A message from the Justice and Peace group: The Overnight Welcome Centre which provides a bed for the homeless for the night as well as support with health and social care and also in finding accommodation, runs from October to the end of April each year. Along with roughly 40 other church groups, volunteers from our parishes provide a hot meal for the people using the Welcome Centre.

This season, which ended at the end of April, we provided the meal on 20 evenings, Again, thanks to *Apetito Ltd* who donate the meals (we certainly couldn't do as many evenings if we had to buy the food out of our own funds) and to *Seton Steel*, their representative who, when his schedule permitted, prepared and served the food.

A big thank you also to our volunteers who provide this service – the meals are very much appreciated by the people using the Centre.

# 'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – G.K. Chesterton

*Apologist (1874-1936) – Feast Day: 29 May*

*"A characteristic of the great saints is their power of levity.  
Angels can fly because they can take themselves lightly."*



G.K. Chesterton, born in Kensington, London, on 29 May 1874, was an imposing figure - over six feet tall, wide of girth, excitable, opinionated, and drawn to controversy. His friend George Bernard Shaw (with whom friendship was unimpeded by their disagreement on virtually every subject) described him affectionately as *"a large abounding gigantically cherubic person who...seems to be growing larger as you look at him."* Apart from his size, the most notable characteristic of G.K. Chesterton was his ability to combine gaiety and humour with a kind of deadly seriousness about the things that mattered.

Trained as an artist, Chesterton devoted his life instead to writing. He was a fantastically prolific author and editor, turning out poems, essays, editorials, and books of every sort. In one two-year period he published nine books. He was particularly popular for his successful detective series, the "Father Brown" stories. But he also wrote popular books on Blake, St. Francis, and Thomas Aquinas, as well as on social issues and religion.

Although famous as a Catholic apologist, Chesterton's formal conversion to Catholicism came only in 1922 when he was forty-eight. But he had been travelling in this direction for many years. One of his most famous books, *Orthodoxy*, a defence of traditional Christianity, was published in 1908. The book was inspired by the remark of a reader of his previous book, *Heretics*, who challenged him to state the standpoint from which he dismissed the views of everyone else. So, he had set out to define his own religion, only to realize that a definition already existed in the creeds of Christianity. He compared this discovery to the embarrassment of an English yachtsman who miscalculated his course and *"discovered England under the impression that it was a new island in the South Seas....I am that man in a yacht. I discovered England."*

One of the principles of orthodoxy that Chesterton affirmed was the value of Tradition. Though this principle was often regarded as contrary to the spirit of democracy, Chesterton argued otherwise: *"Tradition is only democracy extended through time,"* he said.

*Tradition means giving votes to the most obscure of all classes, our ancestors. It is the democracy of the dead. Tradition refuses to submit to the small and arrogant oligarchy of those who merely happen to be walking about. All democrats object to men being disqualified by the accident of birth; tradition objects to their being disqualified by the accident of death.*

Chesterton's populist views also extended to the social realm. He was an outspoken critic of capitalism and the modern culture of industrialism. An ardent patriot he was by the same principle a bitter opponent of imperialism. He called the annexation of the Transvaal in South Africa *"a crime committed against the European virtue of patriotism. For a man has clearly no more right to say that his British patriotism obliges him to destroy the Boer nation than he has to say that his sense of the sanctity of marriage makes him run away with his neighbour's wife."*

In his own journal, *G.K.'s Weekly*, Chesterton was a champion of what he called Distributism. This represented a kind of economic democracy, based on principles of decentralization of property and power. The popularity of Chesterton's journal, however, rested less on the acceptance of his ideas than on the attractiveness of his "voice" and his witty, epigrammatic style:

*Solemnity flows out of men naturally; but laughter is a leap. It is easy to be heavy: hard to be light.  
Satan fell by the force of gravity.*

*The morality of a great writer is not the morality he teaches, but the morality he takes for granted.*

*Despair does not lie in being weary of suffering, but in being weary of joy.*

Chesterton never wearied of joy nor of the enjoyment of life, his friends, the love of his devoted wife, or his causes. But a body could endure only so much enjoyment. Chesterton died on 14 June 1936. Throughout his

life, his views on religion, politics, and most public issues had set him among a small minority in his native land. And yet there were few literary figures of his day more widely admired, indeed beloved. In words that might have served as his own fitting epitaph Chesterton had described the saint as "*a medicine because he is an antidote.... He will generally be found restoring the world to sanity by exaggerating whatever the world neglects.*"

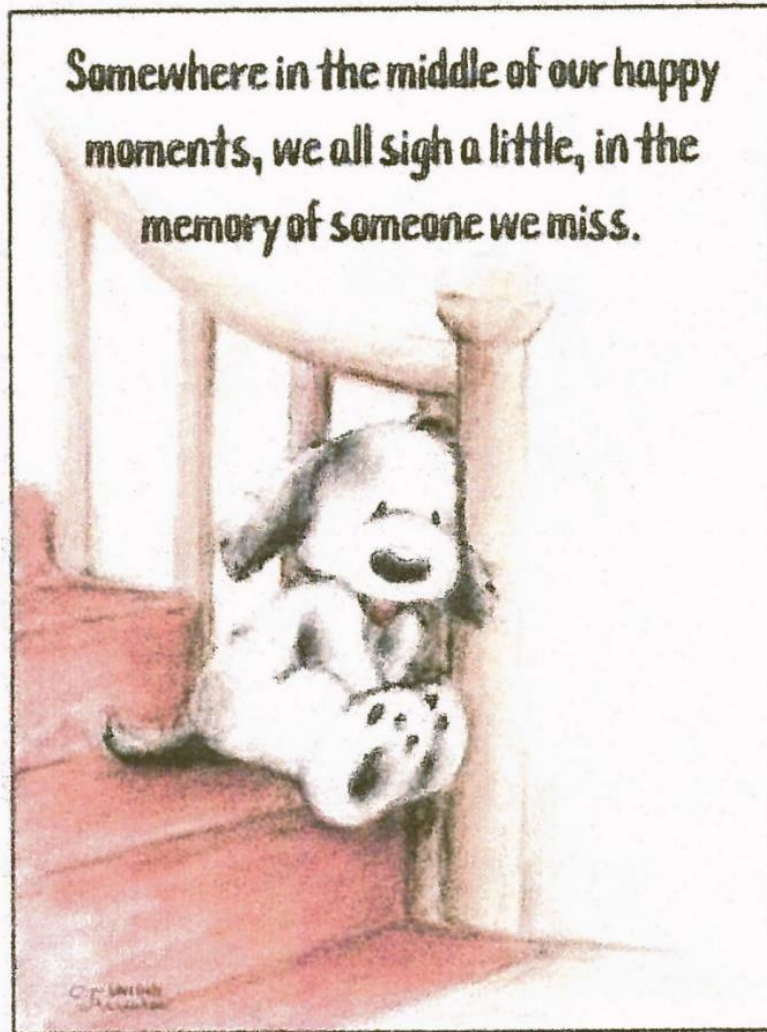

# A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR TRINITY SUNDAY - MATTHEW 28:16-20

*(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)*

I seem to be in a state of constant frustration. I'm trying and failing to convince someone that he would be better off living in a caring environment – whilst avoiding the words 'care-home' in our conversation. He is reluctant to give up his home of 40+ years. He has not quite crossed the threshold of 'danger to himself' but he's getting closer by the day. Dementia has not been medically diagnosed but memory loss and cognitive impairment have. He has no track of days or dates. Social services cannot compel him to accept offers of help. His own wishes are paramount. The view from his little patch of earth is much different to the view from mine – we may as well be continents apart. I have never been blessed with children, but I feel total empathy for a parent battling with a strong-willed child determined to test the limits of human capability and see what really does happen when you try to fly by launching from the top banister!

If I am feeling frustration, imagine for just one millisecond the feelings of God as creation unfolds. What a mess we have contrived to make of the beautiful creation that was left in our care. My frustrations led me back to Pope John XXIII. His papacy ushered in the Second Vatican Council and Mass in the vernacular. Some Boo and Hiss at the mere mention of his name. He wanted to allow fresh air to flow through the musty corridors of the Vatican. Some fear he caused a mass outbreak of pneumonia. He died in my teenage years, but his influence on me has been profound, - particularly after reading his autobiography "Journal of a Soul". He embraced his weaknesses and used them not only to help him remain grounded but also to enable him to focus on the bigger picture. He was very much aware that he was one tiny piece in the machine that is God's creation - but no less essential for that. He famously wrote: *We all like to judge events from the vantage point of the handful of earth beneath our feet. This is a great illusion. We must take our view from the heights and courageously embrace the whole.* Each of us is as important as the butterfly that flaps its wings in the Amazon Rainforest triggering the turbulence that buffets the long-range airliner. Each of us has an irreplaceable role to play in God's plan. Imagine how powerful our acts of kindness are – and how destructive our acts of selfishness.

Today we commemorate the Most Holy Trinity and there's always a real possibility that the feast goes right over our heads. We just cannot get our heads around the mystery - and so we move on. We focus on the small patch of earth beneath our feet. We fail to lift up our eyes to the mountain. (Psalm 121) This is to do a great disservice to God and to us. The Trinity is the manifestation of God in Perfect Love and Perfect Harmony. Three distinct persons yet one Godhead. How can this be? The Trinity is the ministration, the incarnation of Love and as John the Evangelist observed *God is love – and he who lives in love and lives in God, and God lives in him.* God lives in us – not like some bug that eats away at our individuality - but as the life-giving, beating heart of our very existence. As John XXIII pointed out, we are not the centre of the universe. We are not even the centre of our own world. There is more to existence than the *handful of earth beneath our feet.* We are part of something much bigger for we are part of the life of God who is infinite in His power and infinite in His Love. We love because He loved us first. We exist because God willed us into existence. All we are and all we have comes from Him. in the person of Jesus Christ. In today's Gospel passage Jesus is meeting his disciples for the last time. There is no longer any need for hushed meetings in secret venues. The time has come to be bold. He arranges to meet them on a mountain. From the vantage point of the mountain, Jesus speaks of God - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. He gives the first lesson on the Trinity, and he does so after he has put them in touch with the bigger picture. He is asking them to *courageously embrace the whole.* They may consider themselves to be small, insignificant, weak and with faults and failings, but they are essential parts of the plan: God's plan. So, we never allow anyone to make us feel inferior or insignificant. God has chosen each one of us, he has committed some task to us that he has not committed to another. We must keep our eyes on the bigger picture, look up to the mountains, not to the ground beneath our feet.
