SAINT OF THE WEEK — St Columba of Iona (521-597)

Irish Abbot and Missionary Evangelist – Feast Day: 9 June



Columba came from royal families of Ireland: his father was a great-grandson of the overlord of Ireland and his mother was descended from a king of Leinster. Columcille, Colm, or Colum, as he is more generally known in Ireland, is, according to Bede, a compound of "Columba" and "cell." His Life was written some decades after his death by Adomnán of lona, a successor as abbot of his best-known foundation, which remains a great place of pilgrimage and retreat for Christians of all denominations and people of other faiths and none.

He studied the scriptures under a bishop, according to Adomnán, though other sources associate him with various monastic schools. When he was ordained priest, his family gave him a fort at Daire Calgach, now Deny to the Irish (and northern Irish nationalists) and Londonderry to the English (and Unionists). This became his first monastery, and he founded many others as he went about Ireland preaching for the next fifteen years. His voice was said to carry for a mile. His love of books and learning involved him on one occasion in an early "breach of

copyright" case: he borrowed a copy of St Jerome's Psalter (the first to reach Ireland) from St Finnian of Moville and made a copy of it; Finnian claimed the copy as his, took his case to King Diarmid, and won, with the judgment, *"To every cow her calf, and to every book its son-book."*

He then became involved in a sanctuary dispute, which turned into a massacre: a man who had fatally injured an opponent in a hurling match took refuge with Columba, but Diarmid's men literally tore him from Columba's arms and killed him. Columba's clan went to war with Diarmid's followers, and three thousand died in battle. Columba was held responsible and would have been excommunicated if St Brendan of Clonfert had not interceded for him. It may have been a feeling of guilt over this affair that led him to leave Ireland, or he may have been invited to Scotland by the king of Scottish Dalriada, who was related to him. He and twelve relatives sailed for Scotland in a coracle in 561. They landed on a small island off the south-west corner of Mull and there set about building the monastery that was to become known throughout the world as lona.

From there he taught the people of Scottish Dalriada (to the south and west of the Grampian mountains), who were of Irish descent and already had some knowledge of Christianity. He then crossed the mountains to the castle of the northern Pictish king, Brude, or Bride, at Inverness. Having initially been forbidden entry, Columba raised a mighty arm and made the sign of the cross, after which he and his party were admitted and treated with respect. It was Brude who confirmed his possession of Iona. Bede's version is simply that Columba "converted [the northern Picts] to the Faith of Christ by his preaching and example and received from them the island of Iona on which to found a monastery." The northern Picts had a Druidic form of religion, and their conversion was no easy task, made harder by the terrain Columba had to cross to reach them; he seems to have made the journey two or three times.

He returned to Ireland several times, but lona became his headquarters for the remainder of his life. In his later years he transcribed books and wrote poetry, and he seems to have mellowed somewhat from the extreme austerity of his earlier life—which he had been as ready to impose on others as on himself. Adomnán describes him as *"an angel in demeanour, blameless in what he said, godly in what he did, brilliant in intellect... loving to all people."* He is said to have made three hundred copies of the Gospels, and he was transcribing the Psalms the day before he died, leaving the task to his cousin and designated successor, Baithéne, to finish.

His final blessing on lona was prophetic: "This place, however small and mean, will have bestowed on it no small but great honour by the kings and peoples of Ireland, and also by the rulers of even barbarous and foreign nations with their subject tribes. And the saints of other churches too will give it great reverence." Columba's influence dominated the churches of Ireland and northern Britain for many years after his death. Bede, who was no friend to the "Celtic" side in the disputes over the date of Easter and other observances that formed the subject matter of the Synod of Whitby, held sixty-six years after Columba's death, still testified to the holiness of the way of life stemming from lona, whose monks were "distinguished for their purity of life, their love of God, and their loyalty to the monastic Rule".

A REFLECTION ON THE FIRST READING FOR THE FEAST OF PENTECOST – ACTS 2:1-11

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

As I have already shared with you, my sister, Anne, suffered a stroke recently. Wednesday saw us attend a 'crisis' meeting with, amongst others her Social Worker and a member of her care team. My younger sister and I were there because we had raised a formal complaint about serious lacks in her care package. In fairness to all concerned, failings were recognised and owned. There was a graciousness about the way the meeting was conducted – and Anne was alert throughout, making contributions and voicing her feelings. A plan was formulated. At one point, I turned to Anne: "onwards and upwards, Anne!" She smiled, but it was notable to both me and Kate that the light in her eyes was dimming. Eyes are really important – they allow light into our brains as we absorb the world around us – but they also give others a glimpse into our soul. It has always amazed me how much depth, and emotion can be conveyed without any words whatsoever just by looking into someone's eyes.

On my drive home, I steeled myself for a journey along the Western Bypass: a road designed to ease congestion through Newcastle but which often turns, for no immediately obvious reason, into a large car park. This time I wasn't bothered. I wanted time with my thoughts. From nowhere, arrived Stuart F. He was from the late 1970's, a pupil at a comprehensive school in Darlington. His lack of personal hygiene saw him shunned. He honked. "Can you have a word with Stuart F?" Where would I start? There was an emptiness in Stuart's eves. He wasn't afraid of eve contact – it's just that there was no-one at home. Then Stuart was caught stealing women's clothing from washing lines. He lived in a part of Darlington where terraced houses sat backto-back with lines of washing stretching across the narrow width of the back lane. These lanes provided him with a bountiful hunting ground. I was designated to do a home visit, to talk to his parents in an effort to find out what was going on. His father answered the door in full naval uniform. Immaculately dressed he showed me into a lavishly furnished office with enough brass and wooden surfaces to grace the Bridge of the Queen Mary, all, gleaming and polished. In the middle of the room stood an Engine Order Telegraph. It almost spoke of its own accord: Full steam ahead Mr Bosun!" "Aye, aye, Sir – full steam ahead it is" Clang! Clang!. Big and Brassy it matched the eyes of Mr F. Where Stuart's eyes were lifeless, dull and empty of hope, his fathers were fiery and manic. To put it bluntly, he was as mad as a box of frogs. His wife resembled Timmy-Willie, the tiny dormouse brought to life by Beatrix Potter. I can still see her clutching a filthy tea-towel. At this stage in my life – 1979 or so – I had never even heard the word *dysfunctional*. In therapy first time around, I learned the word and its meaning. It fitted them perfectly Her eyes matched those of Stuart. With the heaviest of hearts, I referred the family to professional care. Stuart was obviously seeking something in life – and it wasn't soap. He took the clothing, he told me, because he wanted to be someone else, anyone else. His mother needed opportunity to be heard. She may not say anything, but at least she deserved a chance. Both sets of eyes spoke of a search for some meaning.

What would we have seen if we had looked into the eyes of those assembled in the Upper Room that morning in Jerusalem. Sometimes we forget that they had all endured a double bereavement. Judas, like Jesus, had been their companion - and even friend - for the last three years. Some had known him longer. We dismiss Judas all too readily, saving his name for relished and savoured insult. He was more than that. No-one had any answers, all had a shared pain. Bereavement does just that. It leaves an emptiness and pain. The disciples' world had been turned upside down. Mary the mother of Jesus was present, Mary Magdalene too. Grief had left them exhausted. Grief feeds on grief. Grief is contagious. A coffin is lowered. The widow can hold herself in no longer. Her shoulders shake. A ripple of emotion runs through the assembled mourners. Soon all eyes are wet – and dull. The disciples like you and me face the same questions: What is life all about? Is this why my sister's eyes grew dull?. Did this question lie behind Stuart's quest? Judas? Peter? Thomas? We are all searching. This is what unites us. The pains of life can be acute. Nature abhors a vacuum and when pain leaves us with dull eyes and bare souls, then today's feast of Pentecost provides the answer. When we are at our most empty, God's Holy Spirit comes rushing in. Full speed ahead, Mr Bosun. Full speed ahead. We are lifted. Higher and higher we go. Our eyes flare for we are full of his Holy Spirit. We become people of conviction and confidence. We are emboldened. No language can hold us back, for we speak the language of love. And this is the only language that matters.
