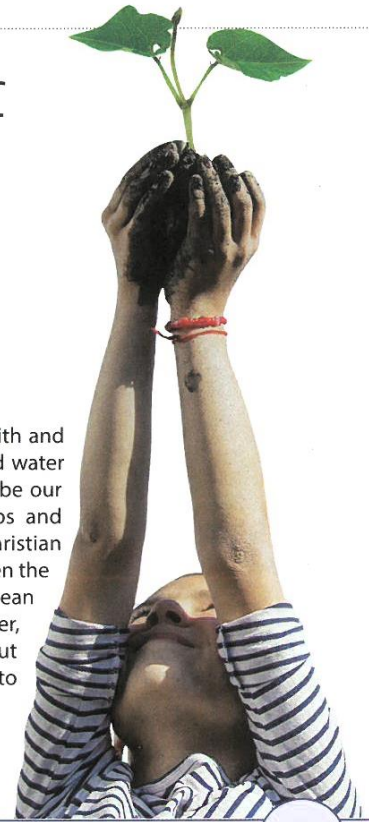
## The example of runner beans!

Feast of the week  
Tuesday 19 March

St Joseph,  
Spouse of the  
Blessed Virgin Mary

Joseph is one of the early saints, who was recognised by popular devotion rather than church processes. He is the patron saint of workers because he was a carpenter, and also of a happy death due to the belief that he died in the presence of Jesus and Mary. The feast of Joseph, husband of Mary, is marked on 19 March and the whole month of March is dedicated to him. Joseph has become patron of various places, including Belgium, Canada, Croatia, Korea, Indonesia, Vietnam and many individual dioceses, especially in the Philippines. He is also patron of immigrants, explorers, pilgrims, travellers, engineers and realtors. In 1955 Pope Pius XII established the Feast of St Joseph the Worker which is marked on 1 May, as a religious counterpart to International Worker Day / May Day.
