Why 40 Hours? The 40 Hours Devotion comes from the 40 hours that Christ's body traditionally rested in the tomb. 40 is a significant number in the Bible, often tied to trials and/or suffering: the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years, and Christ was tempted in the desert for 40 days prior to the start of his ministry.

The devotion stretches back to as early as 1527, when it was introduced by St. Anthony Mary Zaccaria in Milan and Vicenza, and the spread by St. Ignatius and the Jesuits.

SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Apollonius the Apologist

Martyr (d. 185) – Feast Day: 18 April

"Yes, I am a Christian. I worship and I fear the God who made heaven, earth, the sea, and all that is in them."



Though Apollonius was a philosopher and a member of the Roman Senate, his status offered no protection when he was denounced as a secret Christian. He was brought before the Senate for judgment and interviewed by the proconsul Perennis.

The account of his trial is marked by a surprising civility. It apparently pained Perennis to have to apply the law to someone as learned and highborn as Apollonius. Apollonius, for his part, responded to his questioning with poise and eloquence, willing to pay respect to the emperor in all things permissible, save to grant him the deference due to God alone.

Like a friend offering legal advice, Perennis repeatedly "advises" Apollonius to "honour and worship our gods like all of us here and you will continue to live among admure. Perennis gently reminds him "The decree of the Senate prohibits people."

us." When Apollonius demurs, Perennis gently reminds him, "The decree of the Senate prohibits people from being Christians."

Apollonius answers: "The decree of man does not prevail over the decree of God. The more you kill these innocent faithful, mocking justice and the laws, the more God will increase their number." Death must come for all, and after death, judgment; "but the ways of dying are not the same." Christians prepare for death each day by controlling their passions and living in conformity with God's laws.

In that case, Perennis asks, "Does death give you pleasure?" "It is life that I love, Perennis, but this love does not make me fear death. For the life which I prefer to all else is eternal life, which awaits those who have lived faithfully in this world." "I do not know what you are saying," Perennis answers. "How you and I misunderstand each other! You do not want to be open to the beauties of grace. The word of the Lord, Perennis, bestows itself only on the heart which sees light as the eyes do. Preaching to fools is as vain as pointing out dawn to the blind."

Apollonius goes on to present a very beautiful summary of the gospel and the life and teachings of Jesus Christ, who likewise faced condemnation by uncomprehending men. "If it is folly to believe in the immortal soul, that after death we shall receive judgment, and at the resurrection, reward for our courage, and that God is our judge, we shall willingly take with us such an illusion which has helped us to live."

To all this, Perennis answers sadly, "I thought, Apollonius, that you would bid farewell to your whims and worship the gods with us." "I hoped, proconsul," replies Apollonius, "that these few words which I have spoken to you about my faith would help you and that my plea would open the eyes of your soul. I hoped that your heart would bear fruit, that you would worship all your days the God who created the world, that you would lift up your prayer only to him without forgetting alms or charity, and that this would be the pure and bloodless sacrifice that you would offer to God." "I would like to release you, Apollonius," says Perennis, "but the decree of the emperor forbids me. At least I want your death to be gentle."

"I give thanks to my God, proconsul Perennis, with all those who confess the omnipotent God and Jesus Christ, his only Son, and the Holy Spirit, for the sentence you have just given, and which brings me eternal life."

According to Perennis's wish that the martyr's death be gentle, Apollonius was spared any torture and was forthwith beheaded.

As this dialogue shows, not all martyrs meet their fate in an atmosphere of sadistic odium. As often as not they are condemned by world-weary bureaucrats, simply intent on doing their duty, scarcely comprehending that they are thus passing judgment on themselves. One wonders, though, whether Perennis ever thought back on this brief encounter, and whether he ever met the face of Apollonius in his dreams.

The feast of St Apollonius is observed on 18 April.

A REFLECTION ON THE FIRST READING FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT - 1 John 3: 1-2

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

The farmer next door is in the middle of lambing. One of his barns has become a sort of Agnus-Nightingale unit. Little sidewards housing single ewes with their offspring line the walls. The farmer does his rounds, assessing those ready for discharge to pastures verdant. I pop across most days – and, as usual manage to get in the way with alarming ease. The farmer is patient and kind, the ewes wary and the lambs delightfully friendly. They rush towards me – someone new to be investigated. The Ewes sound the alarm baa-ing in their own way – and the lambs, like strong-willed wayward children ignore their mother. I stretch a finger through the bars of the pen, the lambs suck on my finger end in pursuit of milk. They suck harder, their teeth no more than a line of bony gum. They show no fear. They are unscarred by life. There is a level of trust. Their eyes are quite amazing – but then I have a thing about eyes. Look into a horse's eye, or a bull's eye. They seem to possess a wisdom that belies their status in the animal kingdom. The lambs don't know my voice – so they don't listen to anything I have to say. But they look at me and are seemingly at ease. They have no need to draw any distinction between me and Richard the farmer. They know nothing of life save for their small maternity pen and the buzz of farmyard life. They hear noises emanating from the cattle shed - but know nothing of cattle. They watch the sparrows and finches as they scratch around in the straw that sits like a carpet on top of the concrete floor – a sort of forerunner to out modern-day Sissel or coconut matting. There is a rich feast of insects to feed on. The lambs know nothing of flight or nesting, but they are similar to the birds. They enjoy the fruits of their mothers' udders, just as the birds enjoy the extravagance of the insect world.

It's the trust that overwhelms me – and I never tire of indulging in the trust they show. Today is Good Shepherd Sunday. Jesus likens himself to the shepherd that is full of concern for his sheep. Herein lies our consolation. One thing I have learned living as close as I do to sheep and sheep farmers is the difference in attitude between the farmer and the hirelings - those staff employed, often on a short-term contract, for the lambing months. The difference in attitude can sometimes – but not always – be palpable. The farmer has more of an investment in his livestock. He is present 24/7 to their needs and well-being. Jesus calls out. Richard might not be as vocal as Jesus, but he is no less concerned for the wellbeing of his flock. Jesus on the other hand calls us continually – we cannot ever say that he has either ignored or forgotten us. He has armed each of us with a conscience – a conscience that can at times be our downfall and at times our salvation. Like the resonant baa-ing of the ewe, it calls out – warning us of danger, calling us to sustenance and nourishment. No matter how hard we try to silence and dumb down its call, it remains as a constant siren - guiding and encouraging, cajoling, and correcting. That is the essential beauty of our relationship with God. Our responsibility in this spiritual bond is our need to continually take personal inventory. Traditionally, we examine our conscience at the end of the day as we dwell on the last four things – Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell – though I imagine, if you're like me, such mawkish thoughts have long been consigned to the recycling bin. Communication with conscience is not an end of the day discipline, it's an all-day connection. Sometimes it can be while we are in the garden, or ironing or restoring some furniture or I don't always choose the end of the day – sometimes it happens mid-afternoon or when I am in the garden, or ironing, or preparing vegetables for supper. It is part of the journey inwards that I continually encourage everyone to practice. It doesn't need to take long. Sometimes it can happen in the twinkling of an eye, often as I look at myself in the mirror and look into the eyes that stare back – not at the eyes, but into the eyes. Eyes tell us a great deal. Our brains can spot contractions and dilations of the pupil which we aren't even aware of – but we know when we meet a pair of eyes that bring comfort – and those that make us feel uneasy. If we're uneasy with the eyes that look back from the shaving mirror or make-up mirror, then we know we have a few things to address!
