

SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Aidan (d. 651)

Missionary and Bishop of Lindisfarne – Feast Day: 31 August



The story of Aidan, one of the great missionary saints of northern Britain, is told by Bede in his *Ecclesiastical History of the English People*. He came to England at the behest of St Oswald, king of Northumbria (d. 642), who had fled to Scotland when his kingdom was invaded by the then pagan (later St) Edwin, been converted to Christianity at lona and wished his kingdom to become Christian when he won it back in 634.

His kingdom extended from the Firth of Forth to Yorkshire. He asked the monks of lona to send him a bishop and assistants for the work of conversion. Their first choice proved too austere for the people to listen to, and their next was the monk Aidan, "a man of outstanding gentleness, holiness, and moderation," whom they consecrated bishop and who proved a better choice, even though Oswald himself had to translate from his Gaelic for some time.

Oswald gave Aidan the island of Lindisfarne off the Northumberland coast (connected to it by a strip of sand at low tide) as his episcopal see.

Aidan was either of Irish origin or actually born in Ireland, and he was followed by "many Irishmen [who] arrived day by day in Britain and proclaimed the word of God in all the provinces under Oswald's rule." They built churches, the king gave land and funds to build monasteries, and "the English, both noble and simple, were instructed by their Irish teachers to observe a monastic way of life."

Bede's only criticism of Aidan is that he kept the date of Easter according to the northern Irish and Pictish calculation, not the Roman (which was to prevail at the Synod of Whitby in 663). Aidan and his followers "lived as they taught," so the English learned "self-discipline and continence," the habit of fasting on Wednesdays and Fridays, and the practice of meditation and praying the Psalms daily. Aidan gave away any money he was given to help the poor and took an especial interest in the ransoming of slaves. Many of those freed in this way became his disciples.

Oswald was killed in battle against the pagan King Penda of Mercia in August 642. Penda dismembered his body and put pieces on stakes as a sacrifice to his god, Woden. Bede devotes several chapters to the miracles attributed to him after his death. He was succeeded by Oswy and then in the southern province of Deira by Oswin, also a saint, who reigned for seven years and who also treated Aidan as a close friend. He gave him a splendid horse, which Aidan promptly gave with all its royal trappings to a beggar, "for he was most compassionate, a protector of the poor and a father to the wretched." Oswin remonstrated, saying he had less valuable horses that could have been given away, to which Aidan retorted, "What are you saying, Your Majesty? Is this child of a mare more valuable to you than this child of God?" The king pondered this before dinner, then took off his sword, knelt, and asked Aidan's forgiveness, promising never again to question anything he gave away.

Aidan, saying he had "never before seen a humble king," prophesied that he would not live very long. Shortly afterwards Oswin, who was at war with Oswy, ruler of the northern province, Bernicia, decided not to risk a battle against superior forces but to take refuge in the house of his friend Hunwald. But Hunwald betrayed his whereabouts to Oswy, who ordered him to be killed. Aidan died only eleven days later, on 31 August 651, when he was staying at Bamburgh Castle. He had been bishop for sixteen years.

His body was taken to Lindisfarne and buried in the monks' cemetery. Later a larger church was built, and his remains were transferred there and buried "at the right side of the altar in accordance with the honours due to so great a prelate." Bede insists that, "as a truthful historian [he has] given an accurate account of his life," despite his reiterated disapproval of his manner of observing Easter. Aidan, he says, "cultivated peace and love, purity and humility; he ... was above anger and greed, and despised pride and conceit. He used his priestly power to check the proud and powerful; he tenderly comforted the sick; he relieved and protected the poor."

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 22nd SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – MARK 7:1-8; 14-15; 22-23

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

As a rule, I am risk averse. I do enjoy those sort of fairground rides whereby my intestines end up around my ear lobes and I still love the switchbacks as I travel at speed along the stretch of the old Roman Road near here, that hugs the contours of Hadrian's Wall, but I cannot do ladders – a five-tread stepladder is about my limit. Despite my risk aversion, I surprised myself on Wednesday when I engaged with a neighbour. Politically, he is to the right of Attila the Hun, and we addressed the issue of immigration and the threat, as he saw it, of the insidious creep of Islam. 'In thirty years, we'll be overrun by Muslims', he postured. 'Does that really matter?', I teased. 'Well, this is a Christian country!' he countered. 'It hasn't always been', said I, 'Look at Stonehenge: England was Pagan before Augustine arrived. He had been sent from Rome in 597....and he crossed the Channel in a small boat!' I'm embarrassed by the small boat reference but couldn't withstand the urge. Like Oscar Wilde I can resist everything except temptation. Bewilderment embraced his features. It was clear that this was all new to his experience and knowledge base. I was reminded of Bede in his work the Ecclesiastical History of the English People. In his account of the Synod of Whitby, Bede describes the showdown between the Celtic Christianity epitomised by Saint Columba, and the international Roman brand of Christianity which had been brought by Augustine. He ends his account bemoaning the laziness of the Anglo-Saxons who he saw as halfhearted Christians still holding onto Pagan practices. An organised and disciplined parish life which we take for granted was yet to mature! Bede was not enamoured of the Anglo-Saxons.

I wonder what he would think now. Are we still half-hearted in our Christian conviction. Churches the length and breadth of the land struggle to fill their pews on a weekend. Crumbling infrastructure from leaking rooves to failing boilers makes constant demands on the purses and wallets of a few. Many areas of our inner cities experience a greater footfall in Wetherspoons than they do in St Gregory's. (For those of you living a sheltered existence, Wetherspoons is a chain of pubs famous for their sticky carpets that call for a new skill set if you want to walk to the bar to order food or refreshments.) Would Bede still bemoan the lazy temperament of the Anglo-Saxons, I wonder.

We can pay lip service to Christianity— or we can live it; we can mouth words, or we can let Jesus live in everything we think, do, and say. This is the challenge posed by this weekend's Gospel. The Pharisees are having a pop at Jesus by criticising the actions, or rather lack of observance, of his disciples. Jesus lets the Pharisees have it with both barrels. He quotes Isaiah to them. They will have known the verse only too well: *This people honours me with lip-service while their hearts are far from me....* We cannot claim to be Christian living in a Christian country in order to licence racial and cultural prejudice; we cannot claim to be Christian living in a Christian country when inequality reaches epidemic proportions and child poverty is at its highest-ever level; we cannot claim to be Christians living in a Christian country when the earth's finite resources are plundered for short-term gain.

Just as my neighbour learned of St Augustine for the first time, I, too, learned this week of a phenomenon called FOMO. It refers to Fear Of Missing Out. It's really just a development of 'keeping up with the Jones's' but is much more insidious. It is used extensively in marketing, to persuade people to buy what they don't need by people they will never know. Imagine what could be achieved if the same principle of FOMO was applied to Christianity. Imagine forcing Bede to eat his words if our Christian witness and joy was so infectious that we engendered feelings of FOMO in our neighbours.
