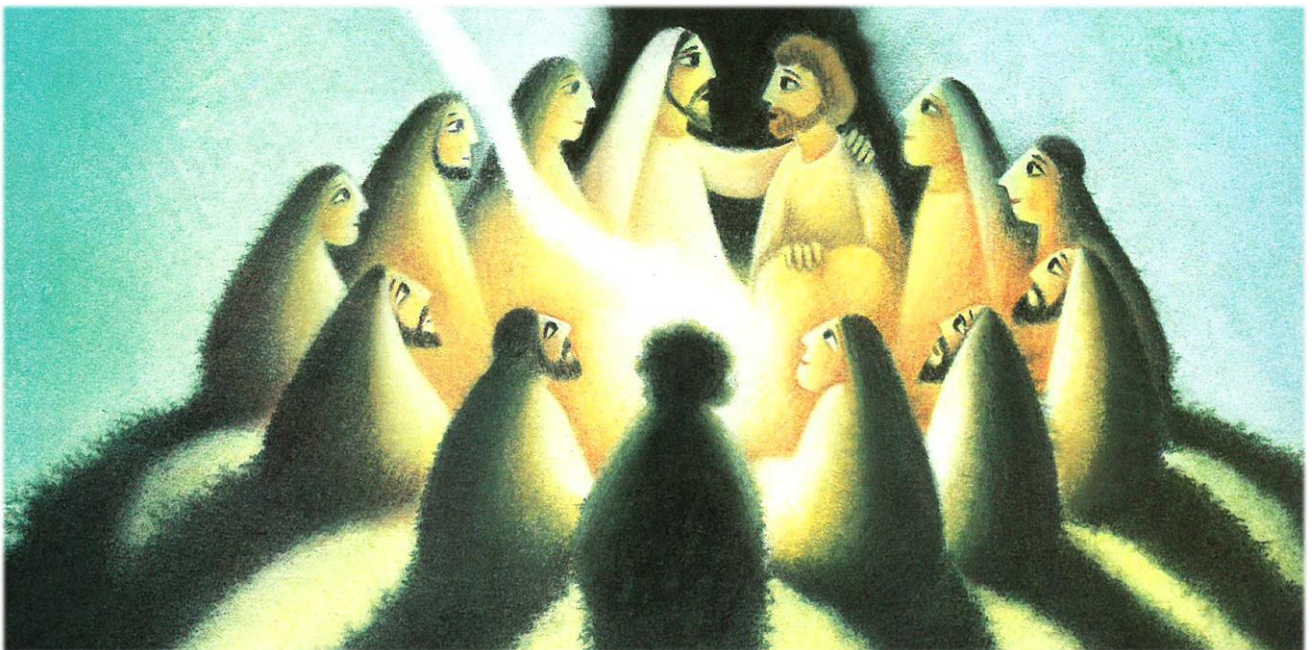

## ‘SAINT’ OF THE WEEK – Antonio Rosmini

Founder of the Institute of Charity (1797-1855) – Feast Day: 1 July

*"Pray that God in his mercy may give me patience to carry my cross though it be to the end of my life, and that I may never think hardly of those who have brought it on me."*



Antonio Rosmini was one of the most eminent Italian priests of the nineteenth century. Through his personal piety, his contributions as a scholar, and his insights into the realm of politics, he endeavoured to raise the level of Catholic culture and to enhance the church's leadership with respect to the moral and social questions of his day. Many of his ideas were later claimed by the church. But through much of his career he had to suffer libellous aspersions from prelates for whom the word "modern" remained a fearful epithet.

Rosmini was by all accounts a man of profound spiritual depth. He founded the Institute of Charity, a congregation of priests committed to the pursuit of holiness in the service of the church. One of his particular interests was the revival of Catholicism in England; his Institute sent many Italian priests to work in a number of English cities. (They were responsible for popularizing the "Roman collar" as a distinguishing mark of the Catholic clergy.) Rosmini achieved equal renown as a philosopher. There was probably no other Catholic theologian in Europe with a more comprehensive and sympathetic understanding of modern philosophy, and he eagerly promoted the dialogue between the church and contemporary thought. Rosmini himself wrote scores of scholarly books; the posthumous edition of his collected works ran to sixty volumes.

At the same time Rosmini was an Italian patriot and supporter of the Risorgimento the cause of Italian unification. This ran counter to Vatican interests since it entailed opposition to Austria (a strong ally of the church), which occupied a great part of the Italian peninsula. The Vatican feared that ultimately the Italian nationalists would turn their gaze on the extensive Vatican states.

Nevertheless, the election in 1846 of Pope Pius IX was regarded by Italian liberals as a cause for optimism. Pius quickly earned a reputation as a progressive reformer after introducing a series of modernizing reforms in the administration of his territories. These included support for the railroad and gas-lighting in the streets of Rome, freedom of the press, and even a hint that constitutional government might soon be permitted. So popular was the new pope, Pio Nono as he was called, that it was said, only half in jest, that he could easily win election as the first president of a unified Italian republic. During this brief papal spring, Rosmini enjoyed cordial relations with the Vatican. As an official representative of the Risorgimento, Rosmini met with the pope in an effort to persuade him to join the alliance against Austria. Pius actually informed Rosmini of his desire to name him a cardinal. But as word of the plan leaked out to Vatican officials the pope was besieged with warnings about Rosmini's radical ideas. The red hat was never formally extended.

In the meantime, the overall mood in the Vatican was shifting dramatically. The catalyst was a short-lived revolutionary uprising in 1848 that caused the pope to flee Rome in fear of his life. He returned some months later, supported by Austrian troops. But he was now a very different man, convinced of the utter incompatibility between Catholicism and liberal ideals. Henceforth he assumed the reactionary stance that would characterize his long (thirty-two-year) pontificate.

Earlier in 1848, before this ominous turn of events, Rosmini had felt the time was ripe to publish two of his most critical works, *A Constitution Based on Social Justice* and *Five Wounds of the Church*. The first book outlined a programme of Catholic social teaching that in many ways anticipated by fifty years the positions of Pope Leo XIII. But in *Five Wounds* he laid out an extensive critique of the church and the self-imposed afflictions that prevented it from assuming its rightful leadership in the world. These wounds were: (1) the division of the people from the clergy in worship; (2) the defective education of the clergy; (3) the disunity among the bishops; (4) the nomination of bishops by the secular powers; and (5) the enslavement of the church by riches.

Under these headings, he called for such reforms as the use of the vernacular in worship: "The people should be actors in the liturgy as well as hearers, while in fact they are mostly present at Mass like the columns and statues of the building." He decried the corruption and worldliness introduced by wealth and power and the all too close relationship between the church and state. He went so far as to suggest that in those



revolutionary movements that targeted the temporal powers of the church there was expressed a vague need "for a religion free to speak to the hearts of the people without the intervention of the State; perhaps in the designs of Providence the revolutions are designed to free the Church of Christ, in whose hand are all things."

But in speaking so freely Rosmini had seriously misjudged the signs of the times. His two books were placed on the Index of proscribed works, and Rosmini was subjected to vicious personal attacks. These were contained in anonymous pamphlets in which he was accused of every type of heresy and immorality. Although he was never formally charged with any particular error, he remained for the rest of his life under a cloud. Vocations to his Institute sharply dropped, and he was unable to exercise any further significant role within the church.

Rosmini submitted gracefully to this repression, satisfied by the knowledge that if he were not in error his message would eventually be heard and received by future generations. He died on 1 July 1855.

Scotland was given the responsibility of helping with evangelisation in Finland. So, for 40 years, teams of Legionaries from Scotland have been spending 2 weeks of their summer holidays at their own expense going out to share the Gospel in various parts of Finland. On **Monday 1 July** a team will travel to Oulu to share their faith with

all there that they meet. It can be difficult work and is supported by the many prayers being said by those at home. **We would like to invite you to pray for this project.** I have personal experience of this, as I went 5 times to Finland. We went out into the streets and parks every day to meet those who were out and about. A lot of people there did speak English, but some had no English. We learned a few words in Finnish (*God, mother of God, love, please, thank you and hello, etc*). Finnish people are mainly Lutherans, due to being under the rule of the King of Sweden, many years ago, who did not want to be dictated to by the Pope in Rome. So, the dutiful Finns gave up their Catholic faith. There are large Lutheran churches and beautiful Orthodox churches, but the Catholic churches are hidden away and do not look like the churches we have.

The people we spoke to were friendly and polite and we made some good contacts. However, one of the local parishioners, who converted to the Catholic church, when he was studying in Denmark and was living with a Catholic family, told me he did not believe we would get people to come to our church. But he was wrong. He may be a scientist and a teacher at the University, but he did not allow for the Holy Spirit.

One day I was with a lady from Tipperary, when we approached a lady. We introduced ourselves and explained what we were doing. Her English was not fluent, but she understood us and said she was interested in the Catholic faith. She explained that her daughter had been working in the Canary Islands and became a Catholic there. The daughter spoke to her about the faith very enthusiastically and she was happy to come along to church and meet the Priest.

The Bishop of Finland insists that people coming into the church prepare for a year before being received. So Marjo-Ritta became a Catholic on 5 October 2013. She wrote to me, "Thank God you came on my way in Jyvaskyla at the Railway Station." Often, we do not know the results of our efforts, but we know that the Holy Spirit will use us and guide us to those whom the Spirit wants us to meet. Please pray that this year the project will be fruitful. Thank you.'

# A REFLECTION ON THE FEAST OF ST PETER AND ST PAUL

*(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)*

This week has been one of quiet reflection. Saturday gone, saw my 71<sup>st</sup> birthday and the following Tuesday marked the passage of 47 years since I was first ordained. A great deal has happened in my life – as it has, no doubt, in yours. I was able to sit in sunshine on both days and amongst the whirlpool of thoughts, hopes, disappointments and joys, and above all, thankfulness – one thought kept bobbing to the surface. I am so, so lucky to be alive. The vice-like grip of addiction that had left me floundering, threatening to throttle the life out of my body is no longer a feature of my life. Today, I am sober. Today, I am thankful. The 12-step programme of Alcoholics Anonymous taught me many things – one of which is that I now have, as it promised: a new freedom and a new happiness. It taught me not to regret the past – but to learn from it. It taught me to trust in God’s forgiveness, to feel it in my life. I knew about that forgiveness, or so I thought. I had made my first confession at the age of 7. I remember desperately trying to come up with a list of things I might be able to ‘confess’ to as I groped my way into the darkness of that cupboard and that strange grill – a grill that emanated the pungent aroma of cigarette smoke and stale alcohol – though it would be many years later that my vocabulary would encompass words like ‘emanate’ and ‘pungent’! There was something sharp in the kneeler, pressing into my tiny knees. Something was happening, but what exactly? I didn’t feel any reassurance. Guilt was a concept. No more, no less to my unformed mind. I was desperate to be gone from the darkness and breathe some fresher air. Yes, I had certainly ‘learned’ something about forgiveness, but I didn’t experience anything. Only in addiction recovery did I feel it, experience it, sense it, as it ran down like invigorating water, flowing from my head to my feet, akin to the most refreshing and life-giving shower in the most expensive spa in the world. AA speaks of the power of the group, the strength of group wisdom. Jesus had spoken of the same, thousands of years earlier. *Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, I will be there in the midst of them.* The AA programme gave me my life. Yes, I do have many regrets, not least the damage and destruction visited by me on the lives of others. But I also have many moments of happiness – sometimes intense. I have shed many tears, some of them scaldingly hot, I have experienced moments of intense pleasure where the hairs standing on the back of my neck threatened to lift me off the ground, feet floating. I stay grounded. I no longer have need to run away from the past, numb my senses with alcohol. I am free. Not because the past no longer matters, but because my belief in the forgiveness of God is as unshakeable as it is permanent. I have more to do, much more to achieve. I will not sit on my laurels because He expects me to climb higher, learn more, develop further and share more widely. I can be more and achieve more – precisely because I have received more.

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of St Peter and Paul – two of the great fathers of the early Church. We know Peter’s failings all too well. Headstrong, certainly with a tendency to engage his mouth long before he employed his brain. No matter how intense the disappointments, Jesus was unwavering in his loyalty towards Peter. Whenever Jesus looks at you and me, just as he did when he looked at Peter, he sees past the irrationality, the betrayals and failures. He sees our potential – he knows there is always more that we can do, higher than we can climb, more of ourselves that we can share. When we turn to look at Paul we see someone of immense energy and drive. By his own admission his lust for the blood of the early followers of Jesus knew no bounds. Then he experiences his ‘damascene’ moment. Whatever it was that happened to Paul, he became a changed man. He changed - but his energy and drive did not. From fearless persecutor to fearless preacher in a blinding experience of self-awareness.

Perhaps it is self-awareness that is the real measure of wisdom and old age. Paul could have enjoyed a comfortable life. Doing the bidding of the Roman army of oppression and the organised branch of Judaism he will have enjoyed a handsome reward and a comfortable lifestyle. Fine wines, the best of foods and the richest of fabrics to wear. He abandoned them all and went preaching, often on foot, sometimes shipwrecked, sleeping under the stars, avoiding vagabonds and enemies. Peter might have gone back to his wife and fisherman’s hut by the Sea of Galilee, repairing his nets, living off his daily catch. But no! They could not ignore the plans that God had in store for them. He whispers in their ears – as he whispers in ours. When we hear the calling that comes from God then we know that we have no option but to climb higher, to run faster, to share more of what we have: to be worthy disciples, to be Apostles.
