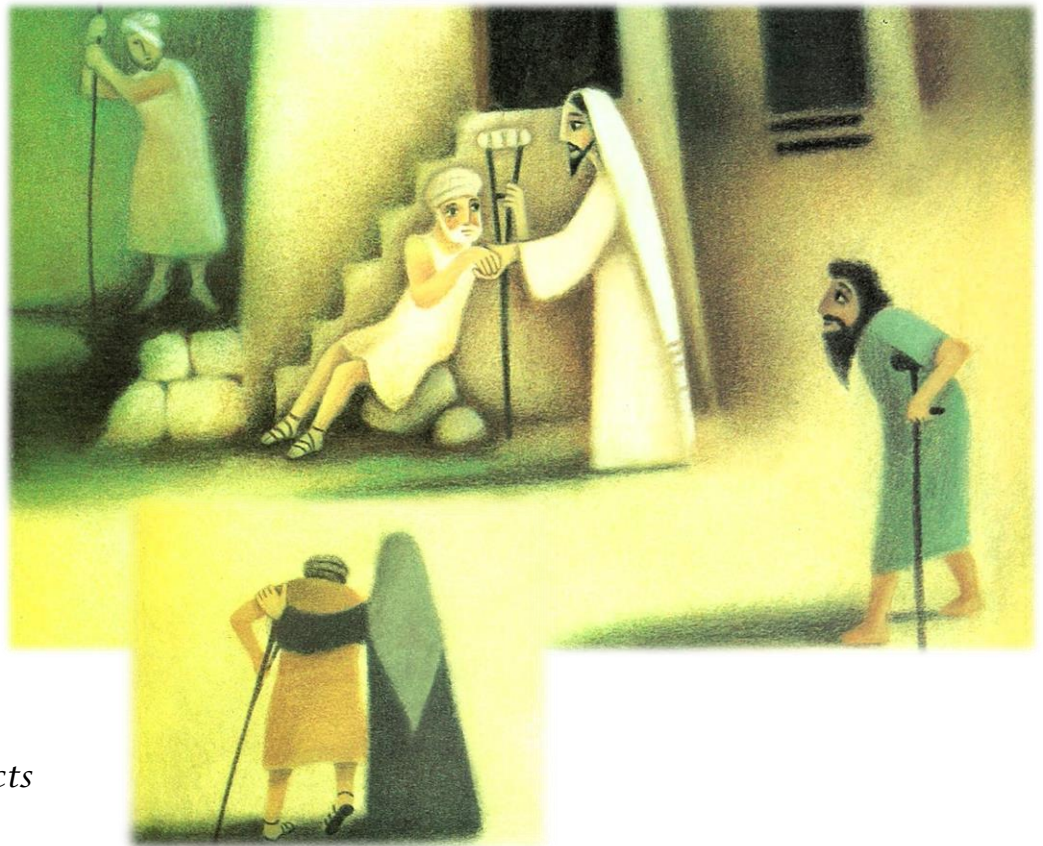

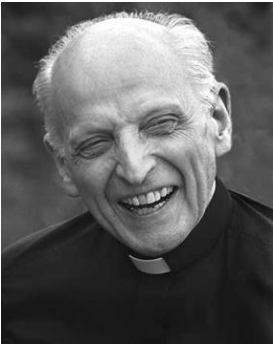

## ‘SAINT’ OF THE WEEK – Pedro Arrupe

*Jesuit Superior General (1907-1991) – a great influence on Pope Francis - Feast Day: 5 February*

*"Today our prime educational objective must be to form men-for-others; men who will live not for themselves but for God and his Christ - for the Godman who lived and died for all the world; men who cannot even conceive of love of God which does not include love for the least of their neighbours; men completely convinced that love of God which does not issue in justice for men is a farce."*



On May 22, 1965, Father Pedro Arrupe was elected superior general of the Society of Jesus, the first Basque to occupy this position since the founder of the Jesuits, Ignatius of Loyola. Comparisons between the two men, however, extend beyond their common homeland. In the eighteen years of his service as superior general Arrupe oversaw a renewal of the Jesuits so profound that he is revered by many in the Society as a "second founder."

Specifically, Arrupe led the Jesuits through their landmark Thirty-Second Congregation, a meeting of representatives from all over the Jesuit world, held from December 1974 to March 1975. He was instrumental in promoting the famous "fourth decree," which defined the modern mission of the Jesuits in terms of "faith that does justice." In the words of this decree, "Our faith in Christ Jesus and our mission to proclaim the Gospel demand of us a commitment to promote justice and to enter into solidarity with the voiceless and the powerless."

Arrupe's belief that the gospel requires effective solidarity with a suffering world had roots in his early years as a priest. Before entering the Jesuits in 1927 he had studied medicine, but an experience of conversion had set him on a different course. After his ordination in 1936 he was assigned to Japan. On August 6, 1945, Arrupe was serving just four miles from the centre of Hiroshima, close enough to be nearly blinded by the flash of the first atomic bomb and to feel the blast that sent the walls of the seminary crashing around him. The memory of that day and the suffering survivors whom he tended in the following weeks was present to him in each Mass he celebrated for the rest of his life.

The compassion evoked by this experience developed over time into a conviction that ministry to oppressed and suffering peoples must not remain on the personal level alone. It was necessary also to promote structural changes in the world to alleviate the sources of oppression and violence. Thus, Arrupe was a pioneer in urging the combination of pastoral concern, biblical reflection, and social analysis.

Arrupe was aware that the Jesuits would suffer consequences for this new understanding of their mission, and he urged them to be prepared for criticism and even persecution. His concern was prophetic. Within three years, five Jesuits had laid down their lives in the pursuit of justice, and the criticism was quick to follow. The Jesuits were accused of substituting politics for the gospel, and Arrupe was personally charged with leading the Society astray.

In 1981, after Arrupe suffered a disabling stroke, Pope John Paul II appointed a personal delegate to serve as interim superior of the Society. Arrupe's own choice of vicar general was passed over, a fact perceived by many in the Society as a criticism of their beloved superior general. Arrupe himself never expressed any resentment. Two years later, with the election of his successor, he tendered his official resignation. Unable to speak without difficulty, he prepared a farewell statement that was read to the assembled brethren:

*In these eighteen years, my one ideal was to serve the Lord and his church... I thank the Lord for the great progress I have witnessed in the Society. Obviously there would be defects too my own, to begin with but it remains a fact that there was great progress, in personal conversion, in the apostolate, in concern for the poor, for refugees. And special mention must be made of the attitudes of loyalty and filial obedience shown toward the church and the Holy Father, particularly in these last years. For all of this, thanks be to God.*

Arrupe spent his final years entirely dependent on others for his daily care. Whereas he had once served God through bold and prophetic leadership, now it was through prayer and patient suffering. As always, he set an example of the Ignatian discipline of "finding God in all things." He died on February 5, 1991.

*Many years ago, Alister Hardy (1896-1985) formerly Emeritus Professor of Zoology at Oxford wrote these words in his diary:*

*“I will now record something which I have never told anyone before, but now that I am in my eighty-eighth year, I think I can admit it. Just occasionally when I was sure that no one could see me, I became so overcome with the glory of the natural scene, that for a moment or two I fell on my knees in prayer – not prayer asking for anything, but thanking God who was very real to me, for the glories of his Kingdom and for allowing me to feel them, it was always by the running water-side that I did this, perhaps in front of a great form of meadowsweet or purple loosestrife.”*

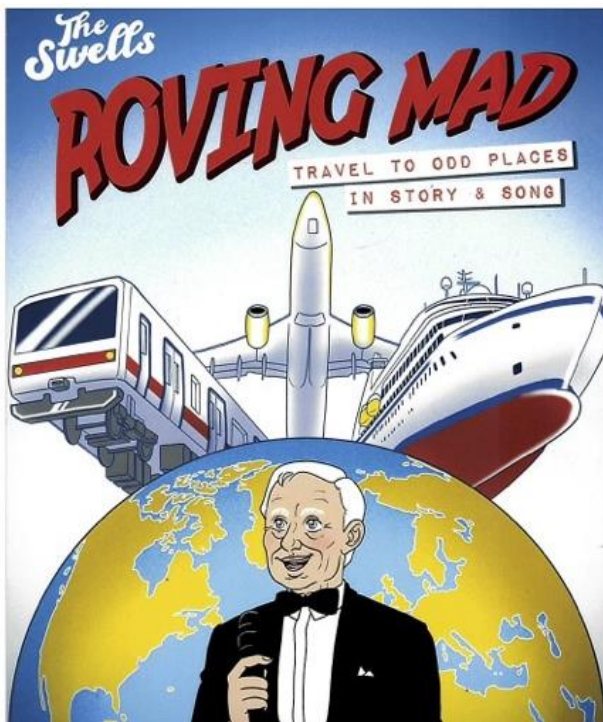

## A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - Mark 1: 29-39; 1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23

*(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)*

My relationship with ICELAND has turned full circle – the supermarket, that is, not the country. We were first introduced to each other by Ruth. Long before ethical shopping and food sourcing had become fashionable, Ruth pointed out to me that, at the time, they were the only chain to ban palm oil from their products having become aware of the devastation wreaked on Rain Forests in our greedy pursuit of the raw ingredient. And they were the first to introduce line fishing instead of indiscriminate net trawling. Ruth was a brilliant cook; I was an aspiring novice. Many years ago she had met the perfect man, the man of her dreams, Mr. Right. They made great plans for their future life. And then he ran away. Along with the absolute devastation came the dawning realisation that her chances of meeting anyone else of that calibre were infinitesimally small. She became an avowed spinster (such a negative word) and pitched into helping others as much as she could. She had a successful career as a primary school teacher but still found time to qualify as a Cordon Bleu chef. Each week she filled her car with cakes and meals and drove into Newcastle where she distributed the fruits of her labours – no fanfare, just a generous heart. Generous to a fault. Much more generous than I. I mentioned my relationship with Iceland turning full circle. Having been in love with the operation, I spat out the dummy when the chairman announced that he would be campaigning for Brexit and then announced he intended to stand as a candidate for election for a party of which, as you might have gathered, I am not particularly fond. Was there no end to the slings and arrows of misfortune that were heading my way. Even the time I was refused entry to the shop on Pensioners' Tuesday because I had no ID to prove my age was as nothing in comparison. In the British media this week he spoke of his regret at backing Brexit and that he was turning his back on the party for which he had stood. I now could return to Iceland Stores even though the Hexham branch closed recently. How fickle I am, and how inferior to Ruth in the realm of constancy and generosity of heart.

To describe Bertie as a friend would be to stretch things somewhat. He died this week but was really more of an acquaintance than a friend. We were fellow alcoholics, each in recovery. It was our shared recovery that brought us closer. I had failed in my attempts to sort out his love life. I felt certain I would be successful when he first asked my help. If others were of the opinion I could charm the birds out of the trees, no-one told the birds. *Hell hath no fury* and all that... How little I knew. Bertie was a successful barrister and was able to command a sizeable fee. That did not prevent him working for nothing if he believed in the cause. Some might argue he could afford to, unaware that he was in debt to several hundred thousand pounds as a result of past divorce settlements. Why on earth he wanted another wife was for me a mystery more profound than that posed by the Bermuda Triangle. The debt hung round his neck but did not suffocate his heart. His recovery from alcoholism was intrinsically connected with his generous heart, a generosity that challenges me still – even from the security of his freshly prepared coffin with its faux silk.

This weekend's Gospel is about the ordinariness of Jesus' life and the ordinariness of the lives that he touched. Today, Mark opts to present us with a wonderfully ordinary scene of domesticity. Simon Peter has come home after some time away. That day, when he just dropped his nets and left the boat behind him caused his wife more than a little anxiety. We can feel for her. We can visualize her pacing the floor: 'Where on earth has he got to?' How she would have wanted to give him a piece of her mind – but she is more concerned with her mother. She is worried about her; the fever is not giving, and age is against her. Expecting an earbashing as he tries to explain away his absence, he instead finds himself acting as a go-between. 'Can't you get your friend (or was he at this stage still an acquaintance?) to do something for my mother? I am really worried about her.' Peter asks, Jesus responds. He responds with a heart overflowing with generosity. A request carried on the wings of humility, a simple act of healing love born of a generous heart and bearing a cure that is read about two thousand years later – and a Gospel is born.
