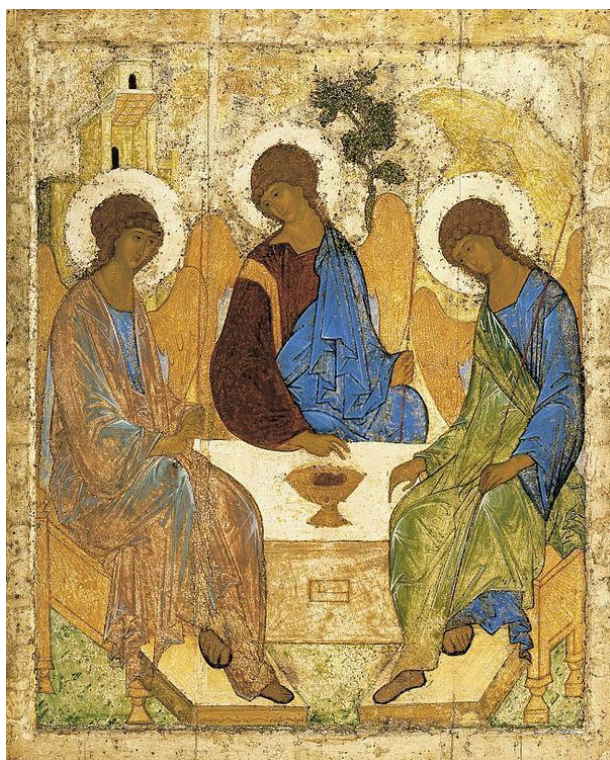

‘SAINT’ OF THE WEEK — **Bd Anne Mary Taigi** (1769-1837)

Italian Catholic Mystic – Feast Day: 12 June



The story of this humble wife and mother who never learned to read or write but became the spiritual confidante of great figures in secular society and the Church is a remarkable one by any standards. It is also known in unusual detail, thanks to the abundant testimony given by her husband and many eminent churchmen when her cause was first introduced.

Born Anna Maria Gesualda Giannetti, she came from a moderately wealthy family of apothecaries in Siena, but the business failed when she was six. The family had to move to Rome, and she grew up in real poverty, with her parents working as domestic servants. After some schooling she could recite most of the Psalms by heart but scarcely write her own name. The family situation improved when her father found a post in the household of Signora Serra, a relative of the prominent Chigi family, then positions there for Anne's mother and for Anne herself, as Signora Serra's personal maid. Prince Chigi's kitchen porter, who brought meals from his palace, was attracted to her, and after a confessor had advised her that she had no real calling to the religious life, she agreed to marry him. His name was Domenico Taigi, he was twenty-eight and she twenty years old.

Married life was hard but not desperate. Domenico was rough but steady and could supplement his modest earnings with pickings from the great house. Like other young couples, they could find leisure to stroll on the Corso in the evening. Their positions as domestic servants provided rooms in which to live, but Domenico kindly invited Anne's mother to move in with them after she had quarrelled with her husband; she proved an ungrateful and interfering lodger. The greatest cause of friction, however, came from Anne's spiritual development. Around the time her first child (of seven) was born, she began to feel she was called to make expiation for the sins of the world and to undertake exceptional penances as though life had not provided her with enough. After one confessor had dismissed her as hysterical, she was advised by a Servite friar to become a tertiary of the Order of the Trinity. She then gave up all worldly pleasures, however small. She was sustained by a constant vision that she called her "sun," in which she saw (according to the deposition of Cardinal Pedicini at her process), a dazzling globe surrounded by a crown of thorns, from the middle of which Eternal Wisdom showed her "the world [as] an open book, consisting of one word, God."

Domenico, with no such inner consolation, became increasingly demanding and bad-tempered, though he never showed her violence and was indeed physically protective. In 1799 the French invaded Italy and Prince Chigi and his family fled, leaving Domenico unemployed. Anne earned a little money from sewing, but they had a terrible two years, losing a child, before Chigi returned, employed Domenico again, and found them better living quarters. Anne's influence began to spread out from the home, in practical charitable works, starting with battered wives, moving on to the sick and dying in hospitals, and extending to stray cats. People began coming to her for counselling, including great ladies such as Marie-Louise de Bourbon, daughter of the queen of Spain, whom Anne is said to have cured of epilepsy, and "Madame Mère," otherwise Letizia Buonaparte, Napoleon's mother, who was brought from Corsica by her half-brother, Cardinal Fesch, to live near the Chigi Palace after Napoleon had been exiled to Elba. They became part of a Confraternity which met every Friday for Stations of the Cross and prayer. Anne was part of this, and the cardinal became her disciple. Letizia lived on to 1836, given a last message by Anne at the cardinal's request: that she should meditate on "*what she had been, what she was, and what she would be soon.*"

By this time Anne's own health was failing, and she died quietly on 9 June 1837, after talking to Domenico and each of her children. There was a cholera epidemic in Rome at the time, so people avoided large gatherings, and she was buried very simply in the public cemetery. Her friends and disciples began gathering testimonies to the holiness of her life almost immediately. Because she had no position in public life, everything had to be gathered from people who had known her. They included cardinals, nobles, perhaps even the pope. It still took almost a hundred years for the beatification process to come to fruition; at the ceremony in 1920 Pope Benedict XV held her up as an example to wives and mothers, saying she had been "*a soul quite different from that of the virgins, nuns, and widows canonized by the Church*" and calling her "*the glory of this Rome of ours.*" Perhaps only in Rome would such a combination of normality and mysticism, and of obscurity and prominence among nobility and higher clergy, have been possible.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR TRINITY SUNDAY

Proverbs 8: 22-31 Romans 5: 1-5: John 16: 12-15

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Last week I spoke of Stuart F and his somewhat dysfunctional family. You remember, my considered opinion was that his dad was as mad as a box of frogs! I told you of Stuart's eye-contact. He wasn't afraid to meet my eyes – it's just that there was no-one at home. Empty eyes stared back. Occasionally I am graced with feedback from these weekly missives. Last week, one reader replied with more than a hint of enigmatic irony – 'Don't you get the same feeling whenever you look at Donald Trump's eyes? There is no soul dwelling there! He really is empty!' I couldn't disagree. I went to the top of my wardrobe and pulled down my copy of the 'Great Masters'. I came across it years ago in a Car Boot Sale. It's too tall for any of my bookcase shelves – and the wardrobe top has become its somewhat dusty home – but I always know where it is, whenever I need comfort in its treasures. Its pages are worn and well stained from countless fingers that had traced through its treasures. Its spine has seen better days; the corners of its hard back cover are rounded and somewhat battered and now afford only minimal protection. I turned to one of my favourite 'plates'. It was the one with a copy of Vermeer's portrait of 'Girl with a pearl earring'. You will know the picture – though might not remember the artist's name – unless you're an aficionado of Pub Quizzes. I love that picture. We get to see both of her eyes as she looks over her shoulder, and those eyes vie with the exquisite pearl earring for our attention. The eyes are alive, vibrant. She has stared into the darkness that she had been facing – and now she turns to look at me. She has seen – and now she understands. I spend and have spent so much of my life looking for meaning – and in my fantasy, I imagine her telling me that she, too, has *looked into the vastness of God, has seen and now understands. There is nothing to fear – come follow me.* There is a sense of mischief coupled with intrigue in those eyes. She wants us to follow. The exquisite pearl, dangling from her ear, is but of a tiny glimpse of the treasures on offer.

I've had my share of avoidance. For years I hid in the limitless pool of addiction rather than face the reality of my own life. The numbness afforded by alcohol was always preferable to the scalpel-like precision of staring into the face of God. Now, like the girl with the Pearl earring, I am unafraid of staring into the inky blackness. Inky blackness is not emptiness in the way that Stuart's eyes were empty, and Donald Trump's are. The inky blackness of Vermeer's portrait background or the night sky are the very places where we find God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit: One God, three persons in a perfect union of love. If you have known love in your life, then you know what I mean. If you are yet to find that love, keep searching, keep seeking, keep striving – for when you find it, Vermeer's pearl earring will appear as a mere fairground trinket. When we know and experience love, then we know and experience what it is to be at Peace with God. Paul in today's second reading tells us that, after years of persecuting the followers of Jesus, he was able to be at Peace with God. I have made my own peace with God, but more importantly, I have made peace with my past and myself. I can, hand on heart, echo the words of Paul in today's second reading: *through Our Lord, Jesus Christ, by faith we are judged righteous and at peace with God* - at peace with God. Is there anything more satisfying than being at peace with God - the state of living with a quietened conscience with no hint of self-reproach. Yes, there are things that I do wrong, there are things I fail to do that I know I should have done - but we are always ready to acknowledge mistakes and failings rather than try to bury or ignore them. I acknowledge the harm done, I make amends wherever I can, and I turn to God for pardon. There is no point in celebrating the death and resurrection of Jesus if we do not seek his forgiveness.

Jesus promises in today's Gospel passage: *I still have many things to say to you, but they would be too much for you now. But when the Spirit of truth comes, he will lead you to the complete truth....* Jesus is the manifestation of God: when we listen to Jesus we listen to the Father, when we stand in witness to Him we do so because of the Spirit of Truth dwelling in each of us, guiding and inspiring us in all we do and say.

God knows who we are. This truth is so simple that it sometimes goes unnoticed and unacknowledged. We may never become as famous as the girl with the pearl earring, but our existence is known to God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And that means we are priceless.
