#### SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Mary Faustina Kowalska (1905 – 1938)

Polish Sister of Our Lady of Mercy – Feast Day: 5 October



Helena Kowalska was born on 25 August 1905 in Glogowiec in Poland, the third of ten children of a poor and devout family of peasants and baptized with the name Helena in the parish church of Dwinice Warckie. She made her first Communion when she was nine and attended school for three years. At the age of sixteen she left home and went to work as a housekeeper in Aleksandrów, Lodi, and Ostrówek, in order to support herself and help her parents. She had thought of a religious vocation from the time she was seven and sought to enter a convent after she finished school, but her parents would not give their permission.

On 1 August 1925 she had a vision of the suffering Christ, after which she entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, taking the names *Mary Faustina* in religion. She spent the rest of her life, a mere thirteen years, in the Congregation's houses in Krakow, Plock, and Vilnius, where she worked as a cook, gardener, and porter. She carried out her tasks dutifully, outwardly

recollected, very natural, serene, and outgoing. This exterior hid an extraordinary union with God. Her spirituality was based on contemplation of the mystery of the Mercy of God, which she saw in the word of God as well as in the everyday activities of her life. Her contemplation was to issue in practical mercy shown to those in need. She wrote in her Diary: "O my Jesus, each of your saints reflects one of your virtues; I desire to reflect your compassionate heart, full of mercy; I want to glorify it. Let your mercy, O Jesus, be impressed upon my heart and soul like a seal, and this will be my badge in this and the future life". Prompted by a direct revelation, she dedicated herself to cooperating with God's mercy in the task of saving lost souls.

She experienced extraordinary "gifts" throughout her years in the convent: revelations, visions, hidden stigmata, participation in the passion of Jesus, apparent bilocation, the reading of minds ("infused knowledge"), foretelling the future, and the rare experience of mystical engagement and marriage. Her relationship with God, the Virgin Mary, the angels and saints, souls in purgatory – with the entire supernatural world – was as real to her as the outer world, but she retained a clear-sighted appreciation of the nature of holiness: "Neither graces, nor revelations, nor raptures, nor gifts granted to a soul make it perfect, but rather the intimate union of the soul with God. These gifts are merely ornaments of the soul but constitute neither its essence nor its perfection. My sanctity and perfection consist in the close union of my will with the will of God" (from her Diary). She recorded very precise messages "received" from Jesus, who called her the Apostle and "Secretary" of his mercy and charged her to tell the world of his message: "In the Old Covenant I sent prophets wielding thunderbolts to my people. Today I am sending you with my mercy to the people of the whole world. I do not want to punish aching mankind, but I desire to heal it, pressing it to my merciful heart". Her three tasks were to be reminding the world of God's merciful love for every human being; entreating God's mercy for the whole world and particularly for sinners; and initiating the apostolic movement of the Divine Mercy, which undertakes the task of proclaiming and entreating God's mercy for the world. This movement was to strive for Christian perfection by following precepts she laid down: to display an attitude of child-like trust in God, which expresses itself in fulfilling his will, and to show mercy toward one's neighbours.

Today, this movement involves millions of people throughout the world, comprising religious Congregations, lay institutes, religious brotherhoods, associations, and various communities of Apostles of the Divine Mercy, as well as individuals. Sister Mary Faustina recorded this "mission" in her Diary, which she kept at the specific request of her confessors. She set down all of the wishes revealed to her as though dictated to her. The Diary is accessible to simple and uneducated people but also used by scholars, who look upon it as an additional source of theological research. It has been translated into many languages, including English, German, Italian, Spanish, French, Portuguese, Arabic, Russian, Hungarian, Czech, and Slovak.

Mary Faustina, suffering from tuberculosis and other ailments, died in Krakow at the age of just thirty-three on 5 October 1938, already regarded as a saint. Pope John Paul II beatified Sister Mary Faustina on 18 April 1993 and canonized her on 30 April 2000. Her remains are preserved in the Sanctuary of the Divine Mercy in Kraków-Lagiewniki. At a huge open-air ceremony for the beatification of four Poles in August 2002, the pope said that from the beginning of its existence the Church has preached the mercy of God, but that

[n]onetheless, it would appear that we today have been particularly called to proclaim this message before the world. We cannot neglect this mission, if God himself has called us to it through the testimony of St Faustina Kowalska.... God has chosen our own times for this purpose perhaps because the twentieth century, despite indisputable achievements in many areas, was marked in a particular way by the "mystery of iniquity." With this heritage both of good and evil, we have entered the new millennium.

# A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 26<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - Mark 9: 38-43; 45; 47-48

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

This last week has been a bad one. I usually start thinking about this reflection at the beginning of the week and this Gospel passage always causes me more than a little angst. But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. I am fortunate in that I have enjoyed two 'lives' – the one I led pre-sobriety, and the one I enjoy now. I often think I must have benefitted from a whole choir of Guardian angels, rather than just the one. How I didn't end up destroying myself or others will remain, in my own eyes at least, a great mystery. I know that my selfishness damaged others. I know that I caused scandal. I know that I hurt many people. I don't wear these incidents as badges of honour. They are a reminder of the damage and destruction that is never more than a hair's breadth away, if ever I unscrew a bottle top or remove a cork. As the saying in AA goes – one drink will be too many and ten thousand times ten thousand will never be enough. Like King David in the Old Testament, I was prompted to cry with that aching prayer that comes from deep within: Have mercy on me, God in your kindness; in your compassion blot out my offence. My sin is always before me, against you, you alone have I sinned. (Psalm 50).

For the last few months, I have been trying to help the mother of a 'functioning' alcoholic. I can only try to help <u>her</u>, for he, presently, recognises neither his problem nor his addiction. He still lives at home – as do many others who struggle to find affordable accommodation. He holds down his job with little outward signs of his addiction. He shows no aggression, which is something of a godsend. I have no option but to help his mother – and if ever he does turn to me then I will be duty bound to help him likewise, for an essential step in the 12 step programme tells me: *Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these Steps we tried to carry this message to other alcoholics and to practice these principle in all our affairs*. That's it in a nutshell – but still I struggle to practice these principles in <u>all my affairs</u> for I have real difficulty with my past. I experience real shame. As it was with King David, *my sin is always before me*. I need to redeem the guilt. Jesus' victory of Calvary needs to be interiorised. I need to challenge my guilt, just as I need to channel my anger, for it was my unresolved anger that first led me to alcohol.

That anger and guilt are never far from the surface. Kindness is called for – kindness with self and kindness with others. Do you find yourself becoming more and more angry with the news? I struggle with the aggression and hate, the indiscriminate bombings, the absence of honesty and dialogue, the refusal to describe ethnic cleansing for what it is, the cowardice disguised as strong, principled rhetoric. I am tired of it all. There is one thing I can do, however, for I am in control of my own life. I cannot undo my past; I cannot change one millisecond of what has happened but I can control the present. I can be kind. I can be generous. I can make tomorrow a nicer world if I am kind today.

Tesco has been selling large rugs for a month or two now. I think they are described as shagpile, which always strikes me as such an unfortunate description. This week I spotted, once more, a young family that I seem to bump into often. Twin daughters about three years of age at a guess, with a very protective older brother, maybe 9 or 10, and a mother with an abundance of love but clearly not a lot of cash. (When you're as nosey as me you can surmise a great deal from someone's trolley!). They were mid-purchase. The mother was loading a shagpile into her trolley with the help of her eldest. I had a lump as I watched his sisters' tiny fingers playing with the grey shaggy tufts of acrylic/polyester, delight written all over their faces. I don't know how much of a struggle it had been on the weekly budget, but I detected that the mother was fueling the fire of her love. Her daughters' faces were ecstatic. I cannot alleviate the torment of the children of Gaza, I cannot get into the minds of the leaders of that land, no longer a Holy Land, but a land of torment and hatred and evil but I can be kind in Northumberland. Like many of you, I always buy some groceries for the foodbank collection point by the entrance. This week I bought a tub of Quality Street, some apples and the biggest bag of Haribo on offer. I followed them to the battered Ford Fiesta and helped with the struggle to load the shagpile into the cluttered boot. I asked the mother if she would accept my generosity. If I remember, next week, I'll tell you what happened next! Suffice it to say, it is easy to be kind – bit by bit, second by second, minute by minute. Tomorrow can be happier, starting with today.
