

What is L'Arche, Edinburgh?

It is a Community of around 80 people including people with and without learning disabilities, support assistants, volunteers, friends and neighbours, based in the Leith and Restalrig areas of Edinburgh.

L'Arche Edinburgh was founded in 1991 and is one of over 150 L'Arche (The Ark) communities in all five conntinents. It has many long-standing connections to local faith communities (including St John's and St Mary Magdalene's), universities and other community groups, and more recently to the local Ukrainian community. The community is home to 16 people with learning disabilities, who are supported at home, as well as volunteers, friends, neighbours and L'Arche assistants. There are a mix of supported living houses, where the people supported share their home with other people with learning disabilities and with live in assistants. 4 people are also enabled to live more independently in their own flats.

'SAINTS' OF THE WEEK – The Martyrs of El Mozote (d. 1981) El Salvador – Feast Day: 11 December

"I was afraid that I would cry out, that I would scream, that I would go crazy. I couldn't stand it, and I prayed to God to help me. I promised God that if He helped me I would tell the world what happened here."

On December 10, 1981, scores of Salvadoran troops, part of the elite, U.S.-trained Atlacatl Battalion, entered the town of El Mozote, a small hamlet in the Salvadoran province of Morazán. Their mission was codenamed "Rescue." Its objective was to pursue guerrilla troops, cut off their supply lines, and eliminate suspected subversives.

No one had ever accused the people of El Mozote of being subversives. They were, in fact, something of an anomaly in this province, otherwise largely under guerrilla control. More than half of the townspeople were born-again evangelicals, a fact which may have accounted for their

determination to remain neutral in the ongoing civil war in El Salvador. On the day of Operation Rescue the town was in fact swollen with refugees from the countryside, drawn by the belief that El Mozote would provide a safe haven amid the encircling fighting. They were wrong.

On the first day the soldiers gathered the townspeople and roughly interrogated them for information about the guerrillas. The people had no information to give. At some point the decision was made simply to destroy the town. For the next two days the soldiers systematically gathered the townspeople into small groups of men, women, and children and massacred the lot of them. It was exhausting work, carried out with extraordinary brutality. All the while the air was filled with screams and cries, punctuated by bursts of gun fire. Having begun the task, the soldiers were determined to leave no survivors. But they failed.

A peasant woman, *Rufina Amaya*, was put at the end of a line of women taken out to be executed. She had already seen her husband decapitated. When she arrived at the site where she was to be killed, Rufina fell to her knees: "I was crying and begging God to forgive my sins. Though I was almost at the feet of the soldiers I wasn't begging them I was begging God." But in a moment when the soldiers weren't looking, she seized the opportunity to crawl away and hide herself in some bushes. She remained there for days - shivering, thirsty, bleeding - watching and listening as the soldiers completed their mission. The children were the last to go. Rufina had to listen to the sounds of her own children being killed, biting her tongue to keep from screaming.

That night she overheard some of the soldiers discussing the faith of the people they had killed. One young girl in particular remained on their minds. While they had raped her repeatedly, she had continued to sing hymns. Even after they shot her in the chest she sang. They shot her again, and still she sang. And then "their wonder began to turn to fear - until finally they had unsheathed their machetes and hacked through her neck, and at last the singing stopped."

Rufina alone survived to tell the world what had happened at El Mozote, where as many as a thousand people were killed. It was the largest massacre in modern Latin American history.

For more than a decade, years after the end of the civil war, the town of El Mozote remained abandoned. In the meantime, forensic investigators, sponsored by a U.N. Truth Commission, sifted through the gruesome evidence, confirming Rufina's account of the terrible events she had witnessed. Eventually people began to return and rebuild. But not Rufina. She could not bring herself to return. She lived on in a nearby town, where she remarried and bore new children. But despite the pain of her memories, she kept her pledge to recount the story of the massacre to any who asked.

A memorial in the town square of El Mozote bears the inscription: "They did not die, they are with us, with you, and with all humanity."

An Advent Prayer of Abandonment to God

I am your servant, Lord. let what You have said be done to me (Mary)

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT – LUKE 3: 10-18

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I well remember my teenage years as my mind was opened to 'fashion'. A burgeoning, if misguided, fashion sense beckoned seductively. Friday nights out to the Town Centre involved the donning of a green suit, bottle green shirt with gold coloured knitted tie – and all topped or should that be bottomed with a pair of brown suede hush puppies! Good grief, I hear you say. You might remember those ties, never more an inch wide the whole length, sort of crocheted and always in bright colours. I must have looked like a forerunner to the Grinch, though I was never quite as miserable. If neighbours were laughing, it was discreet laughter. Mind you, ever hath it been, that only a fool dares to comment to a teenager's face as to their fashion sense! As a general rule, when it comes to teenage fashion, stay silent. One of my nieces went through her 'Goth' stage with great enthusiasm. No-one dared comment. No-one, that is, except my mother, who possessed all of the subtlety of Donald Trump dancing in front of his adoring brown-nosed fans. For some reason, known only to the brain-dead, he chose to dance to the Gay anthem 'YMCA' by Village People. Very MAGA! Perhaps it was those years when fashion sense took me down strange paths that I was bitten by the glitter-ball bug, and when purple, fluorescent tubes were introduced picking up the smallest specks of dust in their unforgiving glare, the bright lights had me hooked.

Perhaps this accounts for my annual fascination with BBC's *Strictly Come Dancing*. Who doesn't like a glittery shirt and a chance to skip the light fandango, turning cartwheels 'cross the floor? (as Procul Harum might say). If you, likewise, are victim of the 'Strictly' bug, chances are you've heard of Chris McCausland. He is blind and odds-on favourite to win this year's competition. Watching him dance, the viewer is forced to suspend belief. 'Surely he cannot be blind – can he?' You may well have heard of him, but I wager my rainy-day emergency fund (which these days would struggle to provide cover for a solitary raindrop) that you have completely forgotten about Arthur Labinjo Hughes. Three years ago, we saw, read and heard of his death – murdered at the hands of his father and stepmother. We watched in horror at video footage of his tiny, emaciated body, clinging to a filthy duvet for comfort and heard some of his final words as he pleaded to the video camera, installed so that his parents could monitor him; 'Why does nobody love me?'. Politicians and care professionals alike assured us that it must not be allowed to happen ever again. And yet, this week we witnessed the final act in the trial involving the father and stepmother of 10-year-old Sara Sharif. Collectively we wrung our hands and beat our breasts - This must not be allowed to happen again.

This week the people of Syria have exhaled a collective sigh of relief. They cannot possibly know what the future holds – to their eternal frustration the West cannot either – they reason that it cannot possibly be as bad. We can only hope their optimism is well founded, but if Israel's behaviour this week is anything to go by, then it might be just as bad. America supplies the bombs, and the Israeli Air force deliver them with reckless enthusiasm. I am sure good people live in Israel, as there were good people in the (former) ruling party in Syria. The latter will have been terrorised into silence, the former's voices are being drowned out by those who know nothing but hate. The story is told of Michelangelo who, having finished his masterful depiction of Moses, struck the statue on the knee and cried out: *Speak, damn you Speak!* I wonder if the people of Israel have that same exhortation in 2024. *Speak to us, Moses. Speak! We need your help and guidance.*

What must we do then is the question posed to John the Baptist in this weekend's Gospel: It's important to note that John the Baptist does not give his listeners a licence to stay schtum. He does not allow them to hide behind a desire to not rock the boat or avoid hurting the feelings of their friends. He doesn't call for an offensive attitude, but nor does he allow for inactivity. If you have two tunics, give one away; if you have food in the house share it with those who have none; tax collectors do not take more than your due. If you are a soldier then no intimidation, no extortion. It is good practical advice: come to think of it, would that not be our cry to John the Baptist this weekend. What must we do then? Will we heed his exhortation? Or will we disappoint him and keep schtum?
