



Last Sunday, Jeremy Thorp stood down from his leadership of the St John's 9.30am Music Group. Donald Scott, violinist in the group (and St John's Pastoral Council Chair), has written the following appreciation:



has been around the parish or involved with Faith and Light. What may not be so clear is the role he has played in facilitating the music group that makes so important a contribution in our worship.

As a group we are very disparate in age, skill levels and confidence. We are also not all able to be there every Sunday, so it can be unpredictable who is present and which instruments or voices are available. That is not an easy foundation on which to create a coherent or worshipful sound. We gather about 45 minutes before the mass begins and there is always a welcome for all. After a few singing warm-ups we run through the music and agree arrangements – who will lead the singing for the psalm or the Kyrie and how to get the expression of each hymn right. Jeremy has operated as a music director, leading that process, but in a way that has been encouraging and also taking on board suggestions from others. He has brought out the gifts that we bring, often placing confidence in those who may not have all that much confidence in themselves.

All of this – which has made it a joy to be part of the group – is in addition to all the backroom work, including recently uploading music to a Dropbox so that we are equipped for the Sunday morning.

So – thank you Jeremy for what you have given to the Parish and also to those of us fortunate to have joined you in the music group.





'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – The Prophet Isaiah

Prophet (eighth century BC) – Feast Day - 19 December

"I was ready to be sought by those who did not ask for me;
I was ready to be found by those who did not seek me.
I said, 'Here am I, here am I,' to a nation that did not call on my name."

It is very likely that Isaiah began his career as a priest in the Temple in Jerusalem. It was there that he received his prophetic call. It began with a vision: "I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and his train filled the temple." When the prophet bewailed his "unclean lips," an angel flew down and touched his mouth with a burning coal, thus burning his sins away. "And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' Then I said, 'Here am I! Send me.'"

Isaiah's career as a prophet took place against a bewildering backdrop of international politics. Caught between mighty empires, the rulers of Jerusalem sought to maintain the kingdom's independence by striking a series of opportunistic alliances, first with one foreign power, then another. Isaiah believed that by trusting in such military alliances - in essence, by trusting in swords - Israel was losing sight of its ultimate dependence on God. The result would be disaster.

Isaiah's oracles are filled with painful references to the disobedience, apostasy, and hypocrisy he perceived around him: The poor are oppressed; the nation bows down to idols of security and affluence. Under these circumstances all the fine sacrifices in the Temple have become an abomination. Rather than offer prayers with bloody hands, the people had better wash themselves, "cease to do evil, learn to do good; seek justice, correct oppression; defend the fatherless, plead for the widow." In other words, Isaiah called for a return to Israel's primitive trust and faith in Yahweh, a faith expressed in humility and the works of justice and mercy. His hope was that the people would see the light and embrace this course voluntarily. Failing that, he made the extraordinary claim that Assyria and Israel's enemies would be God's instruments for chastising and correcting an errant nation.

Yet along with his grave warnings and denunciation, Isaiah's message was marked by a strong current of annunciation. He believed that destruction would not be the last word. Though it would be cleansed and purified through suffering, the nation would not be destroyed. God's promises would be fulfilled, if only through a remnant of survivors.

He even named his son She-ar-jashub, meaning "a remnant shall return."

Isaiah leavened his message with the promise of a future Messiah and a vision of the peaceable kingdom to come. Later Christians would seize on these prophecies as references to Jesus:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shined....
For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

It is difficult for Christians to read these words without hearing the joyous strains of Handel's *Messiah*. If so, it is important to recall how much of Isaiah's hope remains to be fulfilled. In the messianic age which he prophesied,

They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; One nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again.

In that age,

The wolf shall be the guest of the lamb and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; The calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them.

Isaiah's active mission lasted at least forty years, from 742 B.C.E. to about 701, and possibly longer. So influential was his voice that he inspired a tradition of ongoing reflection that would continue in his name for another two hundred years.

The later prophets who wrote in his name applied Isaiah's perspective to the events of their day - the fall of Jerusalem, the exile to Babylon, and the eventual return. In the light of the sufferings and humiliation of Israel they dispensed with the oracles of destruction and gave even greater emphasis to Isaiah's consoling vision of the messianic age.

Thus, Israel is compared to a "suffering servant" who by his vicarious suffering serves to reconcile a sinful humanity to God:

Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows... But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that made us whole, and with his stripes we are healed.

The book of Isaiah ends with a vision of cosmic fulfillment: "a new heaven and a new earth," wherein justice and peace shall dwell. It is an open vision that still retains its hope and challenge.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR CHRISTMAS DAY – LUKE 2:1-14

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

'Rachel! RACHEL!' 'What is it? Keep your voice down, you'll wake the guests.' 'There's a young couple at the door. They can't find anywhere to stay. The girl looks like she's about to have a baby. She seems to be in labour. They're desperate for a bed. He's past himself with worry. He's as pale as she is flushed. I've told them we're full – but I cannot just close the door in their faces. You'll have to come down. We'll have to do something'. Rachel came down the stairs, quickly taking in the tableau before her. She barked at Zeb – 'Go and make some space in the stable. Clear the animals into one stall; they can use the stable. Then put down some fresh bedding – lots of fresh bedding – they're going to have to stay here. That's the only space we have left. There isn't time for anything else – this baby is on its way. Quick! Get moving! I'll put some water on to heat and I'll go and get some old sheets.' Turning to the couple, she told them to step inside into the warmth while she and Zeb busied themselves. 'You'll be welcome here. We'll sort something out for you. Hang on and try not to worry'.

The next couple of hours passed in a blur, the next few days less so. Both Rachel and Zeb looked on, ready to help if needed but the two kids – for that is how they appeared to them – seemed to know exactly what was needed. They were very natural parents. 'Wwaaahhh' – a healthy pair of lungs announced the arrival of a fifth person to the gathering. They discovered their names, and the name of Joseph's tribe but then Rachel and her husband left the couple to get used to the new arrival. Rachel popped in every few hours to check that all was OK. She continued to call in daily. What she could never understand was the number of visitors – total strangers. The census had brought families and tribes back together. Friends and family were reacquainted. The mood was good, and knowing that the census would quickly be over, people were keen to make the most of their time together. There's nothing like a new baby to attract people but the number of complete strangers showed that this baby was different. Visitors were drawn from miles around – carrying all manner of gifts. All came to visit this baby. Zeb found himself with several lambs – gifts from some of the visitors. Joseph had said that he wouldn't be able to take them with him, would Zeb be willing to take them as part payment?

Zeb and Rachel sat in front of their fire. The light was beginning to fade even as the advancing years had them doing less and thinking more. Rachel put down her sewing as Zeb added another log. 'I was thinking of that year of the baby' – for that was how they both referred to that night that outshone all other nights. 'What brought that on?' 'I don't know – just some bizarre talk in the town about a new prophet – but this one appears to be different. I just wondered if the two were connected. There was something different about that night – so many strangers – and do you remember, there always seemed to be music but we never knew where it came from?' Rachel said: 'There's so much I don't understand about that time. I just know that we couldn't refuse to be involved. The minute you opened the door, we **were** involved – and I have always viewed it as a night when God's light shone on and for us. Anyway! Look at us now – is there anyone stronger and happier than we? And all because we got involved and did what we could. No more, no less.' She abruptly changed tack: 'I'll go and heat some milk. It's time for bed!'

Zeb stared into the dying embers, reflecting on the fact that she was right – again. We give of ourselves, and never say no when the other option is to say yes. They had already been working flat out - readying beds and preparing suppers. They were exhausted and had called an end to the day. Rachel had already gone to bed when he heard the door. That was it: he opened the door, and, from that moment, they were involved.

The Christmas message is quite simple. God decided to get involved – with us, you and me. He got involved. Having chosen to be involved he needed Mary and Joseph, the Innkeeper and his wife. Likewise, he needs us. Herein lies the essence of the Incarnation. The Word of God **was made flesh**, he walked with us, drank our water, shared our bread. He got involved that we might be involved. We cannot leave it to others. It's our job, our responsibility. Some are telling Archbishop Justin Welby to shut up and go away, to stop sticking his nose into politics. Thankfully, he is ignoring such calls for he – like us – **is** involved. We are involved because God is involved, and we are his followers. From crude wooden manger to crude wooden cross, and everything in-between – He is involved.
