From the Legion of Mary: Praying the Rosary for Peace this Monday – ‘As war continues to rage in many countries without any immediate hope of peace, **the Legion of Mary have organized a day praying the Rosary for an end to conflicts. This will take place this Monday 24 June.** As there is Pat Lee’s funeral that day at 12 noon, we will arrange the rosaries around that. Therefore, the first rosary will be said at 10.00am, the next at 10.30am and then at 11.00am. There will be a break and then rosaries will be said at 1.30pm, 2.00pm, 2.30pm, 3.00pm and the final one at 3.30pm. It is hoped that many parishioners will come along and join in this effort.’

A (Repeat of an) Urgent Appeal for People willing to help with Health and Safety work in both our Parishes

Fr Jock writes: ‘In the last couple of years, there has been a significant increase in the work required in our parishes to ensure we don’t fall foul of the Archdiocesan Health and Safety Regulations. Recently, both parishes underwent a day-long *Health & Safety Audit* which identified that important remedial work is required in both parishes. Some of this work is urgent. **We need to form a small Project Team to review the requirements, create a project plan and support delivery of the plan.** We believe (and very much hope) that there are parishioners who have health and safety responsibilities in their workplace – and/or parishioners who are willing to offer their time to help in this area. We estimate the team would operate for 6 months. Please consider whether you might be able to help with this important work.’ If you think you can, please contact the Parish House by email, in person or by phone or contact myself, Deacon Eddie, Chis Vinestock or Jennifer Morris. General Election 2024

A Letter from the Catholic Bishops of Scotland

This General Election presents us with an opportunity to connect our voting to our Catholic faith and elect an individual representative who reflects as closely as possible our values and beliefs.

It is an opportunity to proclaim the dignity and value of every human being, made in the image and likeness of God, and promote the common good. The human person is both the foundation and the goal of society, and the principal task of society is to defend and foster human dignity in its laws and institutions which should, in turn, support peace and justice at home and abroad.

During elections, a range of issues compete for our attention. And whilst the Bishops' Conference of Scotland does not endorse or support individual candidates or parties, we highlight some of the key issues here so that individual Catholics may reflect on, and raise them, with parliamentary candidates.

Human Life

It is the duty of all of us to uphold the most basic and fundamental human right – the right to life, which is both inalienable and inviolable. At the heart of the political response to the Covid Pandemic was the desire to protect and care for the most vulnerable. In a truly compassionate society, this desire to protect and care ought to extend to all people, including the unborn child in the womb. We should urge MPs to recognise human life from the moment of conception and ensure that the conditions are present to protect and care for both mother and child.

This also applies at the end of life. Dangerous proposals to legalise assisted suicide must be rejected in favour of improvements to palliative care and a commitment to meet the needs of vulnerable people at the end of life, including providing the care and compassion they need to help them live. Our politicians should be urged to learn the lessons of how assisted suicide legislation introduced in some countries has already become an intolerable and unjust pressure upon the elderly, the weak and the disabled to see themselves - and to be considered by others - a burden to society and thus to end their lives, or have their lives ended for them. This is an injustice that ought to be resisted before it can begin.

Marriage and the Family

Society relies on the building block of the family to exist. The love of man and woman in marriage and their openness to new life is the basic, fundamental cell upon which society is built. The wellbeing of society depends on the flourishing and health of family life and MPs should respond to this with policies that create economic and fiscal support for married couples and families with children.

Poverty and Immigration

Sadly, poverty continues to be a scourge for many at home and abroad. Too many people still struggle to make ends meet, homelessness is on the rise, and the two-child limit on tax credits is disproportionately affecting large families, including many families of faith. This reality cannot and should not endure in our country in the twenty-first century. Reliance on food and clothing banks is a damning indictment of a society that has forgotten its poor.

Our country persists in a tragic lack of charity and responsibility owed to our poorest brothers and sisters in other parts of the world. With this in mind, we should call on candidates to work for an

immediate return to an overseas aid budget of 0.7% of GNI and provide debt-relief to low-income countries that need it.

We should welcome refugees, asylum seekers and migrants, and remove the inhumane Rwanda policy and indefinite immigration detention and provide for those people living in and around conflict zones while committing to working towards the peaceful resolution of conflict.

The Environment

MPs should also commit the nation to responsible stewardship of the earth and all its resources, and act on Pope Francis' call to be 'protectors of creation, protectors of God's plan inscribed in nature, protectors of one another and of the environment.' We cannot be indifferent to the harmful effects of climate change.

War and Nuclear Weapons

A key task of the state is to ensure peace at home and abroad. We are deeply troubled by the tragedy of war in the world, including conflicts in Ukraine and the Holy Land, and firmly believe it is incumbent on the UK Parliament and Government to foster peace where conflict exists and to do everything in its power to prevent bloodshed.

The use of weapons of mass destruction is a serious crime against God and humanity. While states are entitled to possess the means required for legitimate defence, this must not become an excuse for an excessive accumulation of weaponry which becomes a considerable threat to stability and freedom as well as a misuse of public funds that could serve to address the needs of the disadvantaged. The UK Government must work actively and seriously towards elimination of the UK's nuclear arsenal, and the promotion of a more peace-oriented manufacturing industry.

Freedom of Religion and Conscience

We believe that a creeping intolerance towards religious belief, including but not confined to Christianity, has become part of life in modern Britain. Certain politicians and citizens are finding it increasingly difficult to be true to their faith in an environment that tries to restrict religion to the private sphere. Our MPs should be urged to legislate for a liberal and tolerant society that is truly welcoming to all faiths and none. Nor can we be blind to the plight of millions of people worldwide who are persecuted for their beliefs. People of faith, including Christians, should be able to practise their faith freely and to bear witness to it in their lives without fear of prejudice, intolerance, abuse or violence.

Finally, as we engage in this General Election, please pray for those who will be charged with representing the nation's interests in Parliament. May they pursue peace and justice and put the human person at the centre of all political activity.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE TWELFTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – Mark 4: 35-41

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Imagine for a moment the excitement that filled the hours of preparation as Jay Taylor prepared for his first holiday on his trip to a music festival on the island of Tenerife. That excitement has been replaced by a vacuum. Currently classified as ‘missing,’ a huge search is underway. Contrast that same excitement and anticipation, with the despairing thoughts of his parents, family, and friends as they desperately try to locate him. Imagine their angst. Here in the United Kingdom, the charity ‘Missing People’ says “someone is reported missing every 90 seconds in the UK “, that adds up to 353,000 people. Of the 353,000 reported missing incidents every year, more than 137,000 are adults and nearly 215,000 are children. Many are found. Many are not. The number of those who remain classified as missing each year comes to 170,000. As Hercule Poirot was wont to say: My ‘leettul gray cells’ were woken from their slumbers. Why do some incidents catch the public imagination, whilst thousands of others go unreported and unnoticed? The levels of angst, uncertainty and pain are surely just as acute, are they not? Lately, I have become a fan of the Discovery Channel. I particularly enjoy one genre. It’s the one where we are invited to join the trawlermen and fishermen who battle sometimes mountainous seas, to bring in the harvest of fish to sate our appetites. A young man, no older than nineteen with piercing blue eyes stares into the camera. His bravery and courage are beyond compare – but the same is true of the cameraman and the sound-engineer. If they are not at the top of their game, they risk losing hands or legs – and even life. I often struggle to see the bravery that surrounds me: the three-year-old battling blindness and cancer in the same body and at the same time. I cry out into the ether. I am one with the disciples who looked on helplessly as Jesus slept at the stern. Does no-one care? Look at what is happening. I stare at the angst of the families of the missing individuals and their pain and torment. This world really can be a vale of tears.

This weekend’s Gospel deals with the miraculous calming of the storm. The disciples are terrified, caught completely unaware by the suddenness of the squally weather. Mark tells us: *and there were other boats with them.* I wonder if the disciples were so pre-occupied with their own safety that it never occurred to them to think of the other boats along with their occupants. Just as in the case of the sudden disappearance of Jay Taylor, a name and a photograph go a long way in arousing our interest, imagination and involvement. We’re often oblivious to the human engineered malnutrition of Gaza, the amputations carried out without anesthesia but then we’re confronted with a real story of a young Palestinian girl now learning to walk with prosthetics. She is 9 years old. An American benefactor and US hospital have seen her plight. They offer help. She has a name. We can identify with her. She smiles at the camera... she smiles at me. We know nothing of the other nameless ones, so they are destined to remain no more than a number, disquieting pictures on our screens. We struggle: “Is there nothing else to watch. What’s on ITV?” we cry. We don’t always empathise fully with nameless pain. We don’t totally comprehend the betrayal or the disappointment. We don’t wholly appreciate the sadness, nor can we grasp the immensity of the why, nor the feeling of helplessness.

Jesus wants to relieve any feelings of helplessness that might beset us in our own personal vale of tears. He rebuked the wind: *Quiet now, be calm.* Then he turns to the men stood before them. Is he aware of their weak characters? *Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?* He certainly has a job on his hands if he is to mould these men. Not quite as big as the task facing Gareth Southgate – but certainly a challenge a challenge and a half (and I don’t mean for Jesus)! *Who can this be? Even the wind and sea obey him.* Our relationship with Jesus challenges our cynicism, pessimism and innate distrust. He addresses us in today’s episode. The sudden squall referred to by Mark is just another historical anti-cyclone. Gone forever – like a puff of wind. Our souls remain. Our eternal souls: the souls made in his image and likeness. He turns to us *Why are you so frightened? How is that you have no faith?* It’s time. Time to gird those loins, grab that sturdy staff and head out into the vale of tears with hope in our hearts. We press on!
