

SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Francis Xavier (1506 - 1552) Jesuit Missionary – Feast Day: 3 December

"The dangers to which I am exposed and the tasks I undertake for God are springs of spiritual joy, so much so that these islands are the places in all the world for a man to lose his sight by excess of weeping:

but they are tears of joy."



Francis Xavier was one of the original company of six who joined with St. Ignatius Loyola in taking vows in the Society of Jesus. Francis met Loyola, a fellow Basque, while he was studying at the University of Paris in the 1530s. In 1541, armed with a papal decree naming him apostolic nuncio to Asia, he embarked for a perilous journey to Portuguese Goa. It was the beginning of one of the greatest of all missionary journeys, lasting eleven years, and one from which he would never return. In his parting letter to Ignatius, he wrote, "For what is left of this life, I am well assured, it will be by letter only that we shall be together - in the other we shall embrace face to face."

Francis arrived in Goa after a fifteen-month voyage. Christianity of a sort had already been established there by the Portuguese, but the church was in a deplorable condition. He immersed himself in the local languages and used this

port as a base for travels along the southern coasts of India. Through his preaching he won many conversions, almost all among poor, tribal, and lower-caste peoples. But he was constantly frustrated by the immorality, greed, and violence of the European colonists, which undermined the credibility of Christianity.

In 1546 Francis explored other islands in southern Asia. But by this time, he had begun to receive reports of the highly advanced kingdom of Japan, as yet unknown to Westerners. Determined to make Japan his next mission field, he eventually landed there, after many adventures, on August 15, 1549. Fortunately for Francis, his arrival came at a time of great political instability in Japan; 250 local rulers controlled the country, none able to achieve ultimate power. This left the country unusually open to the arrival of foreigners.

Francis quickly recognized the sophistication of Japanese culture and realized that special methods would be needed in order to preach the gospel to such a people. As he wrote to Ignatius,

It seems to me that we shall never find... another race to equal the Japanese. They are a people of very good manners.... They are men of honour to a marvel, and prize honour above all else in the world.... They like to hear things propounded according to reason; and, granted that there are signs and vices among them, when one reasons with them, pointing out that what they do is evil, they are convinced by this reasoning.

The experience of Japanese culture induced a change in Francis's approach to mission. Whereas before he had tended to see himself as building on barren ground, now he felt a need to comprehend the local culture, to discover its latent strengths and virtues and to find ways of connecting these with the gospel message.

Francis remained in Japan for twenty-seven months, long enough to establish several small groups of converts. It was only a beginning, but his work prepared the ground for the wave of Jesuits who would follow, many to lose their lives during later persecution. In the meantime, how- ever, Francis had set his sights on yet another great, and as yet virtually unknown, frontier: China.

At that time China remained closed to foreigners. Nevertheless, Francis believed that this would be the grand prize of all his missionary endeavours. But this prize would elude him. In 1552, after finally finding a ship to take him to China, he became seriously ill. He was taken off the ship on the unpopulated island of Sancian near the Chinese coast. His condition deteriorated, and he died on December 3 at the age of forty-six.

Xavier was canonized in 1622. In 1927 he was named, along with St. Therese of Lisieux, patron of foreign missions.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT – LUKE 3:1-6

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I was 10 years old in 1963. On Friday evening's, I was allowed to stay up until 9 pm, something that distinguished me from my younger sister and brother. TV offered either BBC or ITV. BBC2 would appear in late 1965 for those of us 'up north'. Those in the south could access it in 1964 (what's new?). On 22nd November 1963, programmes were interrupted to carry a 'Newsflash'. President Kennedy of the USA had been assassinated. Grainy film footage, satellite-signal fuzziness and confused reports left us hanging. Had he survived? Surgeons were operating on him – he might survive. Dad, always proud of his Irish Catholic roots, roots shared with the President, made us all kneel and say the Rosary. The TV sound was turned off, but the grainy pictures continued to flicker in the corner of the room. I kept peeping, only to be prodded by Mam as a reminder to concentrate on the Rosary! Prior to that seminal Friday night, I cannot ever remember knowing or hearing about President Kenedy or, as I would later hear him referred to, 'JFK'. Rosary finished, I could resume watching the unfolding drama. He had definitely died, surgeons had been unsuccessful, Jackie had not had time to change out of her blood-spattered suit, and a new person who I had DEFINITELY never heard of, was sworn in as President on some aircraft or other, an assassin had been arrested. I was mesmerised and managed to blend into the two-seater burgundy and mink coloured vinyl sofa (no leather in those days – not unless you were loaded and had a leather Chesterfield!) then I heard: 'Bernard, look at the time - it's gone 10 O'clock. Up the wooden hill you go' (the strange name given to the staircase.) Next day, Dad came in from Forbuoys armed with copies of all of the main newspapers. Editors had all gone into collective overdrive. News and pictures were devoured voraciously, quaint pictures of his two children playing at his feet as he sat in what I learned was The Oval Office. Over the next few weeks, the British were fed (mainly by the newsprint), tales of JFK, how he had called the bluff of someone called Khruschev from Russia in somewhere called the Bay of Pigs. My 10-year-old brain was in new and unchartered territory. I watched as a three-year old saluted the biggest coffin I had ever seen. My curiosity had been aroused and over the following years I was sucked into – and believed – the Kennedy myth. I learned of Rose Kennedy – a matriarch to end all matriarchs. I learned of brothers and power and all of it rooted in Irish Catholicism. Then, slowly, I learned the truth: I read accounts of infidelity and philandering, lies, backhanders and corruption: shady deals done in secret. The illusion had been shattered and I was confused – and saddened. Confusion and sadness. Is there a worse combination? The romantic inside me wants to believe in fairytales and fairytale endings – but this is fools' fodder.

This weekend's Gospel sees Luke putting everything down in plain sight so that there can be no confusion for his readers. Luke is also credited with the Acts of the Apostles. Both books are addressed to 'Theophilus' which translates as someone who is(be)loved by God, or friend of God. We are all 'Theophilus'. Luke wants us to know he is a serious historian, and a serious thinker. So, today's passage begins: In the fifteenth year of Tiberius Caesar's reign, the word of God came to John, son of Zechariah. He wants his reader to be in no doubt. Two things are verified – the exact point in time and the event, namely God's Word comes to John. It's a date as seminal as 22nd November 1963. That same Word is addressed to you and me. Can I suggest you find a quiet place this weekend. Open your hands on your lap, as if in readiness for a large present, the sort of Christmas present you hoped for as a child. Close your eyes, de-clutter your mind, open your heart. John the evangelist tells us that Jesus is the **Word** made flesh, Luke tells us that the **word** of God came to John, son of Zechariah. Accept that word now. In an age when the word of almost everyone else is questioned, when illusions are shattered, the one thing of value is the Word of God. That same Word of God tells me that I am created in his image and likeness. He calls me by name, He knows my hopes and my fears, He will never abandon me, and He is the one Word I can trust completely. To paraphrase the meditation of Cardinal Newman: God has created me for a definite purpose, He has not created me for naught. He knows what He is about. Therefore, I will trust Him. Once we can absorb this truth into every fibre of our being, every breath we take, every act of love that we share, then we realise just how immense the wealth we have been given. Money may make us rich but trust in God makes us wealthy, because trust takes us deep into His bosom. Place your head on his breast. Feel the rhythm of his heart. Breathe to that rhythm, and you will be. You will live.
