A message from the J&P Group - Bethany Christian Trust - Care Van

Every evening and most lunchtimes, the Bethany Care Van, with volunteers from churches around Edinburgh, provides sandwiches, fruit and hot drinks for people on the streets in our city.

Volunteers from our two parishes staff the van at lunchtimes every second Sunday. (although, with the number of our volunteers, this averages out at once every two months for each person). Each volunteer makes up two or three loaves of sandwiches in advance. We then meet at the van in Leith at 11.45am and, after having stopped at four scheduled stops, are finished by 3pm at the latest. Each team comprises a driver and two servers who distribute the food and drinks from a hatch at the side of the van.

This is a service much appreciated by our customers, most of whom are in temporary accommodation with no provision for meals during the day. We generally serve around 40 - 50 people each time. SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Anne Line

English Martyr (c1565-1601) – Feast Day: 27 February

Often she would say to me "I want more than anything to die for Christ, but it is too much to hope that it will be by the executioner's hand. Possibly our Lord will let me be taken one day with a priest and be put in some cold filthy dungeon where I won't be able to live very long in this wretched life."

Fr John Gerard, writing of Anne Line



Anne was born into an Essex family of fervent Calvinists. She decided to become a Catholic before she was twenty, as did her brother William. Their father, William Heighman, disinherited them both. She married Robert Line, who came from the New Forest area of Hampshire and had also been disinherited for converting. He was forced into exile in Flanders for attending Mass and died there in 1594. Anne was left virtually destitute and in continual ill health. Despite this, she determined to devote the rest of her life to helping her persecuted fellow-Catholics.

She asked the Jesuits what she could do and was placed in charge of the "safe house" operated in London by Fr John Gerard. She took voluntary vows to help increase her dedication, and she organized the house, found other safe houses for priests passing through, and even had time to teach children. Fr Gerard described her tasks, in his famous

Autobiography of a Hunted Priest, as being "to manage the finances, do all the housekeeping, look after the guests, and deal with the enquiries of strangers," adding that "She was full of kindness, very discreet, and possessed her soul in great peace."

Fr Gerard escaped from the Tower of London in 1587, one of very few ever to have done so, and took refuge on the Continent. The house came under suspicion, and Anne was forced to move. But her new residence was also tracked down by the authorities, and she was arrested on 2 February (Candlemas Day) 1601, just as Fr Francis Page, another Jesuit, was vesting to say Mass. He escaped. Anne was accused of sheltering priests, an offence punishable by death. She was tried at the Old Bailey on 26 February. She was so ill that she had to be carried into the courtroom on a chair. The main evidence against her was the altar found in her house, which by most standards would not be compelling evidence of the presence of priests, but the judge, Lord Chief Justice Popham, had other criteria and directed that she should be found guilty and, despite her condition, be executed the following day.

She spent her last night in prayer and was taken to Tyburn to be hanged. An eyewitness wrote of her: "She behaved herself most meekly, patiently and virtuously to her last breath. She kissed the gallows and, before and after her private prayers blessing herself, the cart was drawn away; and she made the sign of the cross upon her, and after that never moved."

Anne Line was beatified in 1929 and canonized in 1970 as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales (25 Oct.). She was one of three laywomen in the group, the others being Margaret Clitherow and Margaret Ward.

PIECES OF THE PUZZLE

A Response by parishioner Colin Davey to the article 'Entering The Messy Beauty of Life'

In Gillian Coxhead's reflection 'Entering the Messy Beauty of Life' (reprinted in the newsletter, 9th Feb 2025), she comments that: "We believe that humans exist in order to be in communion with God and with God's creation, namely each other. Then our call must be to journey ever more deeply into the nitty-gritty of human existence, trusting that it is here we will see and meet God in all his various disguises." This statement rather stopped me in my tracks because it reveals something very special, something that puts aside all existential angst: basically, if you want to understand the meaning of life, it's important to look left and right, not just up.

The key implication is that God is in our interactions with each other and, for that matter, with all other creatures, not to mention their habitats. All those things that we are asked to do for each other – love, charity, listening, hospitality, and so on – only make sense because God is in our interactions. The joining up, the glue. It is what our gifts from God are for. On the one hand, this explains why loneliness or imprisonment hurt, naturally; why exclusion of people(s), for whatever reason, just seems wrong; why arguments feel bad. On the other hand, it explains why strong connections such as marriage are sanctified; why forgiveness is so important; why recognising community and communication in other animals makes them seem more like us, more worthy of respect. All this might seem obvious, but it isn't: it is very different from doing good works because God will then look down from above and be pleased with us. God is the good works: "the love of God shining through". It is why good people without faith can be close to God – they just don't know it yet.

To draw a parallel (as an accidental neuroscientist), it is not just the cells in our brain that are important, it's how they are connected up, on several levels and scales. We all have basically the same cells but we think and behave differently because of the unique patterns in which they are joined. Those connections change as we interact with each other and the world, as we experience and learn and remember, and our behaviour changes accordingly. One implication from this is that hermits might have got it wrong: that to concentrate on communion with God alone is to miss the point, or an important bit of it at least; that we are not in essence holy (just as there's no such thing as an erudite silence) but holiness comes from how we care for others, more so than through independent prayer, even though that is often on behalf of others. The distractions (if not the temptations) of society are crucial. When we are lost, the first thing we do is to look for others. That is why religious communities should, and indeed tend to, retain strong ties with the communities outside their walls, ideally through the medium of brewing beer.

If I were the devil, I would concentrate my efforts on preventing and disrupting those connections between people. I would have a prejudice, an assumption, a misunderstanding or bias ready at the point of encounter, a foot in the door, somehow both permanently and momentarily. I would get in there first before we can catch ourselves and chase away those impulses with a good thought, a right one, what we actually think. It's that devil and angel on your shoulders thing, to each an ear (for Mr Trump, the angel was presumably at his right ear that took the bullet, as only his left seems in use now).

For me, Gillian Coxhead's reflection explains the jigsaw puzzle of life. We are individual pieces in the box, jumbled up, all equal, all essential. Only when we interact, when we fill the gaps between strangers, when they become friends and neighbours, when we welcome the unfamiliar and embrace difference – nothing makes sense when the pieces are upside down, hiding their diversity – does the puzzle begin to come together and we can discern the big, beautiful picture on the front. And beautiful it is.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE SEVENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – LUKE 6:27-38

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Two weeks ago, we sold a surplus piece of Pilates equipment. Such second-hand equipment is an easy sell — decent Pilates equipment is made overseas and trying to bring it into the UK is not for the faint-hearted. Courtesy of the Brexit deal negotiated by Johnson and Frost our part of any sale is very easy — no customs paperwork, no customs duty, no fluctuating exchange rates — just straightforward currency and PayPal. All that remained was a courier service to ferry the goods from Northumberland to deepest Hampshire with the purchaser making the arrangements. Thus began the commencement of fun and laughter. Two hefty men appeared in a rather grand looking white van, broad smiles and vice-like handshakes of bone crushing ability, and not a word of English, or French or Spanish! (the latter two being of functional ability rather than flowing fluency on my part).

The merchandise being sold was a Pilates Wunda Chair. When Joseph Pilates designed his original piece of equipment, it was based on a lounge chair and was made in such a way as to enable it to be used as chair again, once teaching was finished. The Wunda Chair we were selling had been lovingly wrapped in acres of bubble wrap, protective cardboard and 6 miles or so of industrial cling film. To an experienced Pilates student, it would be recognisable as a Wunda Chair from its overall shape and dimensions. To someone not experienced in Pilates, it might require some imagination to understand its purpose. My two burly stevedores were somewhat lacking in such imagination. They were not going to be fooled by my persistent rictus grin. The more senior kept pointing to an IKEA tubular steel chair with black Dralon upholstery and repeating the only word he seemed to possess - Chair! Chair! Chair! Given that the purchaser - and hirer of these Russian Weightlifterscome-hauliers - had paid north of £800 for the Wunda Chair, I could not believe she would be overflowing with gratitude to receive a second-hand IKEA chair. I had two – and only two – weapons in my armoury: warmth and humour. I asked boss-man for his smart phone which, understandably, he was reluctant to share. In any case, it was absolutely useless to me. The language settings were at his default tongue, and I couldn't recognise a single word. I went for my 'phone and frantically searched for the original posting where we had advertised the chair – viewed from 97 different angles to further the chances of a quick sale. My guardian angel obviously had insider information, and he had guided me to photograph the chair in its wrapped state – in case of any disputes arising from damage incurred in transit. There are no flies on my guardian angel, let me tell you! After the equivalent of three ice ages, the penny dropped and with a suffocating bear hug, Stevedore number one crushed my ribs and before I could fill my lungs with desperately needed air, Stevedore 2 followed suit. We had reached our destination of understanding with patience, love, humour and warmth. I offered the only gifts I had to hand that did not require finding common vocabulary. That morning, we had taken delivery of our organic fruit and veg boxes. I pointed to these boxes – gesturing that they help themselves to some – anticipating a piece each. Apples, bananas and pears were placed in various pockets – as well as, for a reason I still don't fully understand, some organic beetroot.

Amid all the anger, shouting and ranting in this sad world of ours, it is such a pleasure to deal with people able to show and appreciate warmth, tolerance and a real desire to reach common understanding. Who needs English in an exchange of kindness and consideration.

Kindness costs nothing, tolerance enriches, compassion is an investment. There can be no confusion as to the thrust of the Gospel passage this weekend. Be compassionate...do not judge...do not condemn, grant pardon. Give and there will be gifts for you; a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap, because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back. There may be a courier that you have recently had dealings with. He may not have much of your language and he may experience aggression from all sides. Go back to where you've come from! without ever thinking that he might hail from Basingstoke. Yours might be the only kindness he experiences. Give and there will be gifts for you. The amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back. What cost a smile? How expensive the time needed to try and understand when words really do fail – because none are held in common?
