938), a young Polish nun, had several visions of Jesus who asked her to be a messenger of mercy. In one of those visions St. Faustina saw the image of Christ with two rays, one of red and one of white, coming forth from his risen body. The image recalls the pouring forth of divine mercy. Paintings of the image have circulated throughout the world coupled with the recitation of the chaplet as a message of mercy for a broken world.

Jesus' victory over sin and death comes with his resurrection. He took upon himself the worst of human suffering and affliction. In doing so, he gives the greatest witness of love: "to lay down one's life for one's friends." The resurrection breaks the power of sin and death. Nothing has the power to destroy God's love for us. It is in that love that he continues to pour out his mercy — the mercy that heals, strengthens, restores and enlivens hope. We celebrate that mercy today.

The mercy that God pours out in his Son is for the whole of humanity as well as for each human being. He knows each one of us by name just as he knew Peter, Thomas, John Paul and Faustina. Today we celebrate that love that sees us through fear to peace, death to life, suffering to relief, sorrow to consolation, grief to joy, and confusion to understanding.

As we recognize his mercy in our lives, we also hear the call to go forth and share the message of mercy, and the most effective way is to live mercy, to forgive as we have been forgiven, to love as we have been loved.

"The Lord is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia!" "He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia, Alleluia!"
