

Livestreaming in St Mary Magdalene's

Deacon Eddie writes: 'Since we were forced to turn to Livestreaming during the pandemic, we have (as of Friday morning) streamed 1656 Masses and services and uploaded a further 146 pre-recorded Masses.

Perhaps Communications Sunday is an appropriate time to mention that the recent livestreaming in St Mary Magdalene's has been a challenge with our dependence on mobile Wi-Fi and the associated issues of signal strength.

This challenge has been made worse by the corruption of the actual sim card that we use for the mobile data and also by the fact that whilst our livestream team have generously been willing to use up their own personal mobile data, not every mobile phone provider has a good signal in Bingham.

The good news is that we will (FINALLY!!) be getting proper internet installed in St Mary Magdalene's in just over a week's time – which should resolve the recent issues.

Please join me in thanking the whole team of live streamers who work – often under real pressure – to ensure our Masses are available to our housebound parishioners, and who are responsible for welcoming some of our new parishioners too. This outreach work is invaluable.'

2 Appeals from the Justice and Peace group:

'A request from Fresh Start (Fresh Start is an organisation which helps homeless people who get their own home for the first time, providing them with starter packs of crockery, kitchen utensils, bedding etc.) — "We are in desperate need of kettles, toasters, pots & pans for our essential starter packs. We have been in very short supply of these items recently and had to use vital funds to purchase them — to allow people to make a hot meal, a warming cup of tea or have breakfast, things we take for granted. If you are having a Spring clean, or just have one in the cupboard you no longer use, please consider donating it to Fresh Start to help make someone's house a home." Donations should be left at the back of either church, and the J&P Group will arrange to transport them to Fresh Start. Thank you."

Food Bank Donations - There are two foodbanks in our area that deal with people who are desperately short of the essentials. These are located at *Wilson Memorial Church, Portobello* and the *Thistle Centre in Craigmillar*. These foodbanks help people in dire circumstances who are referred by agencies such as Social Services, the Health Service or the Edinburgh City Mission.

The J&P Group will donate some of what is needed and take the goods to the foodbanks on a regular basis. However, to help meet the huge need for supplies, we wondered if parishioners would like to donate goods, or money to buy goods.

Goods can be left in the 'Food Boxes' in the porch of either of our churches, Money donations can be given to Jim Roarty, Jennifer Morris and any other member of the J&P Group or handed into the Parish House.

Type of goods needed – *breakfast cereals, soup, pasta, rice, pasta sauce, other cooking sauces, baked beans, other tinned beans, tinned meat, tinned fish, tinned vegetables, stock cubes, instant mash, UHT milk, Fruit juice, tea, coffee, sugar, tinned dessert, jam and biscuits. Toilet paper, household cleaning materials, toothpaste, soap etc.* are also welcome.'

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Heloise

Abbess of the Convent of the Paraclete (1100-1164) - Feast Day: 16 May

"You know, beloved, as the whole world knows, how much I have lost in you."



The story of Heloise, inseparable from that of her beloved Abelard, is one of the most memorable episodes in medieval literature. Though it has been frequently recounted, the story retains its poignant mystery.

Heloise, a beautiful and exceptionally intelligent girl, was raised by her uncle Fulbert, a canon of the Cathedral in Paris. Such was her brilliance that Fulbert hired the most famous scholar in France, the renowned Peter Abelard, to be her tutor. Heloise was about seventeen, while Abelard, then at the peak of his powers, was in his mid-thirties. In his later account of

their affair, Abelard blamed himself for seducing Heloise. Nevertheless, however ignoble his initial intentions, the two were soon passionate lovers. Their lack of discretion led to tragic consequences.

Heloise became pregnant and bore a son. Fulbert was enraged, and he was not appeased by the couple's secret marriage. Hoping to resolve the conflict, Abelard sent Heloise to a convent. In the meantime, however, Fulbert's men broke into Abelard's chamber one night and violently castrated him. In agony and shame Abelard retired quickly to a monastery, intending never again to see his wife or the son she had borne.

Years passed. Abelard had suffered much, both from his public humiliation and a series of bruising theological controversies. But as a monk he had gradually regained a good deal of his former renown. He had even had some indirect contact with Heloise. Having learned that her religious community was without a home he established them in the Oratory of the Paraclete, which he had founded. There remained, however, much unresolved business between them.

In 1132 Abelard wrote a letter to a fellow monk, a "History of My Misfortunes," in which he recounted in intimate detail the story of his relationship with Heloise and its tragic denouement. The text found its way to Heloise, now abbess of the convent in which she had so long lived. It was many years since she had taken her final vows as a nun, but the wounds of her abandonment by Abelard had never healed. In his self-centred "History", she was shocked to find another betrayal of their relationship, and so at long last she was moved to break her silence.

In a long letter she addressed him with blunt irony: "To her master, or rather her father, husband, or rather brother; his handmaid, or rather his daughter, wife, or rather sister; to Abelard, Heloise." She described her emotions upon reading his letter - pity for all his sufferings, mixed, however, with a certain resentment. What of *her* sufferings?

Why, after our entry into religion, which was your decision alone, have I been so neglected and forgotten by you?... It was not any sense of vocation which brought me as a young girl to accept the austerities of the cloister, but your bidding alone, and if I deserve no gratitude from you, you may judge for yourself how my labours are in vain. I can expect no reward for this from God, for it is certain that I have done nothing as yet for love of him.

In responding Abelard tried to turn her bitter thoughts to some spiritual resolution. Their love could not be. She should try to love him in Christ. Heloise in turn accused herself of hypocrisy. The world thought her devout and chaste when all the while her body burned with the memory of their illicit union. It was for love of him that she had taken the veil: "Look at the unhappy life I lead, pitiable beyond any other, if in this world I must endure so much in vain, with no hope of future reward." Abelard urged her still to accept their condition as a fact, and to seek in suffering the path to sanctification.

At this point Heloise abruptly changed course. She gave up her personal appeals and asked him instead to give her a rule and instruction for her monastic community. Obviously relieved, Abelard responded with

several long treatises. They never again referred to their common history. Abelard died in 1142 in the midst of a theological dispute that brought him close to official condemnation. His abbot arranged for him to be buried in the abbey church of Heloise's community. She lived on for another twenty-one years and died on 16 May 1164. Her body was placed beside her husband's.

Over the centuries Heloise and Abelard have attracted their respective champions. Certainly, Heloise was one of the great women intellectuals and writers of the Middle Ages. Was she also, as some have suggested, a kind of saint? The answer depends to some extent on whether one accepts, at face value, her own assessment of her condition. Did she ever achieve the peace of mind to which Abelard had urged her? Is that the best criterion of holiness?

Under her administration the Paraclete became one of the great religious communities of Europe, and Heloise was widely revered as a wise and holy abbess. Is it possible, as Etienne Gilson has said, that "Heloise did not know everything about her own situation"? Because she would not renounce her human love for the love of God, she believed herself a hypocrite. But who can say whether God desired such renunciation? Perhaps it was her insistence on the integrity of her love - even at the cost of great suffering - that was her own path to sanctification. In any case it was sufficient to sustain her through a lifetime of prayer and service.

In returning Abelard's body to the Paraclete, the Abbot of Cluny, Peter the Venerable offered a touching acknowledgment of Heloise's claims, both in this world and in the light of eternity: "Christ cherishes him in your place, indeed as a second you, and he will restore him to you of his grace on the day that the Lord shall come down from heaven."

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER - Acts 1 15-17; 20-26; 1 John 4: 11-16; John 17: 11-19

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Are you in a vale of tears – or, like Pistol in the Merry Wives of Windsor is the world your oyster, an endless vista of opportunity: The world is mine oyster, which I with sword will open. I was thinking of Pistol yesterday. For reasons that are very involved and would need a whole chapter to elucidate, I found myself yesterday walking through the streets of Walthamstow, London. The sun was bright, the air warm, traffic noise oppressive. For someone used to the clean air brought by the ever present in the foothills of the Pennines with Song - thrush, wren and sheep vying for my attention, it was something of a shock to my senses. The bustle and business was clear for all to see and feel. Shops and stalls unfamiliar to me offered a selection of goods and wares, fruits and pastries that tempted and intrigued. Two thoughts struck me – I was not scared or fearful of the strangeness that assaulted my senses. I found myself right in the middle of a cosmopolitan throng with tongues and dialect unfamiliar to me as, I imagine, the hearty song of a tiny wren would be to them. The second though arose from the words I had heard when listening to one of the radio phone in programmes which are such a personal favourite With all of the racist bigotry that is the dress code for the far right the caller announced: I want my country back. The host asked What country is that? The country of Boudica and Julius Caesar, or that of Willam the Conqueror (from France) or perhaps the country of Churchill and his war against fascism, or the country of Thatcher who decimated mining communities? Which country is it that you want back? The caller couldn't really answer because what he wanted to say was the country that is all while and English is the only tongue spoken. Those who are with the caller are probably living in a vale of tears. It may have been different in the dead of night, but at 2.30pm fear was completely absent yesterday Life is very difficult for so many people - including you and I. This is an inescapable truth. Once we recognise our predicament, we can begin to do something about it. Arrogance is our number one enemy in this regard because arrogance prevents us from recognising our need for help and it prevents us from accepting help and guidance from others. In this weekend's Gospel passage, Jesus has a simple prayer: I am not asking you to remove them from the world, but to protect them from the evil one. This world is where we live. We may gaze longingly at the other man's grass, we may wish that life had dealt us a better hand, but this is where we are. As I have often shared with you in the past: "If this is where we are, then this is where we are.". The recognition of this truism constitutes our first step on the path to wisdom.

There are at least two ways of looking at the world. We can see it as a vale of tears or we can see it with Pistol in The Merry Wives of Windsor, as a land of endless opportunity: "The world is mine oyster, which I with sword will open". Sometimes life thrills and excites and at other times it drains away our very life blood, sapping our energy and drive. Steering a course through life is rarely straightforward and Jesus is nothing if He is not compassionate. He understands because He has lived as one of us, he lived among us and he knows of what we are made. Aware that we will be subjected to all sorts of distractions, all sorts of empty promises and siren voices, Jesus prays to his Father: Holy Father, keep those you have given me true to your name, so that they may be one like us. If we bind ourselves closely to the love and teaching of Jesus Christ, then we have no need of fear in our lives. God is love; anyone who lives in love lives in God and God lives in him. Is there any difficulty in life that will not melt before the radiant power of such a message?

We are nearing the end of the Easter Season and Jesus is preparing his apostles for the day when he will no longer be their earthly companion. He is telling them that he will not abandon them. Soon he will send His Holy Spirit to be a different companion but who will still guide them and us along the simple truths He has taught - as long as we love one another God will live in us and his love will be complete in us. Roll the clock forward and we see in the first reading this weekend how the early Church is faced with the task of electing a successor to Judas. There had been Twelve tribes of Israel and it was right that the number of Apostles be set at twelve to signify continuity between the old and the new order. Judas has created a vacancy; there is a post to be filled. Luke, the author of the Acts of the Apostles tells his readers that, faced with the task of choosing a successor from the two nominees, Joseph and Matthias, the whole congregation prayed: they then drew lots for them and as the lot fell to Matthias, he was listed as one of the twelve apostles. There is an overwhelming sense of trust that runs through the whole episode. Every single member of the congregation will have had personal experience of Jesus. They had heard him, walked with him and learned from him. They had absolute confidence that he would not renege on his promise nor abandon those who meant so much to him. The congregation prayed and cast their votes in complete trust and the lot fell to Matthias.

Jesus wants his apostles - and us - to know peace of mind. He will never abandon us, he will protect us. *I am not asking you to remove them from the world, but to protect them...* This is his prayer and his promise, and it is our comfort blanket when life becomes difficult, as it surely will. In return, we pray, and we trust. Love conquers all. It always has and it always will.
