Our Deepest Condolences and our prayers go to Fr Shaiju, whose mother Thresiamma died on Tuesday morning aged 81.... She had been bedbound for the last twelve years, but her death was unexpected and an awful shock for Fr Shaiju. He managed to get a flight on Tuesday evening, first from Edinburgh to Dubai and on to Bengaluru (Bangalore). Five friends then met him at the airport and drove him the seven-hour car journey to his home in Northern Kerala, arriving there at 5am on Thursday morning. He duly celebrated her funeral



at 11.00am and later texted – 'The funeral service went smoothly. We gave a meaningful farewell. I was composed while leading the prayers and the eulogy. Thank you all for your prayers.' May she rest in peace. Fr Shaiju will remain in India with his family for three weeks, aiming to return on Thursday 20 November. We are very grateful to the priests who have 'covered' – and will cover – for him till Fr Jock returns from retreat on Monday evening – to Fr John McInnes, celebrating our weekend Masses, Fr Henry McLauglin, with us last Thursday and next Monday, and Fr Ray Warren OMI on Friday and Saturday; and also to our own eucharistic ministers, Colette Dempsey and Jim Roarty who led communion services on Tuesday evening and Wednesday Morning.

All funds will go to the Mercy Centre, run by the Sisters of Mercy at St Catharine's Convent of Mercy, Lauriston. An Appeal for Accommodation in Portobello for Ukranian Refugee Families

Fiona Paterson writes: 'I'm a freelance translator living in Portobello. I speak Russian and some Ukrainian, and I have many Ukrainian friends. Two of them have recently asked if I could help find host families in Scotland for relatives who are still in Ukraine — a young man (22), and a mother (46) with her daughter (17). I'm hoping that someone in your congregation might be able to help. Since the Scottish Government paused its "super sponsor" scheme, Ukrainians who wish to come to Scotland now need to find an individual host to support their visa application before they travel. Hosts should be able to offer a spare room or home for at least six months and are eligible for a tax-free "thank you" payment of £350 per month.

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Blessed John Duns Scotus (1265-1308)

Theologian and Franciscan Friar and one of the very few Scottish 'Blesseds' and theologians of the first rank – Feast Day: 8 November

Yet ah! This air I gather and I release
He lived on; these weeds and waters, these walls are what
He haunted who of all men most sways my spirits to peace;
Of realty the rarest-veined unraveller; a not
Rivalled insight, be rival Italy or Greece;
Who fired France for Mary without spot.

Gerard Manley Hopkins, Duns Scotus' Oxford



The term "Scot" was applied equally to the Irish in the Middle Ages, but John did come from Scotland, being born at Duns, near Berwick-upon-Tweed. Little is known about his early life, though he is supposed to have joined the Franciscans at the age of fifteen and to have studied at their house in Oxford.

He is known to have been ordained as a Franciscan priest in Northampton on 17 March 1291, when he was about twenty-five years old. He then went to the university of Paris to study for a master's degree in theology but seems to have left without one. He returned to Oxford and lectured there and at Cambridge. The standard theological textbook of the time was the *Sentences* of Peter Lombard (about 1100-60), and John commented on these, refining his views from one course to the next.

After four years based in Oxford he returned to Paris, where he was caught up in a dispute between the king and the pope and forced to leave for a while for failing to support the king. He obtained a letter of

recommendation from the minister general of the Franciscans, Gonsalvus Hispanus, who had taught him in Paris from 1293 to 1296. Hispanus referred to his "most subtle genius" in the letter, which led to his later being known as doctor subtilis, the "subtle doctor." He finally obtained the degree of "ruling master" from the university in 1305 and spent the next two years lecturing there. In 1307 he aroused controversy with his views on what has subsequently become **the dogma of the Immaculate Conception**: he was one of the first to propound the now orthodox teaching that the redemption had been applied in advance to Mary. In the words of Gerard Manley Hopkins' poem "Duns Scotus' Oxford," he "fired France for Mary without spot." Hopkins called his insight "not rivalled," but France (or at least the university of Paris) was fired with anger as well as enthusiasm, and John was forced to leave and move to Cologne. He lectured there for a year before his early death on 8 November 1308.

His greatness can be seen only in his works, not in the outward events of his life. He lived and worked at a time when philosophy and theology in the West were developing in response to the discovery of Aristotle through great Islamic scholars such as Avicenna (died 1037) and Averröes (died 1198). Thomas Aquinas (died 1275) had been condemned for over-reliance on Aristotle by the more conservative elements in the university of Paris while Scotus was still a boy. He worked on a new synthesis—these were times when theologians/philosophers could still try to encompass the whole of human knowledge—using the works of St Paul, St Augustine, his Franciscan predecessors Alexander of Hales and St Bonaventure, and Avicenna, though he confined his use of him to what did not conflict with orthodox Christian teaching. The essence of his theology is that God is love and that this love spreads from God through the whole of creation, so that human beings, thanks to the Incarnation, can love God in return.

His teaching on Mary, which earned him the title *doctor Marianus*, stems from this doctrine of universal love. He was buried in the Franciscan church in Cologne, where his body still lies, and immediately venerated as a saint, though official progress toward his beatification was particularly slow: it was not until 1906 that his cult was confirmed for the Franciscans, who were then allowed to venerate him as "Blessed," and it was 1993 before Pope John Paul II extended this to the universal Church.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS - REVELATION 7;2-4; 9-14 1 JOHN 3: 1-3

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Friday 24th October saw me travelling to London and back in the same day. I always opt for an aisle seat. Usually seat 4 suits me perfectly. The sacrifice of the view offered by the window seat is worth the freedom to be able to come and go without the usual: *Excuse me, can I just get past, please?* On the journey down to King's Cross I met Arif, a 27-year-old property-owning barrister who was returning to London after viewing some of his properties in Middlesbrough. We talked – mainly about Islam. I was eager to know more. He was gentle and peaceful and patient. Courtesy of WhatsApp I met his 2-year-old son Yahya – named, I learned, after one of the Islamic prophets, the equivalent of John the Baptist in the Judeo-Christian tradition. He bought me coffee and refreshments and paid for an Uber. His religion demanded that he did so. He needed a coffee and cake – and therefore he must do the same for me. He needed an Uber – and therefore must do likewise for me. I had an overwhelming sense of being in the presence of an angel of God.

The journey back, saw me again in aisle seat 4. I was sat next to Harry. Harry was a very strident posh 80year-old who had no understanding of the protocols demanded by the Quiet Carriage. The iPhone she held to her ear was quite superfluous. Her voice would have awakened the dead. 'Dahhhling, don't wait up for me', she shrieked, I'll take a taxi from Waverley. Jonathon took me for supper to some sort of foreign restaurant, and we shared a huge platter. It's repeating on me now. I imagine I'll be reliving the experience all evening. She winked at me by way of an advance apology for the looming bout of halitosis. She continued yelling at Dahhhling: I imagine I smell like an Indian curry house. The journey progressed. Her real name was Harriet - Harry to my friends – but never Hermione (her other name! 'Only my mother called me that!'). I opened my laptop to catch up on emails. She pulled a copy of 'The Spectator' from her Louis Vuitton bag. The signs were not good if her reading of choice was The Spectator. Would you like my copy of the Mail? – I'm finished with it! 'No thanks! I don't read pornography.' I raised a solitary eyebrow in the style of Roger Moore. She was non-plussed – then to my surprise, replied: That's my daughter's view too. She's always complaining. It's not pornography though – is it? Not real pornography? I gave her my opinion: I think it's political pornography. It has no regard for truth, accuracy or decency. It's trash – in my opinion. Thank you for the offer, but no thanks if that's OK with you. And so began the remainder of our 250-mile relationship. She was game for discourse and dialogue. I closed the laptop – she was happy to debate. It so broadens the mind, don't you think? By the rime we were sailing through Doncaster we had discussed immigration, the Reform Party, Farage and Trump. I detected elements of white supremacy with a hint of racial prejudice – rather like those paints favoured by Dulux in the 80's - Apple White – White with a hint of Apple Green! I enjoyed the jousting. We stretched each other's minds. The hardest part was getting her to lower her voice. As we learned more about each other, we discovered shared religious beliefs – at least nominally. She was a Christian – but in name only, she added (whatever that meant!)

So that was my day, Friday 24th October 2025. Two individuals encountered, each created, I believe, in the image and likeness of God, each with something to offer me – and, hopefully, me to them. More importantly, each capable of reaching sainthood. It is people like them that we celebrate today. The Feast of All Saints. The saints are your friends, my friends, your relatives, my family. Trump and Farage and the rest of their cronies are in for a hell of a shock when they pause and think of the enormity of today's feast, and in particular, today's first reading: **After that I saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne....** We are told that Trump is very sensitive, Farage doesn't take to criticism, so I'd better type this next bit very quietly and whisper it (Harriet take note!) Most of this number will be black and mixed race. We will all rub shoulders together. Like those who heard the Gospel message from the Apostles on that first Pentecost, people from all over the world hearing and **understanding** the message that was preached, we are all called to be one – and equal in the eyes of God. There will be no supremacy in Heaven – be it white, black, or beige. In the second reading, John reminds us: **we are already the children of God, but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed, all we know is that when it is revealed, we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he really is.** Rejoice in this message.
