"Take the fig tree as a parable:... But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father."

(Taken from Mark 13:24–32)

Today is The Eighth World Day of the Poor – a celebration initiated on the third Sunday in November by Pope Francis in 2017 – **with the theme** (taken from the book of Sirach/Ecclesiasticus) – '**The prayer of the poor rises up to God.**' In our two parishes, we will focus on a book recently published by DLT called '**The Song of the Poor**'.

The Song of the Poor is a collection of the writings of **Fr Tommy Greenan**, a former St John's parishioner who died in 2020, written while he was working in El Salvador in the 1980's and 1990's during a brutal Civil War. **Pat Dishon**, a parishioner who knew the Greenan family well as Tommy was growing up, and kept in regular contact with him, will speak about her memories of Tommy at all our Masses. Members of Tommy's

family will also join us – as for the 9.30am Mass will **Tom Johnstone**, who will describe how he edited the book. Copies of the book will be available to purchase at the end of each Mass in the church halls – where **Tim McConville**, who worked with Tommy for 10 years in El Salvador, will also speak (after both morning Masses). Next Sunday, the Feast of Christ the King, we warmly welcome St Mark's Episcopalian Church, who will be celebrating their Sunday Eucharist in St John's at 11am each Sunday over the coming months while St Mark's is being renovated. They will also be joining us for tea and coffee in St John's Hall after our Mass – and before their Eucharist.

The Feast of Christ the King - is also one of our two 'Nametag Sundays' in the Year. And at the Vigil Mass we welcome The Slavonic Choir who will sing two pieces during the Mass and offer a short recital after it

Mirjam MacQueen writes: 'Originally the choir was called The Russian Choir of Edinburgh, more recently The Slavonic Choir - we are a group of 8 female voices (when everyone is present), conducted by Vladimir Morozov. He and his singer wife Valentyna are Russian, the rest of us are simply enthusiasts for the music, living in or close to Portobello where we rehearse in the St John's church hall. We have pieces from Chesnokov's Liturgy in our current repertoire.

The post-communion reflection will be a Cherubic Hymn with the text having the following meaning: "Let us who mystically represent the Cherubim, and who sing the thrice holy hymn to the life creating Trinity, now lay aside all cares of this life. Amen."

The recital at the end would consist of 5 or so pieces from the Liturgy, and last about 15 minutes. People would obviously be free to leave at the end of Mass if they wish.

We are very much amateur, but wanted to contribute something to the church where we have been rehearsing for a number of years - who knows, perhaps new singers may be inspired to join...(What do you do on a Monday night?)

Blessed Elizabeth of the Trinity reflects on Prayer

I plunge into Infinity

Dive into my Patrimony

In this profound immensity

As in eternity

My soul is blessed

With the Trinity I rest.

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Blessed Elizabeth of the Trinity (1880-1906)

Discalced Carmelite, mystic and spiritual writer – Feast Day: 9 November

"I have found heaven on earth, since heaven is God, and God is in my soul."



A French Carmelite who lived a short life at around the same time as St Thérèse of Lisieux, Elizabeth invites comparison with her far more famous contemporary. Physically their sufferings were similar - early deaths from wasting diseases that were incurable at the time, which both endured with extraordinary courage: tuberculosis in Thérèse's case, Addison's disease in Elizabeth's. They shared a deep conviction that their destiny lay in heaven, which for Elizabeth was home and rest, for Thérèse a new place from which to work. Both were conscious that their gifts and their sufferings, both coming from God, marked them out for a special destiny.

Elizabeth Catez was born near Bourges in central France and then moved with her family to Dijon, where her father died when she was seven. Her sister

Marguerite described her as "a little devil," but from the time of her First Communion and Confirmation in 1891 she seems to have set her heart on becoming a contemplative nun. She had little formal education but became proficient in music, winning several prizes at the Dijon Conservatoire, so that her mother hoped she would use this gift to help support the family. She, however, vowed herself to Christ with a private vow of virginity when she was fourteen and decided that her future was in a Carmelite convent. Her mother forbade her to have any contact with the Dijon Carmel and tried to interest her in various young men she produced as potential suitors. In 1899 her mother relented, asking her only to wait another two years, until she was twentyone, to which Elizabeth readily agreed.

She entered the Dijon Carmel on 2 August 1901, but less than two years later she showed the first symptoms of Addison's disease, caused by a glandular malfunction and with no known treatment. She accepted the news calmly as an opportunity to "conform oneself to the Crucified in love," offering herself as a "prey" to the Trinity. She developed a mystical theology of suffering, written down in two notebooks that the prioress asked her to keep. Christ, her Spouse, she wrote, "wishes me to be the surrogate human being in whom he can suffer again for the glory of the Father and the salvation of the Church. This thought makes me so happy." For the first three years the disease was not especially painful, but it worsened suddenly in the summer of 1906, and though she welcomed even acute pain with joy, she was later afflicted with temptations to despair. In the end she won through these, believing that "Nothing remains but love. Everything must be done for love." After a week of final agony, she died in the morning of 9 November 1906. Her final words, quoted in her entry in the new Roman Martyrology, were: "I am going to the light, to love, to life." Four years earlier she had written to a friend: "I feel I have found heaven on earth, because heaven is God and God is in my soul. The day I understood this a light went on inside me."

Like Thérèse, she wrote verse, and in one poem she expressed this sense of being in heaven: "I plunge into Infinity / Dive into my Patrimony. / In this profound immensity / As in eternity, / My soul is blessed. / With the Trinity I rest." She knew Thérèse's works, as her autobiography had been circulated to Carmels in its first (1898) printing and was on its way to becoming a bestseller by the time she died. Asked whether she, like Thérèse, planned to "come back" to earth after her death, she replied: "Certainly not! The moment I reach the threshold of eternity I shall be off like a shot into the heart of the Trinity, where I shall be immovable." She was a mystic in the great Carmelite tradition of John of the Cross and so many others, but not a revolutionary like her great contemporary. Overshadowed by her after death as well, she was beatified by Pope John Paul II on 25 November 1984, nearly sixty years after Thérèse's canonization.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – MARK 13:24-32

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I always try to embrace the change afforded by modern technology. I particularly relish the challenges posed by smartphone know-how, or the potential of the inbuilt SatNav in the car. So, for example, the smartphone helpfully alerts me to my forthcoming appointment at the Freeman Hospital. "Reminder: You have an appointment at Cardiology at Freeman Hospital, Newcastle at 11:20. Traffic is currently light. Your estimated journey time is 54 minutes." I aim to leave by 10:15. Aim is not, and has never been, my strong point. I would never make a pub darts team. There is (at least) one flaw in the software. Technology cannot make allowance for the vagaries of trying to park at the hospital, it makes little allowance for our fallen state. It has never heard of Adam and Eve, so does not understand those experts who speak of 'white coat' syndrome. For many, a visit to a hospital is accompanied by a heightened level of stress, so cannot possibly make allowance for the morons in the multi-storey car park who manage to straddle two bays in their haste to make their appointment time. Breathless they arrive in the outpatients' department to be told that their clinic is running over, and they can expect a 90-minute delay. Meanwhile I'm now on the ninth floor of the car park and must risk parking in a reserved space, and the lift is out of order. Thank you very much 'Mr-Oh-So-Clever Smartphone'. Not very smart at all, are you?'

But who is the real fool? The programmer who overestimated the parking skills of hospital visitors – or me who suspended experience and wisdom because the machine in my pocket gave me false reassurance and hope! In years gone by, when I drove and Jock map-read, as we travelled through France, I learned that things and journeys take time. What looks to be a short distance on a map is best measured in minutes and hours, even on occasion a half-day – but never kilometres. Experience knows no substitute. Life is all about experience and the processing of events and circumstances over which we have no control. This is why we need our God and why those who pretend otherwise are never more than empty vessels full of empty promises and making a noise that is so empty it deafens all within earshot. The orange blob has no need of God, for he is his own god – answerable only to his own ego, chutzpah and his sycophantic devotees. As Bishop Talbert Swan recently pointed out: *The voters of America didn't vote for Donald Trump because prices are too high. They voted for him because their morals are too low.* When society forgets how to read a map, putting all their eggs in the basket of a computer programmer, then they have little room for complaint when that same programmer displays a distinct lack of experience or awareness, compassion or decency. When a democracy suspends reason and puts its trust in a litany of unproven and unprovable promises, then parking across two bays will be the least of its problems.

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus urges us to learn to read the signs of the times. He suggests that we take off our blinkers, let the scales fall from our eyes: *Take the fig tree as a parable; as soon as its twigs grow supple, and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near.* Do you remember when Jesus warned us against trying to serve God and Mammon at the same time, advising that we would either love the first and hate the second or vice versa. When we get our priorities wrong, then all manner of chaos ensues. I have written before about Edward P Echlin SJ – the touchy-feely American Jesuit who opened my eyes to the secrets and majesty of 'The Little Prince.' By opening my eyes, he enabled me to clearly see, to read the signs. Sometimes my sight failed me, sometimes I lived up to the maxim – *there are none so blind as those that won't see.* As I age, I find myself seeing more and more – and strangely I find myself more confident about speaking out. Bizarre though it might seem, Edward – or Ted as he preferred – was a huge fan of Dick van Dyke who once shared a platform with Martin Luther King. It was in 1964, and Dick van Dyke spoke:

"Hatred is not the norm. Prejudice is not the norm. Suspicion, dislike, jealousy, scapegoating, none of those are the transcendent facets of the human personality. They are diseases. They are the cancers of the soul. They are the infectious and contagious viruses that have been breeding humanity for years.

And because they have been and because they are, is it necessary that they continue to be? I think not."
