This Eastertide is celebrated in a time of conflict and confusion, a time of war in Europe that may make us ask the question “Where are you Lord?”

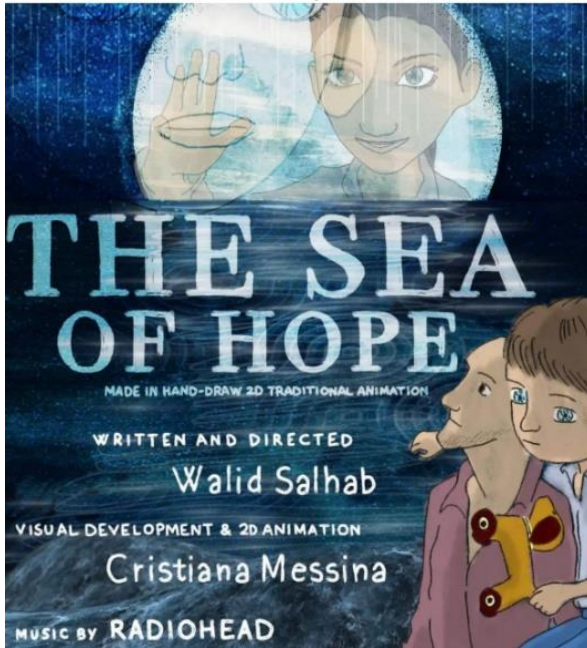

Our Next Synodality Steps – and a date for your diary – SUNDAY 15 MAY

Donald Scott writes: ‘We now have a wealth of ideas, reflections and heartfelt responses as a result of the tremendous engagement in the synod process from both parishes. This came in different forms including the 268 questionnaires that folk completed on paper or online, and the post-it notes filled in at the 11 synodality meetings. We also have comments from friends in other churches in Portobello as well as the results of a questionnaire to senior pupils at Holyrood High School.

What is the next step?

Pope Francis has emphasised the contribution of all members of the Church in shaping our direction in the future. We want to continue that emphasis as we reflect on the significance for our life locally of what has come to the surface so far – this is about the whole community’s engagement.

On Sunday 15 May we have booked the St John’s church hall for a 2-Parish Event from 7 to 9.30 pm. All the material from questionnaires and meetings will be on display in the hall, along with information about what is already going on in the parishes. The event will be organised so that people are able to look at and absorb the range of thoughts, feelings, hopes and visions that have been expressed. We will give time to reflection, listening and sharing in small groups along with prayerful silence. By the end of the evening, we hope that together we will have ‘discerned’ a way forward for our parishes as we look to the future. And by then we will deserve the refreshments/synodal party that will wind up the event!

The experience so far has confirmed that everyone has something important to say. Please do plan to be with us on 15 May.’

We're also looking... for people willing to help with LIVESTREAMING

Deacon Eddie writes: 'In recent weeks we have had technical issues (through having to use a laptop that was already deemed as "old" 2 years ago). Livestreaming was borne out of necessity and yet has offered some very fruitful interactions with our local and wider community. The concerns of some, across the world, that livestreaming would mean people would never return to the Church has proven not to be the case. Instead, we see more housebound parishioners – and many others, here and from much further afield - being able to engage with Mass daily and also with the Stations of the Cross, Benediction and other Prayer Services. For this reason, we are keen to keep offering Livestreams whenever we can.....

However, this requires a bigger team to be prepared to offer these experiences to all those who need it. Three of our very generous squad, Jayden, Ashkin and Fergus, are all in High School and so they are all at school during the day – as am I – and the rest of the team have jobs as well, meaning weekday Masses are very much in need of extra support.

We do sometimes get online comments about sound quality etc – all we would wish people to know is that we are all doing our best and often dealing with difficulties beyond our control.

We, therefore, are in need of 2 different types of help:

- **We are in need of one or two people who would be willing to set up the equipment in the morning before Mass and set it streaming (ie plug in 2 USB plugs and open up the one software program) and point the camera in the correct location.**
- To make this more manageable and less unpredictable, we have now purchased two new laptops (one for each parish) which will enable us to provide more reliable streaming for the next few years too. **If anyone is in a position to help with a donation towards these, it would be gratefully received too.**

A Statement from Justice and Peace Scotland on the UK government 'Refugee Offshoring' (to Rwanda...) Policy Announcement

The following statement is a response to the UK government's announcement that they plan to use offshoring facilities in **Rwanda** for the processing of asylum claims for those deemed to have entered the UK illegally.

'The Home Secretary has updated Parliament on the UK – Rwanda Memorandum of Understanding which was widely reported and signed over Easter.

Before Christmas Pope Francis reminded us Jesus solemnly tells us that He is present in the stranger, in the refugee, in those who are naked and hungry, and He is offended when we abandon them to indifference.

We share the concerns expressed by the UNHCR and across the faith and civic sectors that the UK government's plans to refuse to consider claims for asylum, and to transport asylum seekers to Rwanda break both international and UK law. We share the concerns expressed about the human rights situation in Rwanda, which for all its qualities, there remain serious concerns about.

As Pope Francis tells us; Let us stop ignoring reality, stop constantly shifting responsibility, stop passing off the issue of migration to others, as if it mattered to no one and was only a pointless burden to be shouldered by somebody else!'



A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER - JOHN 21:1-19

How many times have we been warned: *The devil is in the detail?* We ignore detail at our peril – though I have never met anyone yet who conscientiously reads all the conditions before clicking the box that says: ‘I have read and accept the conditions?’ Apple are possibly one of the worst offenders. So desperate are we for the nice shiny new iPhone, that we click ‘accept’ whilst paying scant attention to the 13 pages of conditions, and often oblivious to the simple truth Apple will ‘own’ much of our personal data. We just want the new phone! The same will most likely be true for our online energy account, our online banking access and so on. One thing is certain, the details won’t be there for our benefit! *The devil is in the detail.* There are other ‘details’ that are there for our pleasure and development – the brushwork of a fine painting by one of the Masters, a piece of prose.

I caught this morning, morning’s minion, kingdom of daylight’s dauphin; dapple-dawn-drawn falcon in his riding of the rolling level underneath him, steady air, and striding. High there, how he rung upon the rein of a wimpling-wind. My expression of; ‘Isn’t it a beautiful morning?’ pales nakedly against the words of Gerard Manley Hopkins. I had to learn this piece at School – and how I hated the exacting teacher who insisted on the correct rhythm and intonation, as well as the correct words. But, I so appreciate his insistence now. Some detail is reassuring. These last few nights in the UK have seen very clear skies and some spectacular sunsets. I could say: ‘Have you seen the sunrise - it is absolutely stunning’ or, ‘Tonight, I bask in the glory that sunset is the opening overture to the opera of the night sky.’ (Mehmet Murat Ildan). Detail can be enriching.

This weekend’s Gospel passage is so rich in symbolism and meaning, and it is rich in detail. Some of this detail can pass us by, if we are not paying attention to the ‘small print’. We can lose ourselves completely and make it a real focus for our prayer this week. We are told that the net was full to breaking point. John suggests that someone had counted the size of the haul for we are told that there are 153 fish. Why count – and why repeat the figure. - why this number? John wrote his Gospel after the fall of Jerusalem and after the destruction of the Temple. His audience was steeped in the Old Testament. They will have known that the construction of the Temple, during the reign of King Solomon, had involved a workforce of 153,000. If John had said there was 153000 fish no one would have believed him. For the people of the Old Testament, 1000 was used to denote a huge figure. The detail would not have been lost on his audience. They would have heard the figure 153 and they would have remembered that at his trial Jesus had prophesied that he would destroy the Temple and in three days build it up. After three days in the tomb, he appeared. The rebuilding was complete. To his audience, the number 153 is completely understandable. Now – I have another of those weird, if spooky, mathematical facts. If we add 1+2+3+4 right up to 17 we get the answer 153. If we split 153 into 1 and 5 and 3 and cube each figure and add them together, the answer is 153! Either I have too much time on my hands, or I am totally odd (likely!) or there is a connection between everything and everyone that points us outside of ourselves, over and over again.

There is another ‘detail’ this weekend. After the miraculous haul, someone shouts ‘*It is the Lord*’. On hearing these words: *Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak around him and leapt into the water.* Why? It’s not something we would do. If we were called upon to jump into a river to rescue someone, we would remove any clothing which was likely to hinder our task. So, what is this ‘detail’ about? Peter will probably have been very proud of his cloak. A cloak didn’t come cheap but was essential in warding off the chill of the night air, particularly if sitting on the lake trying to catch enough fish to make a living. Did he take it with him because he was still addicted to worldly possessions? Or did he take it with him because it represented the baggage of his life? A few days earlier he had denied Jesus three times. The guilty feelings were still real. In a moment of intense spiritual awakening, he realises so much of what Jesus had taught him. Everything now made sense, he would no longer need the security of a cloak for protection. suggested at the beginning of this reflection: *The devil is in the detail.* When it comes to reading and absorbing God’s Word, as presented in the Bible, then the only conclusion we can reach is that *God is in the detail.*
