Eighth Sunday of the Year - 27 February 2022



Fr Jock writes: ‘Today we begin the **Synodal Process** in our two parishes by inviting everyone during Mass to fill in a **questionnaire** during the time we normally listen to a homily. (The children will also have the opportunity to offer their own thoughts about the Church - how it is and what it could be – during Children’s Liturgy.)

In addition, we hope people will **take away** with them a **slightly different questionnaire** which we will give out at the end of Mass and encourage a Catholic friend - who perhaps has distanced themselves from the community that gathers weekly - to fill it in; and we intend to invite **our friends from other Churches** to participate and offer their views and insights about how we come across to them.

Finally, we invite all who wish to participate in **Synodal Conversations** in the 9 days from 5 March to 14 March to sign up for a group – see on page 3 of the newsletter.

Pope Francis’ aim in all this is that we gradually become a **different kind of church** – less one that can come across as hierarchical, authoritarian and clerical, but rather one in which we all seek to listen carefully to each other and to walk together in the path of the gospel...’

Lent begins this Wednesday, 2 March – Ash Wednesday. There will be **Mass** at 10am at St John's and 7.00pm at St Mary Magdalene's. It is one of only two days in the Year of **Fasting and Abstinence**.

In addition, in response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, **Pope Francis** has made Ash Wednesday a special **Day of Prayer and Fasting for Peace**. Speaking at the end of last Wednesday's General Audience, he said "I encourage believers in a special way to dedicate themselves intensely to prayer and fasting on that day. May the Queen of Peace preserve the world from the madness of war." Can we hold in our hearts the suffering people of the Ukraine?

Congratulations to the Candidates and Catechumens in our RCIA Group

Our RCIA group – for those interested in becoming fully initiated Catholics - has been meeting since November. Because of our Covid-delayed start, we have combined the first two stages - Enquiry and Catechumenate. Therefore, the third stage – the Lenten time of Preparation for Baptism or Reception at the Easter Vigil on 16 April – will begin with the Rite of Election at the Cathedral on the first Sunday of Lent, 6 March, when all the catechumens and candidates from all over the archdiocese gather with Archbishop Cushley.

This Sunday, at the 9.30am Mass at St John's, we send them off with our prayers and encouragement with the 'Rite of pre-Inscription and Recognition'... please pray for our four catechumens (those who are to be baptised), **Shannon McCaughey, Simon Brown, James Sutherland** (sadly, unable to be with us this Sunday) and **Scott Craig**, and for our four candidates, **Agnes Aitken, Jenna Ciancia, Louise Holden and Michelle Dunleavey**.

The themes that emerge will contribute both to what we send to the Diocese and directly to Rome as our contribution to the worldwide synod.

Lee Patterson’s Tears of the Mother (in the Lady Chapel at St John’s in Lent)



Over Lent and through to Easter there will be small artwork in the Lady Chapel, entitled ‘Tears of the Mother’. Inspired by seven traditional prayers to Our Lady of Sorrows (the dolours or sorrows), the seven small vessels are made of salt and water; the stuff of tears. There are prayer sheets that introduce the traditional prayers and also offer contemporary reflections to accompany the work. 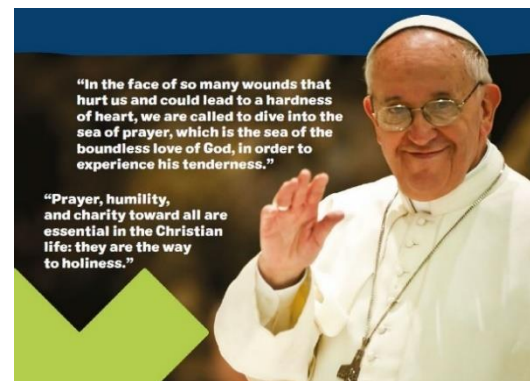

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE EIGHTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - LUKE 6:39-45

‘Of course, I love you.’ She heard the words but didn’t feel them in the embrace. He was colder, more distant, more aloof. She thought they had once loved each other but now she wasn’t so sure. Trust had been evaporating for some time now, the flame had been flickering, struggling, and now, she feared it was about to flicker for one last time and die. She continued to hang on – more in hope than expectation. Like a small dinghy caught on the tide, she could feel that he was slipping away from her, and she sensed he had neither the strength nor the will to fight the current. Why couldn’t he just be honest? Honesty might be painful to bear, but at least that pain would be far easier to carry than the constant uncertainty she now faced. Long ago, she had realised, that truth was the lifeblood in any relationship. When truth and truthfulness go.....

If we haven’t experienced such a scenario in our own lives, we know others for whom this has been all too vivid a reality. If last weekend’s Gospel (*Be compassionate....do not judge...grant pardon*) hit the spot, then this weekend’s passage is no less direct. *A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart.....for a man’s words flow out of what fills his heart.* There is no room for manoeuvre here, and Jesus’ words leave no room for dilution or diminution.

For the last ten days or so, we have watched helplessly as various politicians and world leaders have used a great number of words. Many of these words fell on deaf ears. The ‘West’ heard words of peace but didn’t feel them. The ‘East’ represented by Russia heard words of non-aggression but clearly didn’t believe those words; they moved their military forces to bolster their own safety and protect against threats, whether real or perceived. As I type these few words, I am reminded of Albert Einstein’s apocalyptic warning. ‘I know not with what weapons World War III will be fought, but World War IV will be fought with sticks and stones.’ As a full-blooded male, (admittedly one who hopefully is very much in touch with his feminine side!) I must confess that I am increasingly coming to the conviction that if male leaders were replaced with women, the world would be a much safer place! Males invariably want to strut. I think this crisis has been calling out for Angela Merkel. She always seemed to know how to engage with Vladimir Putin. Like a stern headmistress she seemed to metaphorically bark: ‘Be quiet, sit up straight and listen!’ I cannot recall him ever strutting with her. She was never going to be swayed by a ‘strut’. To her, a strut would be as water off a duck’s back!

If we are living through scary and perilous times, then we are reminded that truth, as always, is the first casualty in any war. My friend at the top of this reflection craved the truth. ‘Be honest with me – is there someone else?’ ‘Of course, there isn’t’ - the words rang hollow., and in their emptiness she was given a glimpse of the painful certainty that lay ahead. At his trial, when he stood before Pilate, Jesus told those listening that those who are on the side of Truth listen to his voice

Each weekend, in our Sunday readings, God gives us a kind of ‘compact mirror’, something we can hold up to ourselves – not the person next to us, or the person over there - ourselves. We look in the mirror, and forensically examine our response to His Gospel. We aren’t going to make a huge difference in the world of geo-politics, but we can certainly make a difference nearer home. *We can draw from the well of goodness that dwells in our hearts...because our words will flow from what lies there.* We can be brave. We must ensure that our words of witness to the Gospel are met with effective deeds. We are obliged to act. We cannot leave it to someone else. We cannot decline to get involved. Let me leave a practical thought with you as you look into your own ‘compact’. The existence of Food Banks here in the UK is a national disgrace. They aren’t ‘marvellous’ because ‘they demonstrate the generosity of the British people’ as one MP has claimed. Their existence is obscene and disgusting, they should not need to exist. There should be no doubting our feelings on the matter. I cannot claim to be a follower of Jesus if I remain mute in the face of such injustice. The corollary is equally frightening: I cannot do nothing and then claim to be a follower of Jesus Christ. People will hear my words, but they will also hear their hollow sound. Yes, I support foodbanks with items from my weekly shop, but I also continue to do all I can to ensure their eradication. I continue to hold those responsible to account. And if my MP is sick of my letters on the subject, well, to quote the British Comedian, Catherine Tate: *I ain’t bothered.*

FINDING THE HIDDEN TREASURE by Benignus O'Rourke

(The Way of Silent Prayer, Darton, Longman & Todd LTD)

Chapter 58 – Partners

One of my favourite passages in literature comes from Hermann Hesse's **The Glass Bead Game**. It is important to me because it mirrors how I see God working in our lives, our partnership with him. I give the passage in full as it seems so powerful.

Young Joseph Knecht is being put forward for a place in the best school of music in the land. The day comes when he has to present himself to a master who comes to assess him. Pale with fright, he runs to the dormitory. Trembling, he takes his violin and exercise book, and goes to wait in the practice room. A man enters the room...

'A very old man, it seemed to him at first, not very tall, white-haired, with a fine, clear face and penetrating, light-blue eyes. The gaze of those eyes might have been frightening, but they were serenely cheerful as well as penetrating, neither laughing nor smiling, but filled with a calm, quietly radiant cheerfulness. He shook hands with the boy, nodded, and sat down with deliberation on the stool in front of the old practice piano ...

"Come, let's make a little music together." 'Knecht had already taken out his violin. The old man struck the A, and the boy tuned. Then he looked inquiringly, anxiously, at the Music Master.

"What would you like to play?" the Master asked.

'The boy could not say a word. He was filled to the brim with awe of the old man. Never had he seen a person like this. Hesitantly, he picked up his exercise book and held it out to the Master.

"No," the Master said, "I want you to play from memory, and not an exercise but something easy that you know by heart. Perhaps a song you like."

'Knecht was confused, and so enchanted by this face and those eyes that he could not answer. He was deeply ashamed of his confusion, but unable to speak. The Master did not insist. With one finger, he struck the first notes of a melody and looked questioningly at the boy. Joseph nodded and at once played the melody with pleasure. It was one of the old songs which were often sung in school.

"Once more," the Master said.

'Knecht repeated the melody, and the old man now played a second voice to go with it. Now the old song rang through the small practice room in two parts.

"Once more." Knecht played, and the Master played the second part, and a third part also. Now the beautiful old song rang through the room in three parts.
