Deacon Eddie writes: "Between my unavailability last month (the summer term is a very busy time as a parent!) and the proximity to Easter in April of the First Wednesday Holy Hour, this is the first Holy Hour since March. Feel free to come along and sit in silence in front of the Lord in Adoration or join in with the gentle prayers and hymns as we pray for peace in our world, and in our own hearts, and celebrate the Real Presence just 3 days after the great Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (or Corpus Christi as many of us know it). This is a great time to spend in prayer after a busy day at work, or after a day at the beach and anything else that you have in your diary for Wednesday. It would be good to see as many people as possible join us, especially after Sunday's feast day".

WOULD YOU LIKE TO PURCHASE ONE OF THE FOUR VOLUMES OF THE NEW LECTIONARY IN MEMORY OF A LOVED ONE?

The Lectionary – which is the book that contains the Scripture Readings for Mass and the Sacraments – will be changing as part of the continuing process of revising liturgical translations (the process that began with the new Translation of the Mass in 2011). We will no longer be using the Jerusalem Bible (the translation we have used at Mass since 1966) and instead, from the First Sunday of advent, we will be reading from the ESV – the English Standard Version.

The Catholic Truth Society (CTS) are the new publishers and in response to the question – 'What effect will the changes have on the readings? – have stated: 'The changes are intended:

- to make the biblical translations more faithful to the original languages
- to reflect current biblical scholarship
- and to provide a text for use in liturgical setting that is more proclaimable and, where appropriate, more inclusive.

Fr Jock writes: 'as a result of all this, we will need to buy two new 4 volume sets, costing £695 each, for our two parishes. While away with my priests' support group a fortnight ago, I learnt that one of my 'brother priests' had mentioned this at the Masses in his parish the previous weekend, and that since there were 'donor bookplates' provided with each set, he wondered if anybody would like to donate one of the four volumes in memory of a loved one who had died. He was thrilled by the response.... I wonder if anyone in our parishes might be interested in purchasing one of the volumes in a similar manner?'

THE FINAL FEW DAYS OF THE PRAYER SPACE AT ST JOHN'S SCHOOL

Jess Philbrick-Smith writes: 'Since 27 May, a prayer space for P4-P7 children has been opened up in St John's Primary School – and will be available till 7 June. 'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Marguerite Porete

Beguine Martyr (1250? - 1310) - Feast Day: 1 June

"I beg you, those who read these words, try to understand them inwardly, in the innermost depths of your understanding, with all the subtle powers at your command, or else you run the risk of failing to understand them at all."



It is hard to imagine any greater betrayal of the spirit of Christ than the impulse to crucify and burn one's enemies. Sadly, it is an impulse that the church itself, through a good part of its history, has found hard to resist.

One such victim was the Beguine mystic and preacher Marguerite Porete. What little we know of Marguerite Porete is preserved in the proceedings of the Inquisitorial court in Paris which condemned her as a heretic in 1310. The record and her writings suggest that, whatever her

errors, she was a holy woman whose heart burned with the love of God. Of the men who condemned her, whatever may be said of their good intentions, it is hard to conclude otherwise than that they loved orthodoxy more than they loved Christ.

Marguerite was identified as a Beguine, that is, a member of a loosely organized religious movement of women popular in the Low Countries of her time. The origin of the term "Beguine" is disputed; among its opponents it served as a term of contempt, like the label of "heretic" itself or, more recently, "communist." Strictly speaking it referred to a network of small communities of Christian laywomen united in a life devoted to prayer and charity. These women sought to live quiet lives of devotion without taking religious vows, thus basically opting out of the economic and ecclesiastical structures of their society.

As religious women attempting to define a spiritual identity in the world without recourse to ecclesiastical approbation, the Beguines were subject to waves of persecution. But they also had their protectors. A number of well-known mystics were associated with the Beguines, including Mechthild of Magdeburg and Hadewijch, whose writings were widely read and admired.

Marguerite Porete was somewhat outside the usual mould in that she was apparently not based in a particular community but chose to travel and publicly preach her spiritual message. She also wrote a book, *A Mirror for Simple Souls*, that describes her mystical spirituality. It was because of these ideas and her persistence in preaching that she was arrested by the Inquisition in Paris.

A *Mirror for Simple Souls* is a mystical discourse on divine charity, written in the form of a dialogue between the Soul and Reason. The aim of the book is to encourage the pursuit of spiritual perfection in a state of loving communion with God and one's neighbours. Addressed to "simple souls" it is anything but a simple work. The Inquisitors who examined her writing converted her poetic language into a series of propositions which were deemed heretical. As was often the case with mystics, she was accused of propagating a spirituality that dispensed with the church in favour of direct communion with God.

On 11 April 1310, a team of canon lawyers proclaimed her guilty of heresy. Her writings were publicly burned. On 1 June, after being turned over to the secular arm for punishment, she was herself burned at the stake as an unrepentant heretic. Her death began a new wave of official persecution of the Beguines. Two years later the movement was formally suppressed.

A Message About the Scottish Parliament Consultation on the Proposed Right to Palliative Care

Anthony Horan, the Scottish Parliamentary Officer, writes:

'Dear Friend, there is still time to respond to the consultation on a proposed Right to Palliative Care (Scotland) Bill.

The proposal, put forward by Miles Briggs MSP, would introduce a private members' bill that would establish a legal right to palliative care for people of all ages living with terminal illness residing in Scotland and to provide equitable access to the palliative support which is right for them, when and where they need it. The Bill would ensure that palliative and end of life care provision is core to system design, planning, commissioning and delivery.

The consultation is quite short, with just five questions, and it closes on 3rd June.

The following are some key points you may wish to consider when completing the consultation:

- Human persons retain their dignity whatever their physical or psychological condition and are worthy of love and compassion.
- Palliative care is a vital part of end-of-life care, providing compassion, accompaniment and improving quality and life and wellbeing as much as possible.
- Marie Curie research provides that as many as 1 in 4 people at the end of life do not receive the care that they need. [More than one person every minute will die with palliative care needs (mariecurie.org.uk)]
- Civic authorities must commit to improvements in palliative care.
- A key consideration in the provision of palliative care should be the delivery of spiritual assistance by a faith leader where requested.
- Contrast this laudable proposal with the current proposal to legalise assisted suicide in Scotland. Rather then being used to kill people, many of whom are vulnerable, public resources should be invested in helping people to live and to be more comfortable at the end of life. Moreover, in some countries where assisted suicide or euthanasia is legal, palliative care has been compromised. [Future Impacts Care Not Killing Scotland]'

A REFLECTION ON THE FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

It is time to renew your membership. The message has arrived by email, text or quaintly these days, in the post. A decision is called for. Questions arise: can I afford the renewal fee – 'How much? Last year it was only' 'What do I gain from the membership?' 'Is it really necessary?' For many companies, membership renewal is an obvious money spinner. Years back they tempted us into 'auto-renewing'. After all, they always have our best interests at heart! Or they tempted us into a 3-month trial subscription at no charge, thereafter, billing us at £XYZ per annum -unless we let them know before the end of the trial period. They rely on the fact that we are busy with other things, naturally forgetful or lackadaisical (such a splendid word!). Before we know what's what, our bank account sports a debit payment to rival one of Mike Tyson's bruises following a heavyweight bout. These days, the bruise can go unnoticed for quite a while now that Banks have helpfully stopped paper statements and send everything online. They always so kind in looking after us, aren't they? Membership renewal benefits them, and us, and it brings responsibilities.

Today we celebrate the feast or the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ- or Corpus Christi to give its more romantic and evocative title. Maundy Thursday was the time we commemorated the institution of the Eucharist. It was a sombre occasion surrounded as it is by blood and betrayal, cowardice and cruelty, despair and destruction. Now, we can be more measured with less emotion distorting our views. It's a time for quiet reflection. It presents an opportunity for mindfulness... and gratitude. Gratitude for the over-riding benefit that He - God Almighty, Creator of all that is, invites you and me to approach his altar. There is no need of fear or trepidation. The Eucharist is his gift to us. He invites us to be children of His family, He offers membership. We need to be aware of the responsibilities our acceptance brings BEFORE we renew, lest we be suddenly taken aback when we see the full cost of membership.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer famously wrote of the 'Cost of Discipleship' when he spoke of the responsibilities that go with being a follower of Jesus. One of my favourite quotes reads: "We are not to simply bandage the wounds of victims beneath the wheels of injustice, we are to drive a spoke into the wheel itself." This is one way of looking at the responsibility that is interwoven into our membership of God's family. Jesus performed the miracle of the feeding of the 5000. He didn't screw the 5000. When we stand mute before calculated injustice, when we give silent support to those who seek to divide, where the rich grow richer while the poor grow poorer, then we are the screwers rather than the feeders. He taught us to turn the other cheek to forgive our enemies 'as often as 70 times 7 times'. Our leaders tie themselves up in kamikaze knots trying to justify proportionate self-defence and look the other way as innocents are slaughtered. Herod started it. Others continue it. We look on, sometimes we look away, we wring our hands, nervous about becoming involved. "We are not to simply bandage the wounds of victims beneath the wheels of injustice, we are to drive a spoke into the wheel itself."

On Wednesday I was out in Hexham on a leaflet drop. My new knee had quite a workout. I had been sent to the posh end of Hexham where every house had either a long driveway or huge flight of steps. Bad move on my part. I stumbled (literally) across an 82-year-old called Guy trimming the hedge on his impressive garden and hoping against hope that he wasn't disturbing the nesting birds. 'Do you mind if I leave something in your letterbox'. I showed him my leaflet. The candidate's face beamed from the pamphlet. 'I've heard of him. People say he's very good.' 'I think he is!', came my reply. 'I've always voted XXXX. I'm too old to change my vote, now', said he. 'Do you ever think about your vote', I enquired. 'Not really!' said he: I just vote'. We chatted. I told him I couldn't copy him in his voting intentions. We were very grown up, very polite and found we had more in common than differences. He drew things to a conclusion: 'Your problem is, you think too much!' 'Is that such a problem?', I asked. 'It is if you want a quiet life' came his reply. I left him to his hedge and moved onto the next flight of steps. I was reminded of my English 'O' Level, way back in 1969. One of our set books was Shakespeare's 'Julius Caesar' Caesar turns to Mark Antony and out of the side of his mouth says: Let me have men about me that are fat, 200 Sleek-headed men and such as sleep a-nights. Yon Cassius has a lean and hungry look. He thinks too much. Such men are dangerous.

Today, when you approach the Altar to renew your membership, reflect awhile on the obligations of that subscription. All that is required is we think about the enormity of the gift and the enormity of our concomitant responsibilities.
