



'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – John Woolman (1720 - 1772)

Quaker – Feast Day: 7 October

"It requires great self-denial and resignation of ourselves to God to attain that state wherein we can freely cease from fighting.... Whoever rightly attains to it, does in some degree feel that Spirit in which our Redeemer gave his life for us."



John Woolman was an American Quaker born in Rancocas, New Jersey, twenty miles east of Philadelphia. He was married and earned his living as a tailor. A man of extreme integrity, his life was spent in a continuous effort to heed the dictates of Christ and to apply them in all areas of his life. Above all, he took it as a personal charge to do all in his power to oppose the evil institution of slavery. His conscience was particularly of fended by the knowledge that many of his fellow Quakers saw no harm in this practice. To Woolman's mind, "The only Christian way to treat a slave is to set him free."

He began speaking on this question in his local Quaker meeting and then took up a series of ever-widening journeys, on foot, to admonish slave-owning Quakers, journeys that extended to the South and throughout New England. Believing that "conduct is more convincing than language," he refused to accept hospitality in the home of slave owners.

This was only one of his principled stands. During the time of the French and Indian War he refused to pay a war tax, preferring instead to be fined for disobedience. His typical Quaker simplicity of life was reinforced by a conviction that the craving for luxuries and unnecessary possessions was the root of all oppression and war. Thus, he also resolved not to eat anything made with sugar or molasses, as these were the products of slave labour in the West Indies. For similar reasons he disdained dyed clothes. He was determined not simply to avoid all direct oppression of his fellow humans, but to root out any indirect enjoyment of exploited labour. In his "Plea for the Poor," he wrote: "May we look upon our treasures and the furniture of our houses and the garments in which we array ourselves and try to see whether the seeds of war have any nourishment in these our possessions, or not."

During a time of violent tensions with Indians on the Pennsylvania frontier, Woolman felt called to undertake a peace-making mission to the Indian territory, "that I might feel and understand their life and the spirit they live in, if haply I might receive some instruction from them, or they have in any degree helped forward by my following the leadings of Truth amongst them." In several peaceful encounters, he managed to sit with the Indians and experienced a silent communion.

In 1772 Woolman felt moved to journey all the way to England to bear witness to Quakers there about the evils of slavery and the temptations of commerce and prosperity. He arrived in June and travelled widely, speaking at Quaker Meetings in a number of cities. In York he caught smallpox and died on October 7, 1772.

Woolman's journal, published after his death, is a classic expression of Quaker spirituality. In its self-effacing and matter-of-fact chronicle of his adventures in applied Christianity, it exemplifies the ideal Quaker integration of the prophetic and the mystical. As Douglas Steere has noted, "Woolman's Journal is not only the story of a 'collected' man but it is the recounting of the way in which a Quaker 'concern' may unfold within a man's heart, and if attended to and followed out, may not only reshape his own life as its vehicle but spread to others, and become a transforming power in the history of his time."

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE 28th SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – Wisdom 7: 7-11; Hebrews 4: 12-13; Mark 10: 17-30

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Like Hannibal Lecter, I had an old friend for lunch last Tuesday. Alec. He was my headmaster and Maths teacher from seminary days but in one of those strange quirks of life, he now looks the same age as me though he is only a third of the size he was when I first met him. He always arrives by train and is very proud of his trusty iPhone App which gives him updated and accurate information on all the local trains and buses. Just as he defers to his App as an essential travel companion, so too, I defer to him in many aspects of life. We don't need frequent contact, but our regular encounters are like putting on an old comfy pullover with its misshapen neck, worn elbows and frayed sleeves. "I thought we'd go to The George at Chollerford. Do you know it?". "The last time I was at The George was in 1987 when I gave a talk to the clergy of the Anglican Diocese of Sheffield. It was when I was Diocesan Treasurer, and I was invited to explain the workings of the finances of the Catholic Church" – adding with a chuckle and a wry smile – "a subject that would have taxed Stephen Hawking." In all the years I have known him, his memory remains one of the wonders of the Universe. He remembers details and dates that ensures he retains that ability to make individuals feel important and valued. When he engages in conversation, you feel as if you are the only other person present in the room. He is, and always has been, a rock in my life. He is the sort of person that is the embodiment of this weekend's first reading: I prayed: and understanding was given me: I entreated, and the Spirit of wisdom came to me. In her company all good things came to me, at her hands riches not to be numbered.

You will have at least one person like Alec in your own life. They are emissaries sent by God. They support and brighten us, helping to lighten our load. Alec was there in my darkest moments. When I was in deep shadows, surrounded by gloom, then the *Spirit of wisdom came to me* in his friendship and the friendship of so many others. I would always describe him and them as 'good people', each a prophet in their own way, an emissary from God, an angel. This is how I view my God-given life, and my relationship with Him as loving creator. So, I find myself becoming a little annoyed when Jesus says in this weekend's Gospel: *Why do you call me good? No-one is good but God alone.* I end up siding with Teresa of Avila who famously uttered in a prayer: 'If this is how you treat your friends, it's no wonder you have so few'. There are lots of people in my life that I would describe as good. They all have faults and failings; they all possess secrets and sorrows – but they all speak to me. Each gives me a glimpse into the mystery of God that no-one else can or will. They all let God's light shine on me, each ray of light unique to them. They illuminate my path. They display God's kindness – they offer the hope that elevates. This is why in today's second reading the author of the letter to the Hebrews says: *The word of God is something alive and active. It can slip through the place where the soul is divided from the spirit*.

God's word lives. We have our Bible at home, we are treated to a selection of readings each and every weekend, but we are also blessed with the living gospel that thrives in the lives of those around us. Like a well-tended garden, we keep its foliage healthy, its produce plentiful when we take care of those voices who whisper and encourage and... 'love' us. This weekend's Gospel passage is so rich, so awe-some and awe-filled. There are two aspects that thrill me every time I read it. The first is that 'a man ran up, knelt before Him and put this question to Him'. He manifests urgency. The second: 'Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him'. Procrastination has dogged me for so much of my life. The temptation to 'do it tomorrow' has always been there. Now I am all too aware that there may not be many 'tomorrows' left.

There have been other times when I have struggled to believe that God and others could love me, as more and more of my life unfolded before their eyes. This weekend is time for a reset: to recognise that *the word of God is alive and active*, that God has continually sent and will continue to send messengers into my life and that every millisecond of my life He looks at me and **loves** me. It's time for me to reaffirm the messengers in my life, to **love** them in return, and to thank them for their loyalty, and to pray for their happiness..... Then it won't matter how few or how many, those 'tomorrows' might number.
