# Remembrance Sunday

Today is Remembrance Sunday, a day where we commemorate the contribution of the British and Commonwealth military and civilian services in the two World Wars and in later conflicts.

This morning, across the United Kingdom, there are many such ceremonies: many poppy wreaths of remembrance will be laid in towns and villages and there will be a two minutes' silence to respect the memory of those who gave their lives, of those who were injured, of those who returned home to pick up the pieces and of those who never returned. We remember, too, those at home who worked tirelessly as wardens, firefighters and nurses.


These services are always solemn, sincere and sad, particularly the service at the Cenotaph in London which has been televised since 1946,

the longest-running annual live televised event in the world. For so many people who cannot attend, they can watch the programme and pay their own respects privately.

Today is a time to remember, and what many people particularly appreciate is the silence: the two minutes' silence which represents the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918, when the guns of Europe fell silent. It is a silence where our thoughts hold in respect the brave men and woman who took part. It is the only time in our calendar where the whole country falls silent, thinking about something other than their own personal issues. Let us remember them.

Feast of the week

St Frances Xavier Cabrini  
 (1850-1917)

St Frances Xavier Cabrini ("Mother Cabrini") fulfilled her childhood missionary dreams by travelling from Italy to America to impoverished legal and illegal Italian migrants, refugees and domestic workers.

Maria Francesca Cabrini was the youngest of thirteen children, only four of whom survived beyond adolescence. Longing to be a missionary, and foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus (M.S.C.), Pope Leo XIII personally asked her to go "not to the East, but to the West", to New York rather than to China.

Mother Cabrini and six Sisters sailed to New York, where the bishop advised her to return to Italy – but she refused and founded 67 institutions dedicated to caring for people who were poor, abandoned, uneducated and sick.

Afraid of water, Cabrini sailed to Europe at least 30 times to fundraise for her projects, often visiting the Southwark Archdiocese – which explains the Cathedral's shrine in her honour.

In 1917, Mother Cabrini died of malarial complications whilst preparing Christmas sweets for local children.
