n John's Gospel the Baptist is treated in a different fashion from the other Gospels. There is no mention of his austere dress and diet; he does not confront the religious leaders with his fiery criticism; he does not send his disciples to ask Jesus if he is the Messiah. In John's Gospel the Baptist speaks only about Jesus and reveals to others the mystery of his person: "I am the witness that he is the Chosen One of God." John is a man sent by God. He says of Jesus: "I did not know him myself." No one can know Jesus by himself. The Baptist knows him because the truth about Jesus has been revealed to him.

We have all been called to witness to Jesus. We are asked to point away from ourselves to Jesus; we are challenged to lead others

to the person of Jesus. The best way to do that is through our own genuine attachment to the Lord. Many people need help to come to Jesus. None of us comes to him alone. If only we had the courage to speak about Jesus to each other! Most people are moved when others share with them what really matters in their lives. Perhaps we have lost the courage to say any more what matters to us; perhaps we doubt if anyone will care.

We should take courage to share what we believe. With St John Henry Newman, we know that we believe because we love. In the power of that love, let us share our belief with each other.

St Agnes (291-304)

Agnes was possibly aged about 12 or 13 when she died a martyr. Regarded as the patroness of young girls and of rape survivors, Agnes was apparently so beautiful that, disregarding her childhood, several men asked her to marry them. She courageously refused and, according to tradition, declared that she wanted to give herself wholly to God. This did

not go down well with the rich and famous of her day and one of them, Procop, the Governor's son, reported her to his father as a Christian. Agnes refused to deny her Christianity, regardless of the cost and so she was beheaded.

On the feast of St Agnes, the pope blesses two lambs which will be shorn on Holy Thursday. Their wool is woven into the pallium which an archbishop wears as a sign of his authority and union with the pope, who gives it to new archbishops on the feast of Ss Peter and Paul.

What does it mean for the Church, for us today, to be disciples of Jesus, the Lamb of God? It means replacing malice with innocence, replacing power with love, replacing pride with humility, replacing status with service. It is good work! We Christians must do this: replace malice with innocence, replace power with love, replace pride with humility, replace status with service.
