

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Martin Luther King (1929-1968)

Apostle of Freedom - Feast Day: 4 April

"The cross is something that you bear and ultimately that you die on."



In a church in Montgomery, Alabama, on December 2, 1955, a young Baptist minister named Martin Luther King, Jr., at the time only twenty-six and fresh from graduate school in Boston, stood up before a packed audience of protesters. The previous day Mrs. Rosa Parks, a black seamstress, had been arrested after refusing to yield her seat on a bus to a white man. The incident immediately sparked a bus boycott by the city's black population. King, only newly arrived in Montgomery for his first pastoral assignment, had been drafted to lead the protest committee. As he faced the expectant crowd before him that

evening, he began, "As you know, my friends, there comes a time when people get tired of being trampled over by the iron feet of oppression." The church erupted with applause and cries of "Yes!" "If we are wrong - God Almighty is wrong! If we are wrong," he continued, "Jesus of Nazareth was merely a utopian dreamer and never came down to Earth! If we are wrong, justice is a lie!"

It was an extraordinary speech that galvanized the struggle in Montgomery as surely as it launched King's career as a leader of the black freedom struggle in America. When at last the campaign in Montgomery was won, the tactics of non-violent resistance tested there were applied and extended throughout the South. King proved to be a gifted political strategist, as well as a brilliant orator. But he was more. He was a prophet, in the truest biblical sense, who proclaimed to his generation the justice and mercy of God, remaining true to his mission even to the laying down of his life.

A critical moment of doubt came early in his journey. One night in 1957 a death threat was delivered over the phone. He had already faced plenty of violence and hatred. But somehow the strain of the moment and the implicit threat not only to himself but to his family brought him to the limit of his strength. He went into the kitchen and as he sat there with a cup of coffee, he turned himself over to God. "Almost out of nowhere I heard a voice. 'Martin Luther, stand up for righteousness. Stand up for justice. Stand up for truth. And lo, I will be with you, even until the end of the world." Afterward, he said, "I was ready to face anything."

His house was bombed. He was repeatedly jailed. On one occasion he was nearly fatally stabbed. But he was never again tempted by doubt or despair. All the while he continued to grow in his commitment to nonviolence, not simply as a political tactic, but as a thoroughgoing principle of life, a means appropriate to his constant goal - what he called the Beloved Community. In 1963 at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream Speech." That speech summarized his most hopeful image of an America redeemed by the transforming power of love: "When we allow freedom to ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual. Free at last. Free at last. Thank God Almighty, we are free at last."

King's popularity was never higher. Within a year he had won the Nobel Peace Prize. But he did not cling to the safety of honour. Instead, he continued to grow, to delve deeper into the roots of American racism and violence, to plumb deeper into the challenge of his vocation as a minister of God. In 1967 he broke with many of his colleagues and supporters by publicly speaking out against the Vietnam War. He became increasingly critical of the structures of power in the United States, and he began to forge the bonds of a radical alliance that would unite poor people of all colours in the struggle for social change. J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI, who had for many years waged a covert effort to destroy King, publicly called him the most dangerous man in America.

But the roots of King's challenge and hope lay not in any political philosophy. They were based on his faith in the promise of God-the faith, expressed in his maiden speech, that God is not a liar. As he said in 1965,

Truth crushed to earth will rise again. How long? Not long! Because no lie can live forever. How long? Not long!... Truth forever on the scaffold, wrong forever on the throne. Yet that scaffold sways the future and behind the dim unknown standeth God within the shadow, keeping watch over his own. How long? Not long! Because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice.

By that time King's days were already numbered. In April 1968 he was in Memphis to lend support to the city's striking sanitation workers. He seemed increasingly to anticipate his appointment with destiny. On the evening of April 3, he addressed a rally and ended with these words:

Well, I don't know what will happen now. We've got some difficult days ahead. But it doesn't matter with me now. Because I've been to the mountaintop. And I don't mind. Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And he's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we, as a people, will get to the promised land. And I'm happy tonight. I'm not worried about anything. I'm not fearing any man Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.

He was assassinated the next day.

King did not represent himself as a saint. Posthumous revelations of some of his weaknesses underscored the fact that King, at the time of his death, was still evolving, still on the way to reconciling the logic of his faith with his personal conduct. But nothing detracts from his role as a "drum major of freedom." He said of himself, "I want you to know... that I am a sinner like all God's children. But I want to be a good man. And I want to hear a voice saying to me one day, 'I take you in and I bless you, because you tried." King struggled to be more than his weakest qualities. He challenged the church and all Americans to do the same.


We are looking for volunteers for group leaders, group helpers, arts and crafts, nature, snacks, team challenges, gardening and general help.

A REFLECTION ON EASTER SUNDAY

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

The climate of Planet Earth is changing. To me this seems to be an incontrovertible truth. Here in the UK, we are gripped by an area of low pressure which is bringing wave after wave of rain and coupled with a very cold wind driving in from the north and northwest, whipping up arctic air and pushing it our way. It would be difficult to describe the present weather as Spring-like. Our climate is changing. Who is responsible for this is a somewhat questionable topic. A previous landlord of ours is convinced that human activity has had and will have no influence on the speed or direction of change. Mind you, he is sitting on millions of cubic metres of coal and is possibly anxious that it be sold and used. I for my part believe that my activity does have an influence and in my day-to-day living avoid plastic and keep a close eye on airmiles undertaken by the food I eat. I am well versed with all of the arguments: what difference are you going to make – have you seen what India and China are doing? Have you seen how many millions of acres of rainforest have been cleared for cattle. Yes! I have seen all of those things, I am aware. But doing nothing is not an option. It really isn't. Remember the maxim: For evil to thrive, all that is required is for good people to do nothing.

The Easter Triduum is perhaps my favourite time of the year. I love its all-consuming drama and I'm always so glad that it took place two millennia ago before 'media' had been invented. We have no tik-tok videos, no footage taken from security cameras or mobile 'phones, no 24-hour news feeds. Imagine the lengths that the establishment of the day would have gone to suppress the reporting of the incident. Media blackout and sanitized reporting would have been de rigeur. At the back of the minds of the religious authorities lurked the fear that Jesus may indeed have been God's Chosen One. The established religious institution of the day needed public opinion on their side. They could not start a social media misinformation campaign, but they could whip up public sentiment. Agitators were inserted into the crowd, lies told, emotions manipulated, and the conviction grew that this man Jesus MUST be done away with. He spoke of conquering death, forgiveness of sins. In short, he gave people hope. For anyone who is downtrodden, hope is their greatest asset. For those who want to control, it's imperative that hope is removed from the lives of those you would control. You need their eyes and emotions focused solely on you if you are to be successful in their control. Hey, tell the crowd – You don't want to believe in Him, much better that you carry on believing is us. We have your best interests at heart.

For my own sanity I need to believe that there was one member of that crowd of hysterical visitors to Jerusalem who said to himself 'I'm not going to go along with this crowd. I'm not joining the throng. I'm not going to be a victim of hysteria.' The reason I love the Triduum so much – and particularly at this present time in world history – is because it proves once again, that ideas cannot be killed. Benjamin Netanyahu is adamant that his mission will not be complete until Hamas is destroyed. If it means the destruction of one and half million innocent Palestinians, then so be it. George Bush famously declare war on terror after the terrorist attack on American soil involving flying bombs in the shape of Airliners laden with highly inflammable aviation fuel. He spent a billions on the mission – and he failed. As will Benjamin Netanyahu, as did the Scribes, Pharisees and Romans 2000 years ago. They managed to execute Jesus but failed miserably when it came to extinguishing his ideas. They couldn't snuff out the hope he offered. You and I are testimony to the longevity of his teaching and the indestructibility of his 'ideas'. Over the coming weeks we will make our way through the Acts of the Apostles; we will encounter Gamaliel who urges caution against those Sadducees and Pharisees who wanted to crush the early Christian Church: So in the present case I advise you: 'Leave these men alone. Let them go! For if their purpose or endeavour is of human origin, it will fail. But if it is from God, you will not be able to stop them. You may even find yourselves fighting against God' (Acts 5:39)

Belief in the Resurrection was not straightforward for his companions. Why should it be any different for us? Believing that we can make a difference is often a difficult medicine to take. If it is true that evil thrives when good people do nothing, then similarly others will not learn of Christian hope unless you and I are willing to share the very hope that we enjoy. A world without hope really is a hopeless world. It's down to you and me. Let us share what we have — and the very indestructibility of our faith.
