'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Alfred Delp

German Jesuit Priest and Martyr (1907-1945) – Feast Day: 2 February

"The conditions of happiness have nothing whatever to do with outward existence. They are exclusively dependent on man's inner attitude and stead-fastness, which enable him, even in the most trying circumstances, to form at least a notion of what life is about."

Alfred Delp was born in Mannheim, Germany, and became a Jesuit in 1926. Among his friends and teachers was the great Jesuit theologian Karl Rahner. During the Second World War he joined a secret anti-Nazi group that was planning to build a new Christian social order after the war. When the group was exposed in the summer of 1944, Delp was arrested and charged with treason. The Gestapo tried unsuccessfully to link him with a plot against Hitler's life but settled instead for demonstrating his "defeatist" attitude, evidenced in part by his membership in the Society of Jesus. As Delp noted,

My offense is that I believed in Germany and her eventual emergence from this dark hour of error and distress, that I refused to accept that accumulation of arrogance, pride, and force that is the Nazi way of life, and that I did this as a Christian and a Jesuit.

Confined to a dark cell and held in chains, Delp passed his time in the Advent season of 1944 writing a remarkable series of meditations. His reflections on the meaning of Advent and Christmas, set not only against the darkness of war, but in the face of his own approaching death, provide a penetrating glimpse of faith, not to mention courage, under fire They also present a disturbing contrast to the pious sentimentality so often evoked by "the holiday season."

For Delp the promise of Christmas, the paradoxical entry of God's love into the dark wilderness of history, is literally a matter of life and death.

The fate of mankind, my own fate, the verdict awaiting me, the significance of the feast, can all be summed up in the sentence surrender thyself to God and thou shalt find thyself again. Others have you in their power now; they torture and frighten you, hound you from pillar to post. But the inner law of freedom sings that no death can kill us; life is eternal.

Always watchful for the prison guard, conscious that every day might be his last, Delp strengthened his will by focusing on the ultimate victory of love. In doing so, he left a testament that shows how a person, living in the presence of God, may achieve a quality of self-possession and inner freedom that circumstances are powerless to overcome.

In a final message to his friends, he asked them not to mourn and to be clear in their minds that he was "sacrificed, not conquered." With the same hope that had led him in the first place to imagine a future beyond the Third Reich, that had led to his imprisonment, and that had ultimately sustained him in his cell, he wrote, "If through one man's life there is a little more love and kindness, a little more light and truth in the world, then he will not have lived in vain."

Father Delp was hanged in the Plotzensee prison on February 2, 1945 [80 years ago on Sunday].

On International Holocaust Remembrance Day, 26 January 2025, Pope Francis reminded us,

"I renew my appeal for everyone to work together to eradicate the scourge of antisemitism, along with all forms of discrimination and religious persecution."

"Let us build a more fraternal, more just world, together," he also said. "Let us educate young people to have a heart open to all, following the logic of fraternity, forgiveness and peace."



A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD - Luke 2: 22-40

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I can never understand the obsession that news editors have in going 'live' to Mary Bloggs in Aberystwyth to report on the latest from Storm Xylophone. The costs and logistics seem to me to be disproportionate to the 34 seconds that will be afforded to their efforts, once the news bulletin is broadcast. The feed cuts to a rain sodden junior reporter mummified inside a red kagoul, furry microphone in hand. In her mind's eye this could be the broadcast that helps her to win the 'Journalist of the Year' award. But before that happens, she will have to learn the necessary skill to remain upright in the face of a force 10 gale, whilst stating the bleeding obvious: "It's very stormy here and police are urging people not to come out to look at the waves!" At this point I scream at the TV. 'Well get inside - you stupid reporter. We know what a crashing wave looks like. We get the idea.' Then it is off to Ross-on-Wye where Lucy, this time encased in a yellow kagoul is standing in front of an uprooted tree with some equally vacuous advice to stay at home, unless our journey is absolutely necessary. At this point I ask who is the arbiter of necessity? It's almost as if TV producers are convinced their audience is full of doubting Thomases – unwilling to believe anything unless they see it with their own eyes. I wonder if Mary Bloggs or Lucy No Name, our two reporters, ever resent being sent on these crazy missions. Perhaps they are more concerned about paying the rent than to worry about personal safety. When it comes to personal safety, then the bravery prize must surely go to Orlagh Guerin of the BBC who is never far from guns and bullets as she endeavours to tell us what is really going on in Gaza. She comes from the same stable as Frank Gardiner and Jeremy Bowen – not forgetting Steve Rosenberg, BBC Moscow correspondent, who took on Vladimir Putin – in Russian, and won both morally and intellectually, and is still breathing and, the last we heard, remains Novichok free. Bravery comes in many different guises.

This weekend we see the Presentation of Jesus at the Temple. The episode is fraught, tense and full of foreboding. Even in the peaceful setting of The Temple, there is a dread in the air that fills the hearts of Mary and Joseph as they hear of prophesied dangers. Their life as a small family had already been filled with more than its fair share of disaster and tension. Now they hear words of 'hearts being pierced with sorrow.' I have spent a great deal of time this week talking to a friend who, following a successful course of both chemo- and radiotherapy is on the up. On the up even as her mid-twenties daughter battles bulimia and is definitely on a downwards slide. Talk about swords piercing hearts. The mother might have expected a skipping heart, full of glee, instead she lives a heart full of sorrow. She sits in with her daughter during her counselling and therapy sessions, but even though her daughter wants her there, it is a painful listen. Often, we don't know the half of it! Intrepid BBC reporters can warn of dangers from falling trees and crashing waves, but there is rarely any advance warning of emotional pain that is heading our way. Following God's plan was not easy for Mary and Joseph and it isn't always easy for you and me. Sometimes just surviving one day at a time is a challenge that tests our mettle, staminaand faith. Throw into the mix, the challenge of witnessing to the Gospel and the battle becomes much harder. Remaining upright in a Force 10 gale, while smiling into a camera, is something of a doddle in comparison. We face antagonism and indifference whenever we try to address the imbalance between those who are poor and those who are wealthy. I have spoken before about G K Chesterton who not only gave us Father Brown, but also a whole range of insights and Gospel witnesses. He said: "The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult; and left untried."

Those who witnessed Steve Rosenberg challenging Vladimir Putin spoke afterwards of the menace that hung thick in the air. The cameraman, the sound man, the director, all knew the inherent dangers involved. Undaunted, Rosenberg pressed on. He would later write that he was aware that he had one chance to challenge. He would not get another, and that this might be the last interview he would ever undertake. He gave it his all. We may not ever hear again of Lucy or Mary, our kagoul clad reporters. They may go on to mirror the other great reporters over the years. We have one chance to give witness to the Gospel. We won't be given another for this life is not a dress rehearsal. Grab it with both hands! Sometimes it feels as if the challenge of making Jesus' voice heard is akin to moving the Sahara Desert one teaspoon of sand at a time. Christians in the world number about 2.4 billion. Now if we give each one of those a spoon, just imagine what could be achieved. It's not good enough to say we cannot make a difference.
