As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee he saw two brothers, Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew; they were making a cast in the lake with their net, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." And they left their nets at once and followed him.

Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. At once, leaving their boat and their father, they followed him.

It is 'a Sunday given over entirely to the word of God, so as to appreciate the inexhaustible riches contained in that constant dialogue between the Lord and his people' - Misericordia et Misera

The Pope says that 'devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the word of God can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of his word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world.'

We are giving out copies of the Gospel according to Matthew (this year's Gospel) at the end of each Mass as a gift (but if anyone wants to help us cover our costs, each copy costs the parish just under £3...Pope Francis is a great believer in the value of keeping a copy of the gospel(s) in one's pocket or handbag!

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – 1

January 22 - Alexander Men (1935-1990)

Orthodox Priest and Martyr

"I have always wanted to be a Christian living not by candlelight, but in the direct light of the sun."


In the last years of the Soviet Union, visitors were often struck by the evidence of widescale spiritual revival. After so many decades of enforced atheist propaganda, it was remarkable to find young people crowding the ancient churches and clamouring for religious instruction. This was on the one hand a reflection of just how deeply rooted was the Orthodox faith in the hearts of the Russian people. But on the other hand it reflected the serious spiritual void which many people had come to experience, a sign of the moral, as well as practical, failure of the communist experiment.

One of the most dynamic figures in the modern revival of Christianity in Russia was the Orthodox priest, Alexander Men. A scholar, pastor, and courageous witness, Men was one of a number of priests who preached the gospel without compromise. Through his writings, preaching, and spiritual direction he had become, by the time of his death, a symbol of the resurgence of spiritual values

in the era of glasnost.

Men was born on January 22, 1935, in the heart of the Stalinist era. He was ordained a priest in 1960. Most of his career was spent in relatively obscure pastoral assignments. Though subject, like all priests, to the threat of harassment and persecution, he was able to carve out his small zone of operation in several churches in the area of Moscow. Through the 1970s he worked quietly to establish small Christian communities which emphasized prayer and Bible study.

Gradually, however, Men began to assume an increasingly visible role. He was known as the "*priest of the intellectuals*," a friend of dissidents like Alexander Solzhenitsyn. But he was also a priest who attracted religious seekers and who was responsible for drawing a widening circle of converts into communion with



My illness, which is progressing in a menacing manner, is only part of the general epidemic. No remedy exists. To move to another less infested region is impossible, and not something I particularly want to do. All that can be done is to believe, to hope, and to continue to live.

But then came the regime of Mikhail Gorbachev, who set in motion a process of reform that quickly assumed its own momentum. The year 1988 marked the celebration of the first Christian millennium in Russia. The government authorized the official observation of this occasion, one of the many signs of change. For the first time Men was able openly to publish his spiritual writings and to offer public lectures on Christianity and the Bible. Despite the public thaw, however, he warned of the challenges to come: "The most difficult moment for the church will come when everything is permitted us. Then we will be ashamed because we are not ready to bear witness." [NB This short pen picture was written in 1997]

For the time being he worked at a frantic pace, as if aware that his time was limited. He said, "At present I am like the sower in the parable. I have been given a unique chance to spread the seed." His work, however, attracted resentment on the part of the same people who disapproved of the pace of change, who felt that Gorbachev was betraying the ideals of the Revolution by granting liberty to religious zealots like

Men. On September 9, 1990, unknown assailants accosted Father Men on his way to church. They struck him on the head with an axe, killing him instantly. The identity and motives of the killers were never learned.

This was a fate that Men had anticipated. He had accepted it with confidence that those who might take his life were ultimately powerless to suppress the gospel. As he wrote to a friend, shortly before his death: "Do not be worried about me... I am only an instrument that God is using for the moment. Afterwards, things will be as God wants them."

SAINT OF THE WEEK - 2

January 19 - **St. Marguerite Bourgeoys** (1620-1700)

Foundress of the Congregation of Notre Dame of Montreal

"I want at all costs not only to love my neighbour, but to keep him in love for me."



St. Marguerite was born in the French town of Troyes in 1620. When she was twenty she applied in turn to the local convent of the Carmelites and then the Poor Clares. Providentially, she was refused by both. Nevertheless, her sense of religious calling remained intact, fortified by a vision of the Holy Child which, she said, "forever turned my eyes from all the beauty of this world." To her local confessor she made private vows of poverty and chastity.

In 1652 Marguerite heard that the governor of the French colony at Montreal was seeking a schoolmistress. She immediately volunteered, recognizing an opportunity to help implant the gospel in the New World. A year later she was in Montreal-at the time no more than a primitive fort, enclosing a settlement of about two hundred persons. There were as yet few children to teach, and it would be several years before the first schoolhouse was constructed. But she occupied herself in the meantime with a range of charitable activities and worked hard to

promote the religious life of the colony.

Marguerite endured poverty, cold, hunger, and the persistent perils of war in her early years on the frontier. But as Montreal steadily grew in size, so also the conception of her vocation expanded. Through several trips to France she recruited women to join her in starting a missionary congregation dedicated to education. She had a particular interest in providing schooling for the Indians.

Though her project was warmly supported by the civil authorities, she ran into obstacles from the bishop of Quebec. He thought her small band of postulants should affiliate with the Ursulines. Marguerite, however, was determined that her congregation remain uncloistered. Asked why, her answer was that the Virgin Mary did not live in the cloister: "*True it is that the cloister is a protection, but could we find a more powerful guardian than the Mother to whom the Eternal Father confided the Sacred Humanity of his Divine Son?*" Finally she prevailed. In 1676 the Congregation of Notre Dame was officially established. It was the first unenclosed foreign-missionary community for women in the church.

Marguerite Bourgeoys was the first superior of the congregation, a post she retained until the age of seventy-three. After much hardship and suffering she had seen her congregation thrive, and now she was content to retire from centre stage. On December 31, 1699, she learned that the young novice mistress, Sister Agnes, was deathly ill. She responded by "Dear Lord, why dost thou not take me, a useless member in the house, rather than this poor Sister who could still do so much for Thee?" Almost immediately Sister Agnes rallied, while Mother Marguerite began to fail. She died in 1700 on January 12 (now her feast day). See: Elizabeth F. To join the Group, you will need to book your flights with EasyJet.com to Dubrovnik and arrange your insurance. Unfortunately, EasyJet have increased the prices of their flights. So, expect to pay from £143.18 up to. £217.18, depending on when you wish to travel. The cost of accommodation in Medjugorje has not been increased. A single room will cost 20 euros per night for bed and breakfast. If you are sharing, the cost is 15 euros. The rooms are en-suite and there is a lift. The restaurants serve excellent food, and it is possible to have a two-course meal and a glass of wine for 10 euros. A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – MATTHEW 4: 12-23

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Auschwitz did not fall from the sky. It started with a paper written in 1919 by Adolf Hitler. In it, he characterised the effect of a Jewish presence as a "race-tuberculosis of the peoples" and identified the initial goal of a German government to be discriminatory against Jews. The ultimate goal, he argued, must definitely "be the removal of the Jews altogether." Hitler's extremist views went unchallenged. Many in Germany felt humiliated following their defeat at the end of World War I. They presented an easy target for his rhetoric. So! There we have it. A handful of words uttered by Adolf Hitler after years of development deep inside his own psyche. The result – Auschwitz – where hundreds of thousands were exterminated but only after their bank accounts, heirlooms and even their bodies had been ransacked.

Chances are that you haven't heard of 83-year-old Joan Salter. She is a Belgian Survivor of the Holocaust who fled the German persecution of the Jewish peoples and arrived in this country in 1947 as a 7-year-old. She witnessed members of her own family being executed. A refugee at such a young age, she bore her scars. Eight days ago, she challenged the British Home Secretary at a public meeting in Fareham and asked her to apologise and tone down her language when it comes to discussing the plight of refugees. The Home Secretary refused, reinforcing her position and telling Joan that she had no intention of apologising. She received rapturous applause from those at the meeting. Proceedings had been recorded by someone present at the meeting. Footage was freely available. The main newspapers as well as Sky and the BBC chose not to report the story. It's worth remembering that in the 1930's many British newspapers were sympathetic to the German Nazi Party. These same newspapers had devoted upwards of seventeen pages of comment and coverage of Prince Harry's ITV interview with Tom Bradby. Continental newspapers, broadcasters CNN, Fox News, Al Jazeerah and Russia Today were not so reticent. In the eyes of the world, Great Britain was a source of derision once more.

This weekend, the longer version of the Gospel passage sees Jesus asking for followers – just as he invites you and I. The passage begins with: Hearing that John had been arrested, Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth, he went and settled in Capernaum. The day of reckoning and accountability is approaching. It was time to hang up his tools and apron, kiss his mother goodbye (we don't know whether or not Joseph was still alive at this point) and wave farewell to his neighbours. As he walked alongside the Sea of Galilee he engages with some fishermen, Andrew and Peter, James and John. Two sets of brothers and they will need each other's support, for he is about to turn their worlds upside down. The questions posed are timeless – "Will you follow me?" "Will you follow me regardless of the cost?" Those questions are asked of us, too. Are they and we ready to write a blank cheque? How far are we willing to go on the journey? Discipleship involves bearing witness, being willing to speak out – with and for people like Joan Salter. We cannot just assume that someone else will. Often, we find ourselves in an awkward situation. We start pontificating on an issue that we're not really qualified to speak about. This doesn't always prevent us from sharing an opinion. 'Excuse me, my sister is a tran-sexual. You have NO idea of the torment and distress the family has gone through. Please just shut up!' Most would pray for the earth to open up and offer an escape route. Failing that we would offer an apology. 'I'm really sorry! I had no idea. That was really insensitive of me. I'm so, so sorry' Only the most heartless would reply along these lines: 'Well I stand by what I have said. These sorts of people should be locked away somewhere, where they can do as little harm as possible. I make no apology for my views'.

When it comes to discipleship, what is it that we stand for? Could we have been as brave as Joan Salter? Would we have applauded with the crowd in the room, or added our voice to hers? Could we be like Andrew and Peter, James and John? The answer lies deep within – deep in that place that is as capable of spawning Hitler's ideology as it is of encouraging us to reach out, hold the hand and soothe the brow of a dying man. If we stand for nothing – then we'll accept anything.
